

I AM writing with regard to Jon Carter's comments on Tower Records which featured in the Muzik supplement "The Ultimate Record Shop Guide".

Tower Records have no interest in "trying to force the small shops out of business" as we have only six stores in the UK. We stock only a limited amount of vinyl as this is not a specialist area for us. Therefore we do not feel that there is any competition between Tower and the smaller independents. We target a different market to dance specialist shops and have never, and never will, stock dance, or any other category of music as a loss leader.

Jon Carter's view that "Tower Records is never gonna stock the obscure little records that make no money" is totally unqualified. We stock in excess of 10,000 jazz titles and 19,000 classical titles. To offer such a broad range requires huge investment with little short-term gain, but it demonstrates our long-term commitment to music.

Finally, during 1998, Tower Records UK sold in excess of 1,000 units of Carter's product. I would personally like to invite him to Tower Piccadilly and provide him with a guided tour so that he may appreciate we are not "fucking arseholes". If there is no way of swaying his opinion of Tower Records, then I suggest he instructs Heavenly to withdraw all his product from our stores.

Wanna Spend The Night (Top Cat Edit) XL



B-Boy Stance Freskanova

Winners of the Best Band gong at our recent awards, this is the official release of that tune which whipped one Noel Gallagher into a bit of a lather. Big beat with a big stick and an even bigger pimp swagger, Tenor Fly brags his heart out while the bassline assumes elephantine proportions and the breaks rumble like thunder. Seriously destructive.



4. PIANOHEADZ

A massive club tune in the latter part of 1998, "It's Over" was one of those infectious piano stompers that wouldn't leave your head once it had got its little hooks in. The fact that it cribbed most of its key

Friendly Pressure (Into The Sunshine Edit) **Dorado**


The Jhelisa all-time soul classic got a welcome reissue in 1998, only this time in the form of a funky speed garage stormer produced to perfection by Ceri Evans under his Sunship moniker. So now the track is a classic not only on soul and house dancefloors but at the likes of Twice As Nice and Pure Silk too.

6. CEVIN FISHER

Freaks Come Out **Sound Of Ministry**

The New York producer really broke through this year and this was his finest moment. Weaving its deviously hypnotic spell on the back of a bassline that echoed Donna Summer's "I Feel Love", this was the flipside to hands-in-the-air house, a celebration of all the drugged-up fucked-up nightime children of the world.





7. BLACK STAR

Definition Rawkus

From the year's best independent hip hop label (funded, incredibly, by Rupert Murdoch!), Mos Def and Kweli rapped their raw, rugged, street tough little hearts out over an old BDP rhythm. It was simple, devastating and rocked our bodies till we shook like willows.

8. LES RHYTHMES DIGITALES

Music Makes You Lose Control Wall Of Sound

Les Rhythmes Digitales' Jacques Lu Cont is a man obsessed with Eighties culture. Sweatbands, crap electronic games and tight grey sleeveless tops all look fantastic through Jacques' warped eyes, as does the music from that era. Luckily the Cont can bang a decent tune together as he does here with a supreme electro breakbeat pinned down by the infectious vocal loop.

9. AGNELLI & NELSON

FINIÑO Xtravaganza

While El Niño storms ravaged the USA and Caribbean, the Ibizan

dancefloors were being ripped up too, only this was no natural disaster but a man made tune. Completely epic, soaring synths come in wave after wave, making clubbers reach for the skies everywhere from Amnesia to Dirty Dicks in San An. A very pleasant act of God.



10. BT

God Speed (Original Mix) Pioneer

Perfecto's loss was his new label's gain as the Godfather of melodic house came up with another winner. Some claimed it was a bit like "Flaming June", but it could have been "Flaming Nora" for all we cared. Breakbeats, mammoth riffs and haunting vocal snippets resulted in one of the year's best tunes.

11. DJ KRUST

Warhead

Bristol's Krust obviously wasn't in a very good mood when he wrote this. Some of the fiercest bass booms ever and machine gun drumfire crashing into weird sirens showed that the Bristol crew are still leading the world when it comes to

effective dancefloor slaughter.

thanks to the Orbital rework. This year Distinctive picked this up for next to nothing and turned it into a minor hit, joining untold Superstition tunes as anthems at the likes of Gatecrasher and Golden.

15. SHY FX

Bambaataa **Ebony**

Kaoz On City Streets King Street





HE kings of soul and techno came together on a live broadcast for French TV on November 29. Muzik went to press before the event, but Cox's spokeswomen explained: "James Brown is going to Paris with a full band and a live orchestra. The concept at present is Carl will mix in records alongside them. He's going over for an audition shortly, to check that it's technically possible. If it's not, what he'll probably do is play tunes in an interlude, when James Brown takes a break - he is about 75, after all!

'Carl Cox is over the moon," the spokeswomen added. "He's the perfect DJ to bring charisma to the event, because he's definitely not a boring, head-in-the-decks kind of bloke."

Cox's last brush with celebrity came when he DJed on Ian Wright's TV show last month.



TOM BOUTHIER 1971 – 1998



pioneering French house DJ committed suicide in New York on November 6. He was best known for his DJing and recordings with brother Jerry, but had recently moved to the US to live with his long-term

girlfriend and to make a name for himself as a solo artist and DJ.

Commenting on his split from Jerry, Nick Gordon Brown from Stress Recordings, who released Tom & Jerry tracks like "Breakline" and "I Love Paris", said: "Maybe he felt he wasn't getting enough recognition as the primary DJ of the pair [Jerry's role was more PR person than performer]. Perhaps he just wanted to escape the cartoon connotations and novelty accusations which followed them around. Most likely, he just wanted to make a name for himself without big brother." Speaking of his death Nick Gordon Brown added: "Obviously this suggests things didn't work out as planned with his move to New York. Details are unclear, but it seems

Deep Dish's Sharam


TUFF JAM AND DEEP DISH IN

DJ argument at last month's Southport Weekender left the main room in silence for over a minute. Tempers rose when a scheduling error meant Deep Dish were forced to finish their set early so that Tuff Jam could take over. Deep Dish's Ali completed his half of the set, but six records into Sharam's half the Southport Weekender's promoters told him Tuff Jam were taking over. Much debate ensued, resulting in Sharam removing his records from the decks and leaving 3,000 revved-up punters tuneless. It was down to Lamont to salvage the atmosphere. Both sets of DJs are blaming the event on the promoters of the Southport Weekender, who were unavailable for comment. Both sets of DJs were under the impression they were booked for three hours each.

RICHIE HAWTIN BLOWS UP A BUILDING

ATBOY Slim might have blown up record decks (on the video for "Rockafeller Skank") and the entire contents of a house ("Gangsta Trippin"), but Richie Hawtin has gone one better: imploding the Hudson Building in Detroit.

It's one of three videos that Hawtin has collaborated on with a company called Link 2. Described as one of "the world's biggest implosions", five cameras shot the action at a rate of 300 frames a second when the massive building disintegrated. It's uncertain which track this video will be used for, but a video has also been shot in a psychiatric hospital for "Skizofrenik", while the one for "Converge" boasts a cast of 40 and liquid metal effects similar to those used on the Arnie blockbuster "Terminator 2".

However, he denies rumours that Catch have split up, saying they're instead putting the project on the back burner for a while. Coming out on Catch soon with be a remix of Loleatta Holloway's "Hit And Run", which the duo recorded some time ago...
- Party goers at the TONY DE VIT memorial bash in Birmingham last month were offered the chance to buy a limited edition double CD of De Vit in production and DJ mode. The first CD contains a collection of De Vit's white labels, while the second CD captures him DJing at Leicester's Goodbye Cruel World two years ago...
- Pearls of wisdom from the DRUGS TSAR. It sure seems like Keith Hellawell is getting to the bottom of this pesky kids-on-drugs issue. A major breakthrough came last month when, astoundingly, he announced details of the kind of places where drugs are sold. "Pubs and clubs are prime areas for drug dealers to ply their trade to young people," he revealed to shocked delegates at a recent conference. Next month the Drugs Tsar exposes other little known facts, such as people tend to take drugs in the evening rather than at breakfast time...

- •Renaissance have confirmed they'll be at Pacha on Wednesdays.
- ·Cream will be at Amnesia, though haven't yet confirmed which day.
- •God's Kitchen will be at Amnesia on Tuesdays.
- •London's Pure Silk night, meanwhile, seem certain Cyprus is the new, garageoriented rival to Ibiza. Top names from the underground garage scene will join the club over there from June to September, playing at the Pzazz club on Fridays and Ice Cube on Tuesdays.

ORBITAL ALBUM

THE Brit techno titans return with their fifth album on February 8. The follow-up to the gold-selling "In Sides", it has a working title of "Middle Of Nowhere" and will be preceded by a single called "Style".

"There's a concept to the album but it hasn't been explained to me yet," said the band's press officer.

"It's not going to be as heavy a concept as [the highly dystopian] "Snivilisation". It's kind of like a praxis this time - ie, that you do something, then you try to work out why you've done it."

The band head out on tour in March, for their first live dates since last year's Phoenix Festival. Promising an upgraded light show and new visuals, they play Exeter University (March 14), Bristol Colston Hall (15), Leeds T&C (16), Newcastle Northumbria University (17), Sheffield Octagon Centre (18), Manchester Apollo (20), Glasgow Barrowlands (21), Wolverhampton Civic Hall (22), Cambridge Corn Exchange (23), Southampton Guildhall (24), Brighton Centre (26), London Brixton Academy (27) and Dublin Olympia Ballroom (27).

Tickets are on sale at venue box offices and from usual agents. They're priced at £15 for London and £12 for all other dates.


ECRASHER

ATECRASHER and Pete Tong were involved in a heated mix-up when Tong announced on Radio 1's Essential Selection show that their Sheffield home, The Republic, had been closed down. It was the result of a flyer for a Friday night club at The Republic, owned by Simon Raine from Gatecrasher, which portrayed an image advocating "drinking yourself into hospital". The licensing people objected, and tried to close the Friday club. The venue was in fact open that night, but numbers were severely reduced. following night Judge Jules made a huge

apology on his show, and Muzik's Club Of The Year for 1998 was sold out by 11.15pm. Pete Tong expected to have made a retraction on his show.

WOO-HAH! IT'S BUSTA

RAZY as ever, Busta Rhymes has recorded a cover version of Black Sabbath's "Iron Man" (retitled "This Means War"). He drafted in the heavy metal monster and former Sab Ozzy Osbourne for the tune, which appears on his new "Extinction Level Event" album.

"When I heard 'Iron Man', I knew I had to collaborate with Ozzy," enthused Busta. Ozzy added: "I was a bit reluctant, because he's the first rapper I've met, but I was pleasantly surprised. He doesn't mince his words. He doesn't fuck around."

Amusing stuff, except unfortunately it's a pretty grim track. Highlights of the album appear elsewhere - on his "What's It Gonna Be" collaboration with Janet Jackson, for instance. The album's out now through Elektra.



BLUE NOTE IS HOMELESS AGAIN

HE Blue Note club has lost its Islington venue. Formerly known as The Complex, the venue is owned by the Mean Fiddler music group, who struck a deal with Blue Note allowing them to use the venue after the demise of their club in Hoxton Square. However, Blue Note Enterprises went to enter the club on November 9 and found the locks had been changed. The Mean Fiddler group were unwilling to comment, while Blue Note Enterprises were not answering their phones. However, some reports claim the dispute stems from Blue Note having staged a private party in the venue without gaining permission from Mean Fiddler. It's also reported that the matter is now in the hands of legal representatives. Bob Jones, who runs the Lifted night at the venue said: "I was contacted by Mean Fiddler and told they'd like us to continue. Whether that's the same for all the club nights I don't know." A Metalheadz spokesperson said: "No one's told us anything yet. We're continuing as normal, but we used to deal with the Blue Note, so we'll have to wait and see what happens.

DANCI

UBBING the move "Sunday night fever", the government is to change the laws which

presently restrict 95% of the UK's 1,100 clubs from opening on Sundays. No new act of parliament is needed to bring about the change, meaning that clubbing on the Sabbath is likely to be revolutionised sooner rather than later. At present, except for the handful of clubs who've been granted appropriate licences, venue owners face a criminal conviction and the loss of their liquor licence if they open on Sundays.



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

When and where were you born?

In Glasgow in 1957. I've lived here all my life apart from a few years in Aberdeen and every Friday which I spend in London at Plastic People. I love living in Glasgow and would only live in London if I was a millionaire and could afford to live there.

How did you start DJing?

I started DJing with some friends at a reggae club in 1978. It was the first time I'd played on two decks and when my mate went to the toilet he'd tell me to crossfade the records and I didn't know what on earth he was talking about. We were all into reggae at the time, we were white rastas. I started DJing properly in 1983 at a Friday nighter I started called Bush Beat, playing stufflike Run DMC and James Brown.

What was the first record you bought?

Neil Young's "After The Goldrush". **And the last?**

Mr James Barth's "Stealin' Music" compilation on Svek. I bought it for a mate of mine's track on it. It's kinda Idjut Boys style stuff.

Where do you buy your records?

All over. I find it hard to go past a shop without going in and having a root about. In Glasgow I'll go to Bomba, 23rd Precinct, Beat Museum and Fopp who all get a slice of the Harri action.

Which record never leaves your box?

There isn't really one but Glenn Underground's "Seventies Trip" has been in there a lot of late. It's really good for its long intro and mixes into the type of groove that I like to play. It's a good bridge.

Where do you go clubbing if you're not DJing?

Psy Phi at the Sub on a Thursday is always good for a hip hop night and Optimal on a Sunday there is also really good.

Maybe you've got some secret hobbies?

Basket making, reading, washing up, gymkhana and synchronised swimming. I'm also partial to a bit of cross-dressage.

Describe your mixing style.

Amateurish. Ha ha. Very professional and slick. No, not that either. In theory, it's supposed to be long, smooth mixes but in reality it's probably closer to meandering, stoned mixes. It depends on the time I'm playing really. My theory for a night is it should start off mellow and deep and pick up into more adventurous water with a few old faves lobbed in at the end.

What are your strengths and weaknesses?

I have experience of having worked in nightclubs every weekend for the last 10 years which has stood me in good stead. My weakness might be that I'm sometimes too stoned.

Favourite labels?

I haven't a super allegiance to any labels. It's more producers' work like Mike Dunn and Glenn Underground that I collect. Joe Claussell too, but he's gone off the boil a bit recently. I really like a lot of musical styles from Carl Craig to Grand Central.

Favourite DJs?

Dominic from the Sub Club and Kenny Hawkes from Space in London. They're consistent week in week out without being boring. I suppose I'd say Derrick Carter too, but he gets enough press without me bumming him up too. Tom Middleton, Herbert and Charles Webster have all been great recently.

Favourite clubs?

The Sub Club and Plastic People. I know what to expect and it's always really good. Sir Henry's in Cork is also very good.

What would be your dream line-un?

"Kid" Jensen, Alan "Fluff" Freeman, Simon Bates and I suppose Chris Moyles falls into the same category. Then there would be me in the middle with a machine gun.

What's the funniest thing that you've seen in a club?

Don't print this as it'll embarrass him but Barney from "Update" recently sat on a big jobbie that someone had done up the fire escape at Plastic People. Oh yeah, and the Sub Club once got raided afterhours. We were just sat there having a drink and three masked gunmen rushed in and put a sawn off shotgun to my head demanding money. Actually, that wasn't very funny.

What would you be doing if you weren't a DJ?

Probably working in a drawing office. I trained as a draughtsman and illustrator. Or maybe I'd be cleaning windows.

And if music didn't exist?

I'd get up earlier.

What can we expect from Harri in the future?

A couple of Top 10 smashes and a box set compilation. Actually, I might set up my own label as I've got loads of material to put out.

Robbie Rivera

The Miami man who likes his disco filter-tipped and smokin'

OBBIE Rivera makes the sort of spine-tingling, chunky house that slays dancefloors quicker than you can say "he's one mean filter disco badass". On his breakthrough track, "Nothing To Offer", he married DJ Sneak's innate funkiness to Daft Punk's pile-driving rhythmic sensibilities, coming up with a truly sublime pan-Atlantic groove. Ibiza melted in its charms.

Yet until earlier this year, Puerto Rico-born Rivera was banging out anonymous white labels and small-scale releases for the Big Apple DJ circuit. It was the Winter Music Conference in his hometown of Miami that proved the turning point. Rivera checked in to the Subliminal party where the likes of Sneak, Erick Morillo and Harry Romero were blowing the whole joint up with some seriously infectious disco dynamite.

"It changed everything for me," he recalls. "I was just so inspired. I just thought, 'this is the shit and I gotta be doing it!" Six sweaty days in the studio later, Rivera had his calling card - "Nothing To Offer".

Following the predictable record label scrum, he's gone from strength to strength: the follow-up single "Funkin' & Groovin'", hook-laden releases as D/Monsta and The Mojo Crew, plus his own boogie-discofied label, Episode Recordings, where he can "just go wild and see what happens. I mean, I sample absolutely everything. I just go real crazy with my pile of disco 45s.'



LIONS

COMBINATION

"This was a Jamaican import from the Seventies. It was part of that dubby, small label stuff that encompassed the Jah Shaka sound. It's basically dub bass with funky drums and these laidback jazzy vibes."

SHINEHEAD

WHO THE CAP FITS (ISLAND)

"Shinehead was one of the original roots rappers to incorporate reggae into rap. This track has a positive social message, unlike most rap today. It also helped acknowledge the influence of Jamaican culture in New York and Oueens."

GILBERTO GIL

TODA MENINA MANANA (WEA)

"A beautiful and danceable Latin track which was a big club track in the Eighties and you'd often hear it at a club run by someone like Gilles Peterson. It's happy and innocent."

NU YORICAN SOUL

THE NERVOUS TRACK (NERVOUS)

"I find much Masters At Work stuff boring but this is the best example of their early work where they would combine a live sound with a hypnotic, trance-like feel. The two sides are in perfect balance. I wish they'd do more of this."

WILLPOWERS

ADVENTURES IN SUCCESS (ISLAND)

"This track is almost a poem over music. It's reminiscent of Tom Tom Club – hypnotic

music meets a positive message. It's like one of those self help books you buy in Heathrow Airport. Have I ever bought one? At the airport I can just about manage 'The Sun'!"

THECURE

LULLABY (CHRYSALIS)

"The Cure are brilliant but I find Robert Smith's appearance so

disgusting that I can't bear to look at him! But this tune has a trancey, hypnotic feel and was a Balearic hit back in the Eighties. It works well as a dance record."

THE POINTER SISTERS

YES WE CAN CAN (BLUE THUMB)

"It's difficult for British soul combos to compete with those from the US – there's no gospel heritage here. I spent years playing rare groove and this shines out from that period. Clarity, sincerity, perfection."

DOUBLE DEE & STEINSKI

LESSON 3 (DISCONET PROMO)

"They were the creators of modern day cut & paste dance music. They used reel to reel

tapes to edit classic tracks and throw in weird vocal samples. Derek Dahlarge played this at Space in Ibiza this year and it still sounds as up to date now as it did back then."







IT'S OVER NOW (ETERNAL)

"Back in the late Eighties, these friends of mine from New York would send us tapes of Tony Humphries' mixes from the radio. This tune was so good that Danny Rampling even cut an acetate from the mix tape to play out with."



Garage MCs in disco tribute. All together now: Good rhymes... they have got good rhymes

UNE in to London's garage pirates this summer and you might have caught a Stardust moment. Suddenly, without warning, in between the rough-cut jerk of two step dubs, the sunburst delirium of Thomas Bangalter's "Music Sounds Better With You" would beam out of the transmitter. So when new garage collective Da Click configured Chic's 1979 disco anthem "Good Times" into their MC-led super-stepper "Good Rhymes", it didn't sound awkward at all. In fact the bouncy reverberations of "Rapper's Delight" and the embryonic hip hop era resound in the line up of MCs Creed, PSG and Unknown.

"Creed who opens the track is a mature, poetic lyricist," expounds Ron, The Unknown MC, who co-produced and rapped on the tune. "I'm like an MC from the hip hop scene stepping up to the mic and coming from that hip hop angle and PSG is like a party MC, he gets all the girls and the crowd going."

It's this punchy repartee and the feisty interjections by Valerie M that make "Good Rhymes" such a vital (in both senses) track. Creed's gruff baritone is virtually a garage institution, although he's better known for exclaiming "bubbling strong" and his hallmark triple impact delivery than his

philosophical insights. On the garage scene, "Good Rhymes" couldn't really fail, especially since it gives shout outs to virtually every DJ, producer, pirate station and club from La Cosa Nostra to Freek and Tuff Jam. "That was totally off the top of our heads really," Ron admits. "And that's why we've been getting nothing but aggravation from the people that haven't appeared on it!"

If Ron's vocals sound familiar that's because he and his brother Pied Piper used to be known as UK hip hop duo Hijack. "We were signed to Ice T's label Rhyme Syndicate – we were the only British act on a US label at the time." When rave broke, Pied Piper began playing faster breakbeats and gained recognition as a hardcore DJ. Like many others in speed garage, he's travelled from hardcore to jungle and now garage. "We differ from other acts on the garage scene because we're very much a visual based band," enthuses Ron. "And we're aiming to take the group all the way."






Freq Nasty Le Freq: C'est chic

RUN... it's an alien!" a man from Mars might well exclaim if he bumped into Freq Nasty here on Planet Earth. Not to say Mr Nasty doesn't have his own charms but hell, he looks fucked up. With snake-like dreadlocks piled up on his head like some mad turban and a tatty baseball vest, Freq resembles a mutant superhero. What gives? "I dunno," admits Darren McFadyn, the man under the hair. "I suppose I just want to forge my own path and look and make music differently to everyone else. If you create your own category then you can't be anything but number one in it." A plan that's functioning so well that Freq is shooting up the breakbeat ladder so fast he's running out of rungs. At least until he was kicked out of his Brixton studio to make way for a car park.

But fortunately not before firing out three of this year's fiercest breakbeat missiles - "Under Glass", "Freq-A-Zoid" and the criminally ignored "Boomin' Back Atcha". Low-slung bass, zapping. infectious breakbeats and tongue-in-cheek sci-fi snippets on dark, twisted bits of vinyl that sound like they're melting on the turntables. Unlike some of the new skool breakers Freq missed the heady hardcore days (he grew up in Fiji, Australia and New Zealand) so his sound is swayed by electro and jungle. But that doesn't mean his forthcoming album won't include hip hop, "weirdy ambient", MCs and even poetry alongside Freq's trademark breaks and sub-bass. Visibly shying away from the staple 130 bpm beats of new skool, Freq is worried about being stuck with one tag. "Run DMC were new skool back in their day, now they're old skool. How long is it going to be before new skool breakbeat is old skool? You've gotta be a moving target." On that note the old bag from the cafe upstairs calls to young Darren that his tea's going cold. Rock'n' roll, eh?





NE thing you should know:
"THE ACID HOUSE", the latest Irvine Welsh adaptation to hit the big screen, ain't no "Trainspotting". This is a good thing, because Danny Boyle's take on Welsh's debut novel was a soulless, exploitative trawl through Ikea-derived junkie chic. A tryptych, "The Acid House" is a selection of viciously funny, savagely dark tales, each one essentially concerned with the destruction of a central male character. There's Boab in "The

Granton Star Cause" man who has it all and loses everything, from his place on the local football team, to his home. girlfriend and job, even his human form; Johnny in " A Soft Touch", who gets bullied into a shotgun wedding, intimidated by his brothers-in-law, cuckolded and finally beaten up; and Coco in "The Acid House" (the best of the lot), who takes a heavy dose of acid and literally loses his mind, flipping into the body of an unborn baby. Scabrously funny stuff and, like "Trainspotting", it contains

a top soundtrack, including The Chemical Brothers, Primal Scream, Bentley Rhythm Ace, Beth Orton and Oasis.

Here's a funny one. The screenplay for **"PLAYING GOD"**, David Duchovny's first cinematic dalliance since "Kalifornia", was originally written by a guy called Steven Ammerman, a doctor who met an untimely end in the pool house of legendary drug-munching megalomaniacal Hollywood producer Don Simpson. His own life has resonances here. with Duchovny as Eugene Sands, a doctor stripped of his licence after performing an operation wired on speed. He meets up with Timothy Hutton's criminal, Raymond, who hires him to act as a "gunshot doctor", treating wounded criminals who can't risk going to hospital for treatment. In the end, he has to make a decision about moral duty increasingly shady takings. A strange his undertakings. project for Duchovny,

perhaps, but this is a clever, intelligent thriller.

Finally, Antonio Banderas and Anthony Hopkins swash their buckles in "THE MASK OF ZORRO". Realising that no one with a scarfround their face mincing about with a sword could ever be taken seriously, this is as camp as Barrymore in panto. Maidens are rodgered, rogues are vanquished, and it all romps along with style and panache. Inevitably, however, it's a direct rip-off of Weatherall in his Lord Sabre days. Obviously.

Radio 1's **Trevor Nelson** guides us through 1998's r&b selection and explains why Whitney is hip again





Trevor Nelson's Guide to R&B

>> It started with...

"Terry Riley – the king of swing in the late Eighties and Bobby Brown's producer. But New York really got to grips with the new sound through the Uptown label, which Puff Daddy was on at first. Artists like Jodeci appeared; they sounded like soul artists but looked like rappers and immediately all the slushy retb of the mid-Eighties was out the window. The lyrics were more about street romance than fairy tale stuff and after being in rap's shadow for years, r&tb was back."

It was perfected by...

"Mary J Blige's first album, 'Where's The 911', was a landmark release. It oozed the new style and started the craze of rap and retb artists guesting on each other's albums. Before long, Mary J was teaming up with Method Man for 'You're All I Need', bonding the styles even more tightly. Blackstreet's 'No Diggity', which was an incredible tune regardless of what music you're normally into. These releases paved the way for The Fugees' incredible success. Take Pras' 'Ghetto Superstar' it's been our version of Stardust."

lt's an unashamedly pop thing. . .

"Definitely, people like Puff Daddy and Jermaine Dupri [producer, rapper and DJ whose 'Life In 1472' album is out now on Columbia] know exactly how to get bums on seats and the buzz is reaching as many people as possible. This means that, unlike with dance music, there is no underground end to the retb scene. Sure, there used to be rare groove, but people aren't interested in that anymore."

...and a girl thing...

"I checked my Radio One listening figures recently and they're dominated by females! It's music which makes girls go bananas. Lauryn Hill: she's a real case of girl power. Her 'Doo Wop (That Thing)' is what I call a [ahem] fanny floorfiller!"

...and a multi-racial thing

"Everyone's banging on about how multi-racial the UK is and retb sums that up. You see whites, blacks and Asians dancing together, and this kind of interracial scene will eventually get so big it'll scare

It's not just a London thing

"The thrill for me now is playing at clubs like Bring Tha Noise at the Brunel Rooms in Swindon, to a young crowd that treats a record from 1990 as a classic, instead of the kind of London crowd that's old enough for Loose Ends to be a favourite.

The r&b/garage crossover

"Particularly in London, it's like the two musics are married. A superclub on the black scene is Twice As Nice and it works perfectly having the two sounds under one roof. Most garage people say they like

MUZIK 41. Losing it to the intro of Alan Braxe's "Vertigo"

retb. And other than jungle, garage is the only kind of dance that retb fans respect. The potential is definitely there for the UK to invent a new kind of music by blending the two styles".

The growing r&b club scene

Trevor Nelson's The Lick/Rhythm Nation tour for Radio 1 has visited Middlesbrough, Newcastle, Swindon, Cardiff, Southsea and Liverpool these last two months. The nights are based on his monthly The Lick club in London.

"We've borrowed a lot of ideas from house clubs, things like podium dancers and big light shows which retb clubs haven't taken on board before. In the past, retb clubs have been very understated places - you didn't exactly get a buzz from going to them, more like the feeling you'd been to a cool therapist.

"We want to change that, though, and whereas once retb clubs always got dumped in the Monday night slot, more venues are up for this music now."

The Lick/Rhythm Nation tour visits Birmingham Club Kudos (December 5) and Ipswich Hollywood's (12). The next London Lick is at Leicester Square's Equinox on December 21. Also, Trevor Nelson has just opened a new weekly Friday night event at London's Sound Republic. Called Funk, he's joined by DJs Dodge and Ronnie Herel.

Soul Power. Saturdays at Cardiff's Forum, with DJs Diggz, Mark Devlin and Krissy Kris as residents.

Bump 'n' Hustle. One-offs at various venues in Bournemouth.

Bring Tha Noise. Monthly at Swindon's Brunel Rooms.

Lauryn Hill

Released the genius "Miseducation Of Lauryn Hill" album.

"By far the most important album of the year. All three artists Fugees have succeeded with their solo careers, proving they're better than the cynics claim.

They're having fun and getting paid for it when they do the covers, but Lauryn Hill's album is packed with integrity. She's got the voice of the Nineties. Only Mary J Blige and Erykah Badu come close."



Brandy

Most recently collaborated with Monica on "The Boy Is Mine" from her second album, "Never Say Never".

"She's on more on a teeny tip. It's your typical case of someone who can act, sing, perform - do the lot brilliantly. She's a true idol on the r&b scene."



Faith Evans

Ex-wife of slain rapper Notorious BIG. Appeared on Puff Daddy's "Missing You" tribute to BIG. Her second album, "Keep The Faith", came out last month.

"Total and 112's albums are good, but she's leading the way in Puff Daddy's Bad Boy camp. When she sings, she blows your socks off."



Originally hit paydirt with salacious songs like "Sex Me" and "Bump 'n' Grind", before penning saccharine sweet croon of

"I Believe I Can Fly" and songs for Michael Jackson.

"Some people hate him because of the big soundtracks he's done. But believe me, he'll be remembered as one of the great songwriters of contemporary r&b. His new album should've been a single rather than a double album, but he's R Kelly, so guess he can do whatever he likes."

Big Punisher

Latino rapper on Loud records, whose recent "Capital Punishment" album came with dubious cover artwork: grabbing the breasts of a woman "dressed" as a scantily clad Statue Of Liberty.

"I've haven't included many hardcore rappers because retb is more of a ladies' scene, but Pun's in there because he's given us lots of fun. His own album put Latino rap firmly into the commercial market."



Pete Rock

Released the benchmark "All Souled Out" EP with CL Smooth in 1991. Since then, he has collaborated with numerous artists

including producing "Poetic Justice" for Janet Jackson and Tupac Shakur.

"His new album is called 'Soul Survivor' and he's definitely a survivor. He's never been an out-andout superstar, but he's the master of jeep beats."



Maxwell

Immaculately attired smoothie who gained instant fame with the lush songs of his "Maxwell's Urban Hang Suite" debut. Followed it with "Embrya".

"He perhaps hasn't been

the success many thought he'd be after his first album, but he's still a very important part of the scene, representing the nu-classic soul end of the sound.



Lynden David

Briton whose years of struggling paid off with his October chart hit, "Sexy Cinderella".


"I know I'm biased because I signed him, but he's in a different league to other UK male artists. As well as singing, he writes and produces, and that's what will count in the long run. That and the fact he's turning into a sex symbol!"



Dru Hill

All singing 'n' synchronised grooving outfit followed their eponymous 1996 debut album with "Enter The Dru", on which the guest roll-call was headed by Method Man and Babyface.

"Not the best looking boy band but definitely a gifted one. They've got a massive fanbase, effectively taking over Jodeci's mantle."



Missy Elliott

Omnipresent force in black music since last year's "Supa Dupa Fly" album. You name it, she's probably guested on it.

"She actually blew up last year, obviously, but Missy's still so adored that everyone wants to check whatever she guests on. All her

associates are doing it, too - Timbaland, Nicole, Ginuwine and Aaliyah.'



Kelly Price

Appeared on The Lox's "Money, Power, Respect" single alongside Lil' Kim and DMX, then released her debut album, "Soul Of A Woman", this year.

"An incredible vocalist and the album has gone

down a storm in the States. Not the most commercial singer but possesses a beautiful, classic voice."



Kele Le Roc

Alongside Hinda Hicks and Beverley Knight, a bright new hope for UK r&tb. Bagged a Top 20 single last

month with "Little Bit Of Lovin".


"The best female singer in the UK, with that certain something you need to become an r&b star. Her music has a vintage rare groove influence to it."

Trevor Nelson CV

BORN 1964 in Hackney.

1972: "My Godfather bought me a Jackson 5 album. I played it relentlessly, making up dance routines with my sister."

1977: "By now I was a complete vinyl junkie. To save for records, I'd walk to school instead of getting the bus?

1980: "I DJed in public for the first time at a school party. I did it partly because I had more records than anyone else, but also because it meant I didn't have to ask girls to dance."

1985: "I soon realised I wasn't going to get anywhere if I sat at home waiting for work. I got a bank loan and started my Mad Hatter sound system. We put on warehouse parties back in the day when you could get away with it. In fact, we'd put on parties anywhere."

1986: Joins the fledgling pirate Kiss FM. "I was passionate about it to the point that the studio was in my flat. Every penny I had went into the station."

1987: Plays his first big club gig - at Soul II Soul's Sunday nighter.

1990: Kiss goes legal. Trevor becomes a director, shareholder and daytime presenter.

1993: Having previously worked in record shops and distribution, Trevor bags a job in club promotions at Cooltempo at the time when Mica Paris and Innocence were their main acts. Eventually he's promoted to head of A&R, signing Lynden David Hall. But the head-fucks of life on a major get to him in the end. Today he's content with a part time A&R role at Cooltempo.






1998: Joins MTV, presenting "The Lick" show twice a week.

IVE yourselves a pat on the back. Go on, you deserve it. When you, the Muzik reader, chose Stardust's "Music Sounds Better With You" as the single that sliced your cake in 1998, you were, it seems, to be entirely vindicated. Put down those copies of "Horny" and "Needin' U" for a moment. Forget monster rap 'n' roll beats from Brighton and grunting New York hip house. It's actually like this: the million-plus copies of Stardust that have

cascaded from the record store shelves into clubland consciousness over the last six months really can't be argued with.

Thomas Bangalter, one half of Daft Punk and co-author of

Stardust's "Music Sounds Better With You" and Bob Sinclar's "Gym Tonic", reckons he hasn't had too bad a time of it this year.

"I believe in luck," he mutters, half distractedly. "It's a lot of luck and a lot of work also. We wake up every morning and think we're kind of lucky. If people like our music, it's just something I can't explain."

Since the white labels of Stardust which travelled back from Miami's Winter Dance Conference in the hands of a few A-list DJs began filtering out through radio and DJ play, an almighty impact seemed inevitable. The subsequent deluge of bootlegs, illicit remixes and faintly bizarre hybridisations only reinforced the fact. Imitation being the sincerest form of flattery and all that.

It's not like "Music Sounds Better With You" was intricately

complex or anything: a chiming guitar lick and casual, strolling bass counterpointing an ebbing four-four beat that cajoled rather than urged. But Stardust had an irresistible edge which made it a direct-hit dancefloor bomb from sneery east London joints to gurning Merseyside marathons. Its celestial vocal line was not, as is the way of massively popular house records, belted out by a black man or woman, but woozily crooned by a white man. A French white man of Moroccon-Russian descent, for that matter. Singing in English. With a discernible American accent, breathlessly, as if the feeling is just too overwhelming for him.

More than that, "Music" acts as an emotional step-up transformer, its sixteen bar lyrical stanza invoking the same full-to-

bursting euphoria that, with careful manipulation of heavy drugs, the song simultaneously creates in the listener.

Which is just a long way of saying that if you wanted a top tune to get nutted to in 1998, Stardust was yer man.

Maybe it happened a year too early. No doubt people will be dancing and taking drugs to it as the second millennium becomes the third. What's certain is that "Music" began its life deep in the undergound, quickly subjugated clubland and ended up booting down the doors of the charts. When the record first rolled into the Top 20 in August, Zinedine Zidane's squad had already wrested the World Cup into the host nation's trophy cabinet. The World Cup is still there. Five months later, so is Stardust.

BUT today the men who strode the dance world of 1998 like colossi are shuffling around their modest office in Paris' salubrious 18eme district more in the manner of weathermen worrying about occluded fronts. The platinum disc commemorating eight trillion (or something) domestic sales of "Music Sounds Better With You" is studiously shunned in a corner, and the fax chugs with the never-ending flow of ignored remix requests. Last night, Thomas Bangalter and Guy-Manuel De Homem-Christo's gang partied with DJ Sneak somewhere in town. Tonight, Phillipe Zdar and Boombass of Cassius are hosting a party at the Gibus. But now, it's pissing down outside. Pedro and Gildas, lieutenants of Daft Trax, Roulé and Crydamoure - the Daft Punk mother company and side-projects respectively diligently busy themselves with the routine. Guy-Manuel skins up in the corner, a contented layer of podge noticeably evident around his placid face.

The other, painfully thin young Frenchman is zipping in and out of the toilet, alternating scheduling our day and fussing over the gruesome assortment of wigs and masks he wants to wear for our photo shoot. He sports an incongruous Blue Oyster Cult T-shirt, and his long nose and sharp jawline would get him mistaken for a mini Easter Island statue if he stood still for long enough.

He was still a teenager and on the front line when France started its latest assault on British cultural psyche. "The French Invasion" - the tidal swell of scarily competent music that had been lapping on Britain's shores fully broke in 1997 when Thomas and his partner Guy-Manuel won Muzik's Best Album Award for Daft Punk's "Homework". You know the others who followed in their wake: this year's Best Album winners Air, Motorbass, Super Discount, Cam and colleagues. You might have noticed a recent article in a style mag linking Bangalter, not unreasonably, to every significant major cultural event this year.

So on a rain-sodden Friday in autumn, you feel, he could at least have the decency to be arrogant about his achievements. A million copies of Stardust and counting, you expect him to snort and flash like an international player with pressing financial concerns and high-maintenance wife on the phone. A show of conspicuous wealth, perhaps? A disdainful Parisian pout, even? Thomas shakes his head. No, no.

"Nothing was planned," he says, raising his hands in protest. "With the white labels, Alan [Braxe, co-producer] and Benjamin ["Diamond" Cohen, singer] and I never said that we would hold the record for six months until it became an underground hit. We tried to put it out as soon as possible, but then we had sample clearance troubles. You don't plan or think about making it big, you just do it. I've been really surprised by the success of Stardust, Daft Punk and especially the label, Roulé," he shrugs.

"It took maybe a week to make, I don't know. The more people who say 'Music' was made in two seconds, the happier I am. When we finished, I said to Alan and Ben, 'I don't mind even if we sell only 1,000 copies of it. I'll put it out on Roulé'.

rumoured that some of this is down to the influence and advice of his father who was responsible for Ottowan's enormous "D.I.S.C.O." hit in the late Seventies, but Thomas absolutely refuses to be drawn on the subject. What's certain is that the 23-year-old is also canny enough to have decided early on in the Daft Punk adventure that a principled anti-celebrity stance was as good a tool as any to court fame and profit on his own terms.

It continues to work, of course. So well that Virgin UK are rumoured to have shelled out in the region of £100,000 to license Stardust from Thomas' Roulé imprint. That's, uh, just an odd £85,000 more than the average asking price. Money well spent of course, but...

"I can only say that what they gave was something that they got back easily," Thomas quietly explains. "To me the most valuable thing today are the projects themselves. Still, I don't like money so I don't want to talk about it. With us, it's neither money orientated or audience orientated. Not being mean to people, but we do things to please ourselves. We won't do something to make more money just because people want us to do something. I'm sure I could make a lot of money with the follow-up to Stardust."

But, as he points out, there won't be one. Sorry about that. It's tough, but that's just the way it is. And it's not, as the recent theory advanced by ill-wishing observers has suggested, because another Stardust single would threaten Thomas' relationship with Guy-Manuel, either.

Guy-Man is happy for them, says Thomas. He likes Stardust. "The rumours are bullshit," Thomas chuckles. Cynics take note.

"We always planned it first as a one-off project. It's a very fairy tale ending. Definitely. For now. I really want to work on Daft Punk stuff. I guess it's also me not wanting to do what people want me to do..."

AH yes, ethics. Principles. Words rarely associated with the get-paid culture of the late-Nineties music biz, but nonetheless crucial to Thomas' considered world view, right from his and Guy-Man's days as three-chord guitar fuzz merchants Darlin' on Stereolab's label to Daft Punk's globetrotting filter disco roadshow.

Still, were such prizes awarded, Thomas would doubtless get the gong for Most-Bootlegged, Plagiarised And Shamelesly Exploited Man Of The Year, 1998. He reckons he's heard between 15 and 20 different bootlegs and versions of his material this year. Mostly rubbish, he says, though he concedes his amusement at The Stuntmasterz's impudent grafting of Madonna's "Holiday" onto "Music". He also liked the "Grand Roulé" amalgamation of Alan Braxe's "Vertigo" and The Beastie Boys' "Intergalactic". He and Mike D recently discussed releasing an official version of it. It probably won't come out, he says.

To write one Number One tune may be regarded as fortune; to write two looks

I didn't think people would understand what it was all about. I like it myself, even if people say it's pop crap or sounds like old Italian Eighties funk. I think a lot of classic tracks were made this way."

An enchanting yarn, indeed - that Stardust was tossed off by Bangalter and a pair of mates before petit déjeuner one morning and went on to enslave the entire dance music-listening world to its heavenly chug with a few white labels spread judiciously around Miami. Stardust bubbled up into the stream of the overground in a way that makes most pluggers feel desperately inadequate. No full-page display ads taken out in key publications, no DJs serviced with vinyl, no journalists schmoozed. The most pony-tailed, focus-grouping ad agency in the world couldn't have sold "Music..." any better than it sold itself.

Perhaps that's more about luck than anything else, but inspect the affair more closely, and you'd be forgiven for suspecting there's a dastardly marketing genius which lurks behind the now-ubiquitous masks.

Well, not quite. A million CDs don't stroll out of the Virgin Megastore quite so easily. Thomas' mask doesn't compensate for extravagant vanity or excruciating shyness, just a mind frighteningly astute in a man as young as Bangalter. As the huge success of Daft Punk (who, incredibly, have no manager) and now Stardust suggests, Bangalter is more canny than many businessmen twice his age. It is like carelessness, and the tale of "Gym Tonic", Thomas' other all-conquering smash, is as inevitably tragic as the Stardust yarn was unavoidably prosperous. The workout-vocal powered ditty which spent all summer reducing clubbers to quivvering wrecks with pulled tendons and aerobically-induced exhaustion, was "really easy" to make, Thomas says. An hour, two hours. Of the mere three weeks Thomas has spent in a studio this year, he spent two hours converting the workout vocal he had heard looping around his head for the past two years into "Gym Tonic". "It was just a really kitsch idea," he reflects.

It is to his cost that Thomas failed to realise the vast potential of this "really kitsch idea" and swapped it with Chris Lefriand, head of the Yellow label, for Chris' remix of Stardust. The pair subsequently fell out, with Thomas vetoing its release as a single, and in sail the bootleggers with Spacedust's "Gin & Tonic", a gutter-dwelling remake of "Gym Tonic" sanctioned by East West Records in response to market demand.

"I wasn't bothered at the bootlegs of Stardust at first... but now I'm bothered," Thomas mulls, remarkably calm for a man who has every right to be stalking through bootleg central with a big axe and a licence to chop. "If somebody tickles you for two seconds, it's okay. If they tickle you every day, it's annoying. I'm entitled to not worry about money, but I don't like to see people make money off my back. I can't comment too much about Spacedust because there will






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
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












probably be further developments. I was very disappointed. And I am still very disappointed."

If the public bust-up with old pal LeFriand wasn't enough, "Gin & Tonic" somewhat inevitably went to Number One and Bangalter was put in the ludicrous position of witnessing a parody of a copy of a record he never released made by a man he had never met make it to "Top Of The Pops".

"The problem with ethics is that you have a word," he admits. "You give your word because you give your word. I remember getting here before giving the track to Chris, and Gildas heard it and said, 'yeah yeah let's put it out on Roulé!' I said: 'I gave my word. I won't do it'." Afterwards you can regret people's, er...", he searches for the correct idiom, "... behaviour, you know? But I don't want to become over-paranoid, thinking that everybody's trying to abuse my goodwill. What's happening with 'Gym Tonic' is far more surprising to me than even the Stardust experience. I guess the two things together make it even more surprising to me."

Alan "Braxe" Queme and Benjamin "Diamond" Cohen, second and third legs of the Stardust cash-cow milking stool, could hardly agree more.

"It's providence," says Ben, an unassuming bloke who, from his baseball cap and trainers, you'd sooner picture bellowing over squalls of feedback in a skate punk band than inadvertently creating million-selling house tunes. Alan Braxe, producer of former Muzik Single Of The Month "Vertigo", adopted the "Braxe" nickname because he thought it made him sound like a porn star. A polite, cleancut fellow, he's more Barratt Homes than John Holmes. Still, you never know.

"Stardust was a very complicated process of simplification," he mysteriously suggests. "In the beginning, there were many more lyrics. We cut it all down to sixteen bars and there's a very simple harmony with the bass. People liked the song because it was so simple. This record was produced in an underground way and I have the feeling that underground records can sell a lot. There is a connection between underground music and the record buying public."

And the connection is... well, that would be telling, wouldn't it? But when such a connection can mainline a highly untypical, sluggish house track with obscure disco references right into the throbbing heart of Friday night commercial clubland, it's clearly a potent one.

For such a huge tune, Stardust's provenance is odd: Roulé is not really about

A big-selling vinyl label - 200,000 copies this year of the past five releases - Roulé is essentially Thomas' personal sideshow, his own cult of nonpersonality where he releases the kind of music that inspired him and Daft Punk so much. The "ghetto house" manufactured by Chicago labels like Cajual, Relief and Dance Mania. Abrasive, edge-of-panic sounds several million revolutions removed from the chirping choreography of "Gym Tonic" and the gliding Sift through other "Music". releases on Roulé, and you'd be hard pressed to find anything as accessible. Try either of Thomas's "Trax On Da Rocks" volumes, and you'll discover strictly dissertations functional clipped, squarebashing house music. You sense that Roulé is the nursery for their explorations, that Alan, Ben and Thomas view the glitz and mania of celebrity, the bootleggers, deals, cash, sixpage articles in Muzik and massively successful records as

curious but irrelevant by-products of their theory-driven explorations into the science of house. When Alan Braxe says, "the only thing I'm looking for is to be in my studio making music," he quite literally means the only thing he's looking for is to be in his studio and making music. So forgive the reticence over Stardust and "Gym Tonic". A more pressing concern is . . .

"Jack house," grins Thomas, manically pistoning his forearm. "Just minimal funk loops and stuff. Everything is so cliched about house music – the big cliche of the 'duh-tss-duh-tss-duh-tss'. What I liked about Relief and Cajual from the 1994-1996 period was all the ideas about making people dance – frequency changes, breaks when you're not expecting them. The whole thing is about surprise. Put one bass drum: dum dum, for three minutes. After two minutes you could put a hi-hat: tss-tss-tss. Everybody would dance! New tricks. Just ways to make people dance. Or make myself dance.

"'Trax On Da Rocks 2' is out now and I'm as pleased with it as I am with Stardust. It's selling well, maybe 50,000 copies. I view Stardust as a successful experiment. I know what it's like to have a Euro hit single now."

A hand on the shoulder and Hélene, Thomas' girlfriend, grabs her tousle-haired beau and bustles him off to their flat in the backstreets of Montmartre. The anonymous, inadvertent superstar whose pyrotechnic house music illuminated 1998 not by design but by accident. If Thomas' music really did sound better in 1998, you've only got yourselves to thank. After all, you bought one of those million copies. So give yourselves a pat on the back. Like we said, you deserve it.







that you could never ever tire of. Forget the bootlegs and pastiches. This was the real thing.




2 Fatboy Slim – "Rockerfeller Skank" (Skint)

Credible and celebrated after "Brimful Of Asha", El Norm fancied his own Number One. "Rockafeller Skank", unfortunately, wasn't it. It was, however, the year's most inflammatory, sanity-testing five minutes of mangled funk rock brilliance.



3 MJ Cole - "Sincere" (AM:PM)

Ten years on from Soul II Soul and Young Disciples, two-step garage is the real legacy of the late-Eighties British soul boom. And with "Sincere", MJ Cole made a subtle anthem for urban Britain every bit as resonant as "Keep On Moving" or "Apparently Nothing". Proper modern soul.



4 Alan Braxe - "Vertigo" (Roulé)

Unadulterated "jack house", as Thomas Bangalter puts it. And it's that man's edit that kept this in DJ boxes all year. A mindless mix of clicking broken-down drum machine beats and a tidal wave of filtered disco madness, this was Phil Mitchell to Stardust's Grant.



5 Busta Rhymes - "Firelt Up" (east west)

In "Fire It Up" Busta sounds like a constipated Cartman reading ancient Greek, but somehow makes it okay, and then samples the irredeemably naff theme to "Knight Rider" and makes that sound okay too. Idiotic genius, all told.



6 David Morales Presents The Face – "Needin' U" (Manifesto)

Ol' stubble-face may need a good shave now and again, but he doesn't need lessons in knocking out anthems. "Needin' U", with its relentless piano motif and driving rhythms, was one Ibiza classic we'll never tire of hearing.



7 Lauryn Hill – "Doo Wop (That Thing)" (Columbia)

So now we all know just who the true genius in The Fugees was. Something of a put-down for all those divas baring their bodies not their brains, this was hip hop so in tune with the soul legends, so delectably funky, that pop was rarely sharper.



8 Shy FX – "Bambaataa" (Ebony)

"Bambaataa" brought this former original nuttah out of jungle exile and back to its bosom. While all around him continued to keep it hard and dark, Shy FX dropped this funked up percussive drum & bass atom bomb. Jungle anthem of the year, no question.



9 Mousse T – "Horny" (AM:PM)Millions of male clubbers probably owe their sweaty dancefloor conquests to this hen night classic, an aural aphrodisiac which flopped all over clubland in 1998 like a massive, tumescent willy. Gloriously proud sex music at its most unashamed, honest and lubricated.



10 All Seeing I - "Beat Goes On" (ffrr)

All Seeing I should appear on "Jazz Club" as themselves, being mad, mates with Jarvis and from Sheffield. "Beat Goes On", a groove stripped so naked it risked indecent exposure, was the year's hookiest spasmo-dance hit.



11 Paul Van Dyk - "For An Angel" (Deviant)

Van Dyk revisited one of his early Nineties tunes and proved that it if ain't broke, just give it a quick adrenaline fix and it'll be even less broke. Wondrously spangly trance that rocked dancefloors wherever the public had more than one leg.



12 Groove Armada - "At The **River" (Tummy Touch)**

Not only did "At The River" translate perfectly how it feels to be shagging someone really beautiful while hooked up to an intravenous Ecstasy drip on a bed of 50 quid notes and Krug on tap, but it also had a trombone solo. Nuff said.



13 Canibus – "Second Round KO" (Universal)

After he was dissed by LL Cool J, Canibus teamed up with Mike Tyson to chew LL's ear off. LL tried to get his own back, but Canibus' preemptive strike proved fatal to the old skooler's cred. A blisteringly surreal assault on the senses.




14 Deep Dish – "Future Of The Future" (Deconstruction) "Stay Gold" as an instrumental was an epic of

15 Faith Evans – "Love Like This" (Arista)

You can diss Puff Daddy, but he's got an ear for a hook. And here, with a blinding comeback song from the former Mrs Notorious BIG, the Puffster squeezes clinical Nineties r&b into a sequinned boob tube, courtesy of an irresistible disco groove.




18 Presence - "Sense Of Danger"

22 2 Phat Cunts - "Ride" (Yoshitoshi, USA)


1 Air - "Moon Safari" (Virgin)


4 Jurassic 5 - "Jurassic 5" (Pan)


6 Leila – "Like Weather" (Rephlex)




Danny Tenaglia – "Tourism"


Groove Armada – "Northern Star" (Tummy Touch)


2 Lyricist Lounge (Rawkus)





Gatecrasher

ATECRASHER: great name, great logo, great club. As we head towards the millennium, one can only praise Gatecrasher for surviving dance music's summer of discontent (in the UK, at least) and providing us with the only new superclub to emerge

this year. For so many in the north, the days of travelling through the Snake's Pass to Cream or Golden are gone, as right there on their doorstep is Gatecrasher.

Now four years old, Gatecrasher has become the most sought-after club brand in the country. Its logo is so British (appearing to be based on Midland Bank's), its ethos so traditional and the atmosphere so Medhead, that you can see the future of British clubbing becoming more obsessed every week. The club has become Pete Tong's favourite place to spin in the country, while Radio One newcomer Judge Jules is a monthly resident. The club has helped re-establish the careers of the likes of Paul Van Dyk, while weekly resident Scott Bond has finally set up his own future alongside the brand name.

And indeed it was a young Bond who first alerted Muzik to Gatecrasher's brilliance. Every time we'd visit Baker's in Birmingham (his other home), Bond would blitz his set and dash up the motorway to some club in Sheffield. For anyone

to do that every week suggested something special was happening. And when Sister Bliss came back from Gatecrasher at The Arches raving about the atmosphere, we knew we had to see what the fuss was about. It then moved to the Adelphi (not just a crap hotel in Liverpool, it seems), though it was the move to the troubled Republic which helped the club turn the corner. The striking logo with its shape of Great Britain soon worked its way into the consciousness of clubbers across the country, and with the support of Tong and those insane Bank Holiday Manic Mondays, the superclub era began. This year Gatecrasher boss Simon Raine invested in

> bricks and mortar by buying The Republic. It will be some time before he knows if this is a "sound investment", but the best clubs do stay put. As with all superclubs, the emphasis has shifted into other areas with the successful one-off with Ministry Of Sound and the recent compilation with Sony. However, the club itself is far from neglected. If anything, the booking policy is improving with Gatecrasher bringing in massive Euro talents such as Taucher and Sharam Jay - whose productions provide this club with so many anthems.

Soul Survivors

A music biz in recession? As speed garage faltered, r&b emerged as 1998's market leader

N observation: there was no obvious, large scale insurrection in music this year. No new form like jungle in 1993/1994 and garage in 1996/1997 to rattle its rhythms out of pirate radio, pack out raves and threaten to upturn the industry status quo. But there was a sound which seeped into everyday life, almost subconsciously, which gradually become essential.

R&b is nothing new. It has existed as a tight underground scene and a multiplatinum-selling, globally popular music for decades. Precursors of the current sound stretch back from the early Nineties swingbeat explosion (remember TLC and SWV?) to funk, soul, electro and boogie.

Unlike hip hop, retb has never pushed the right buttons with Britain's suburban youth - indie kids never bought into it the same way they did Public Enemy. They've always regarded retb as softer, more feminised and definitely less credible.


According to hype this was the year of yet another hip hop revival. As well as plenty more appalling big beat. Trust your instincts, however, and you know this was the year retb ruled. Why? Excellent records - yes. Booming clubs - yes. And by infecting other genres with its smooth verbal seduction. As speed garage evolved into two-step, the convergence with retb become more salient. The second rooms at Twice As Nice and Cookies had long been heaving to the sounds of Total, Timbaland and Teddy Riley. But this year retb snuck into their main rooms too.

Forced to get on the case, the majors fought back by calling in the likes of Tuff Jam and Noodles to remix whichever retb anthem hit the shelves that week, and fast. Another Level, Damage, K Ci & Jo Jo and Kele Le Roc all got the treatment.

At the same time, hip hop was increasingly colonised by the polished flow of the retb virus. Puffy's Bad Boy roster had already brought artists like Total and Faith Evans into the hip hop lexicon via collaborations with Biggie Smalls. This year even their arch rival Tupac graced a single that sounded so slick and glossy it could been retb. And mack divas Lil Kim, Foxy Brown and Charli Baltimore

interspersed rhyming with the supple, eroticised surge of the music.

But it was Missy Elliot and producer Timbaland who really sealed the alliance between the two sides by programming beats which fused metallic lightness and minimalist simplicity with more traditional hip hop breakbeats. The fact Missy could rap like an MC and sing like a diva only added fuel to the fire. In drum & bass it was the same story with Urban Takeover taking on Luniz and the Ganja Kru doing Missy.




Even so, the music succeeds on its own terms, even without the mixes and the crossovers. London nights like Camouflage (Saturdays at The Complex) and Trevor Nelson's monthly parties for The Lick at The Emporium, were bursting (or should that be bumping) at the seams. Trevor Nelson actually had to temporarily curtail The Lick because it was too popular and the venue too small. Longer established clubs like Rotation at Subterrania and Fresh & Funky also boomed.

Albums by Faith Evans, Total, Beverley Knight, Kelly Price and Missy Elliott protege Nicole prompted widespread enthusiasm. And in pop terms, Usher, Damage, K Ci & Jo Jo, Destiny's Child, Kleshay, Another Level and Brandi & Monica were responsible for many of this year's essential hooks.

Retb's urbanity is not as explicit as that of hip hop or jungle, which foreground "ruffness" in production and brutal machismo in their lyrics. In fact it's the aesthetic opposite of the gritty sonic abrasion craved and venerated in drum & bass and techno. Which is probably why it sounds so damn fresh. It's totally electronic, totally contemporary and there are fantastic moments like on Another Level's "Freak Me" where the vocals and synths are almost indistinguishable.

Retb is as much about the wo/man-machine as Kraftwerk. Oh, yes. And it's bloody great to dance to. **Bethan Cole**


Or, at least, weren't. This will go down in history as the year our once faceless favourites overcame their celebrity shyness and grabbed a little limelight for themselves.




propping bar/floor/ceiling with a succession of increasingly unlikely stars from Lisa I'Anson to Maradona.

DE VIT OR NOT DE VIT?

Tony De Vit remembered

E used to be a Trade DJ, but now he plays in Heaven. 1998 was the year big Tone left us to go and spin on the same bill as Larry Levan in that most exclusive of clubs. Hopefully, he's jumping around on biscuits and bumping poppers on the podium with Freddie Mercury and a slew of other likely suspects. Whooping it up to the celestial sounds of NRG mayhem. God is a DJ, after all.

But there's more to De Vit than happy memories. His legacy is a soundscape vastly different to the one which greeted clubbing debutants in the early Nineties. Back then house could be a serious business, as techno purists and garage geeks vied for the spotlight of self-projected perfection. It was a time of leather trousers, elitism, tinkly music and po-faced mainstreamers who fancied themselves more than the music or the capsules.


Then there was Trade, Garage, DTPM and the rest of the mixed scene. If you wanted to hear the NRG techno and pounding house that the rest of the country dismissed as "cheese" (without knowing much about it) this was your destination. It could change your life. It changed Tony's. Ironically, it also meant his set was revered at Trade and "unacceptable" anywhere else. Slowly, though, times moved on. A younger, unprejudiced rank of clubbers

broke through and lapped up the De Vit sound. Due to his burgeoning popularity on the Midlands straight scene, his chunky NRG (although tempered at first) became the mainstream, or at least one aspect of it. The kids loved it and they wanted to hear other DJs play it. Switch on almost any Radio One house show and you will still hear De Vit. See some of the country's most popular jocks such as Tong, Jules or Tall Paul in a club, and you're listening to De Vit. Listen to a trailer for Sky Sports, and chances are, you'll be listening to that sound again. De Vit or not De Vit? There really is no question. Dave Fowler

Two Step Into The Arena

Forget the speed – underground garage has never been healthier

NDERGROUND garage and jungle may enjoy a strained friendship at the best of times, but this year the garage community had at least one thing to thank its elder brother for. It was able to learn from its mistakes. Underground garage could have could have broken big this year and swamped the dance consciousness or equally burnt out and disappeared entirely.

Thankfully, it did neither. Instead it opted to remain relatively underground, choosing to evolve musically and maintain the independent infrastructure of pirates, clubs, labels and DJs built up over the last two or three years.

On one hand, the intensity of media coverage diffused simply because the music wasn't as new. Records like MJ Cole's "Sincere" – undoubtedly the "Gabriel" of this year – only scored minor chart successes despite its spiralling shrieks of diva samples and Elizabeth Troy's mellifluous crooning. On the other, the genre wasn't subject to the kind of quick-sell novelty treatment that jungle suffered from. There was no speed garage "Monkees" theme tune remake, and for that we should be grateful.

Especially as, in clubs like Cookies & Cream, Twice As Nice, Pure Silk and Exposure at Space, the momentum was far from lost. As for the sound, two step—the sparse click of strung-out breakbeats, sometimes nearer to r&b than house—ruled the roost. Dem 2's "Destiny" swelled to anthem status during the early part of the year, while MJ Cole and Groove Chronicles provided a smoother, deeper counterpoint to the rougher, more renegade styles.

The main development of the year had to be the further entwinement of garage and retb, two step even seeming, at points, like a complete convergence of the genres. Which got the purists moaning, of course, but gave us heaps of great

records. Not least London club Twice As Nice's mix album, which sealed the alliance with one CD of garage and one full of fantastic retb. Twice, like many garage nights, always had a popular retb room.

But with everything from Da Click's Chic-sampling "Good Times" to the menacing minor chords of Steve Gurley's mix of Lenny Fontana's "Spirit Of The Sun" on offer, the most impressive thing about garage this year was its breadth and rich variety. The pace may have slowed, but the speed still seems unstoppable.

The Ecstasy Revival

Are Es still good in 1998?

OR most of the Nineties, one thing, and one thing only has been a constant of Ecstasy use in Great Britain. The moaning. You know the sort of thing: why didn't it work? Is that as good as it gets?

Ever since the orbital raves of 1989 turned acid house from a club scene into a mass culture, Britain has been seen as the drugs dustbin of Europe. If you're manufacturing top gear in Holland, why send it to Britain if they'll happily neck any old shit? Send it to Italy, where they're a bit more discerning. The nadir seemed to be the popularity of "pure" MDMA capsules, in effect saying "the Ecstasy in this Ecstasy really *is* Ecstasy!"

This year that all seemed to change. Perhaps Ecstasy was losing

its share of the drugs market, as a neck-it-and-see polydrug culture took over. But now, to stand in a club like Basics in Leeds, feeling tough tech house on the

latest beans, was a euphoric rush. Throw in a high that lasted for hours and a bearable comedown, and suddenly E was cool again.

It wasn't just the legendary MBs. There were Elephants and McDonalds, and the elusive Spice Girls. There were crumbly brown ones in Rizla wrappers, blue ones, pink ones and the return of the pokey white capsule. And whether you were going to a showbizzy London party, to Space in Ibiza or some massive northern gurning factory, all you could see were happy, smiling – okay, gurning – faces. And much as we would like to take a responsible attitude to drugs, surely that's better for all concerned than the snarling charlie grimace of recent years. Frank Tope

Hip hop revivalists and big beaters uniformly dressed in pristine white Kangol hats, hooded tops and pencil skirts, and Nike aqua socks clog up every Jurassic 5 and Company Flow gig.

But change is on the way at last. With

Harvey Nichols and Selfridges opening in Leeds and Manchester respectively, not to mention Top Shop launching their Hussein Chalayan and Seraph ranges, good fashion is more accessible – if no more affordable – than ever. Meaning there's no excuse for looking like Danii Minogue or Louise Nurding down the local disco anymore.

Top of the fashion crime wanted list this year? Bland band All Saints, without a doubt. Other 1998 fashion moments were denim stretch pedal pushers, sari fabric dresses and peasant girl blouses for women and short sleeved preppy shirts and three quarter length baggy pants for men. Prada's ingenious sportswear, too, cleaned up when it debuted this Autumn.



n 1998, the people's verdict was unanimous. Judge Jules,

one time Norman Jay cohort, acid house party promoter and doyen of the decks at the Sunrise, Back To The Future and Energy orbital raves, was voted the nation's newest national dance radio hero. He's got the playlist of a Tong, the cheesy quips of a Blackburn, and the cuddly likeability of an Everett. In other words, he's that most unlikely phenomenon: a bloke on the radio who plays house music and has a personality. Of course, the Judge might have signed a double show deal on Radio One this year, but his days behind the console stretch back to Kiss as a legal and a pirate outfit in the late Eighties, when he was still pursuing a career in law. Back then, to avoid the compulsory mugging, he had to take off his wig and gown before climbing the stairs of a North London tower block. Times were tough, and his judge's hammer came in useful on more than one occasion. But it was

worth it. "You can call pirate radio the best breeding ground there is," explains Jules. "Let's face it, pirate radio is the reason that Radio One came about in the Sixties, and it's one of the reasons house music is so popular now."

One of the other reasons, of course, is the art of DJing in clubs, of which young Jules is a leading proponent. In fact, the Judge is so popular now that wherever he goes he takes a pool cue to beat

off the unwanted attentions of top-heavy blondes with tassled bikinis and thighlength boots. Particularly since he's left his bugle indoors, steadied down, and - ahem matured. Is that the right word?

"I've definitely quietened down a bit these days," confirms Jules from the effortless chic of his Highgate mansion. "It's made me much more focused and enabled me to spend more time concentrating on new music and breaking underground records. Don't forget that about 50% of what I play anywhere is on acetate. That's also one of the reasons I've cut back the number of hours I spend doing A&R at Manifesto. If you spread yourself too thinly, you can end up paying the price. And I intend on being around for a lot longer yet."

Which means hotter live sets, cooler radio shows and, you guessed it, even more emphasis on the Jules trademark quip.

Yup, just like toilet paper, he's on a roll. Dave Fowler



The year of the bass

IG raspberry blow-off basslines. Tripping drum breakbeats. Samples pinched from the freakiest kung-fu and sci-fi flicks. Since the beginning of the year, people have been raving about, and to, a new style of music. They call it new skool breakbeat and basically, it rocks. Chief breakbeat pioneer Adam Freeland has launched his own Marine Parade label and toured the world as well as running the landmark Friction night with cohorts Tayo and Rennie Pilgrem. Pilgrem has a collaboration with Arthur "Planet Rock" Baker out, has remixed BT's latest efforts and released many a class act on his TCR label. Over in Essex, the "Romford mafia" of Kev Beber, Danny McMillan and Mikey James are cleaning up under the guises of Uptown Connection, 9 Nickel, Boundarie Hunters, Waveform and Beber, while new skool nights in Manchester and Exeter show the sound is moving out of the capital. Carl Cox, Weatherall, John Digweed and Oakey all played breakbeat sets this year and even Sasha and BT got in on ther act with their 2 Phat Cunts project, opening the music up to a wider audience. But they've got competition – Botchit & Scarper, Freq Nasty, Danmass, Dust II Dust and Matthew B are all on the rise too. 1999 will be their year. Rob Da Bank

Fatboy Slim

Norman Cook is king of the world

RE you bored of big beat yet? Neither is Norman Cook, which isn't surprising considering that he's done better than anybody out of the music whose birth he wasn't privileged to attend and, he readily admits, only stumbled upon by chance. Nonetheless, 1998's version of big beat belonged to him. His beats were fatter, cleverer, wider and dafter than

anyone else's. And although many people still regard Cook as a skinny, balding man with a suspicious relationship with Eighties guitar pop - instead of the Machiavellian genius behind party machine Number One, Fatboy Slim - none of the scene's other players came anywhere close to matching his success.

Norman has consistently protested that really, dance music was his thing and his former pop career was merely a diversion to pay the bills while he engineered his all-conquering groove sensation. But his pivotal track was probably Fatboy Slim's least traditionally "dance" moment. While "Gangsta Trippin" and his excitable mixes of "Brimful Of Asha" and "Renegade Master" stuck rigidly to party hip hop rules, "Rockafeller Skank" was "dance" music in that huge numbers of people danced to it. In every other sense, it was a oddly-shaped pop hit which sounded like jungle, reggae, surf rock, Northern soul and hip hop pogoing in front of the DJ booth. Whether it's the perfect fusion of pop and dance remains to be seen, but few people in the western hemisphere can claim not to have been kept awake with a "Right about now/The funk soul brother" mantra revolving in their semi-consciousness.

> Grumblings suggest that time might be up for what is either splendidly uninhibited party fuel or student union jukebox fodder. Norman has pointed out that when the big beat ship goes down, he'll go down with it. But while the Boutique may have dropped its Big Beat prefix, it still vibrates to the same crowdwowing sets that Norman dished out across the world in 1998. Sample Madness

If talent borrows, does genius steal?

HE sampler had a lot to answer for in 1998. This year, Mr Akai's box of tantalising techno trickery was indirectly responsible for Stardust's "Music Sounds Better With You", Bronx Dogs' "Tribute To Jazzy Jay" and 187 Lockdown's "Gunman", tunes which continue to elevate the process of carefully recycling modest sections of other people's music to the level of high art.

But did anyone notice the change that occurred in 1998? Specifically, the extremely unsubtle shift from modest borrowing to outright thievery? When New York house producer Jason Nevins opted to respray an old track by shell-suited hip hop patriarchs Run DMC, he made his job easier by the simple expedient of pasting nearly the entire track onto his hard house beat rather than limiting himself to the odd sixteen-bar loop here or there. The trillions of copies "It's Like That" sold worldwide (for which Nevins was paid only pin money) fleetingly relaunched Run DMC's career. It also resuscitated an ancient and dubious method of music production: take someone else's song, fiddle with it slightly and claim the tune as your own.

Since "It's Like That", a deluge of tunes have carried on where Nevins left off. On the one hand, there's a bootleg culture of unofficial remixing with Beastie Boys' "Hold It, Now Hit It" redone Nevins-style over a house backbeat by Johanne S and the cheeky welding of Alan Braxe's "Vertigo" to the Beasties' "Intergalactic" both featuring prominently. On the other, there's hip

hop's current tactic of megasampling: taking colossal passages of other records to rap over with the artist sampled credited as co-writer: Jay-Z's "Annie"-sampling "Hard Knock Life", Busta Rhymes' "Knight Rider"-based "Fire It Up" and at its most extreme, Puff Daddy & The Family's "I'll Be Missing You".

This is sampling taken to its logical conclusion. So talent borrows and genius steals, does it? Perhaps, as Thomas Bangalter sits and watches a tawdry rip-off of his "Gym Tonic" sail up the charts, it's time for dance music to reconsider its position on that supposed truism. Kevin Braddock

The year the festivals went for broke

Festival after festival bit the dust. Cries went up from every corner that the jig was up. The entire British music industry was now officially over. What was really over was the greed and avarice that led to a summer top heavy with enormous festivals.

On reflection, who would want to go to a two day Universe event? One night was normally enough to finish any sane person off. Why go to a disused airfield like Phoenix, when you've got a lovely green site like Glastonbury? The festivals that delivered - Creamfields, V98 and T In The Park, plus established giants like Glastonbury - will last. But one thing is clear: the kids won't get fooled again. Frank Tope

Who ruled black music this year? No question. Step forward Lauryn Hill

HE lines of creative demarcation have existed around the genres of rap and soul music for so long that no one can remember who put them there. Rap dealt with the politics of life, and soul the emotion. If there was a marriage to be found between the genres, few performers were capable of officiating it. At least until Lauryn Hill opened her mouth.

Not only is Hill a competent, authoritative, articulate rapper, but she's also a vocalist blessed with a unique baritone. Her long awaited solo joint, "The Miseducation Of Lauryn Hill" was an album as eagerly anticipated as your holiday snaps – proof of an experience you've already enjoyed, but want to relive. "Miseducation..." made her maiden recordings with The Fugees sound like demo tapes.

Amidst it all were some glaring insights: Hill is as judgmental, self-righteous, recriminatory, humble and sensitive as we are. She's also more musically talented than we initially thought.

A mother of two (her partner is reggae legend Bob Marley's son Ronan), she produced "Miseducation...", the fastest selling solo album in American chart history, co-produced Aretha Franklin's comeback single and duets with Whitney Houston on her new album. She graduated from Columbia University at the height of The Fugees' success in 1996. And she's still only 22 years old. But more than anything, Hill is a musical conundrum. Someone who fans of any style of music can claim as their own, because you are as likely to hear Hill's music in a school disco, a blues club, the chill out room of your favourite club, seeping out of the headphones of the guy sitting next to you on the tube or in your bedroom as you make love. Hill's music is universal because it's born of an open mind, an articulate tongue and a



Tical 2000: Judgement Day Def Jam

Another month, another two Wu-Tang releases, and a real return to form for the Big Boss of the Clan

UCKING hell. No, really, FUCKING HELL. But we'll get to that later.

Let's get Method Man out of the way first. In any other month, "Tical 2000" might be on this page on merit rather than by association. It's good enough, it's weird enough, and at 28 tracks, it's long enough. In fact, as a primer for the excesses of the RZA opus, it's ideal. In among the trademark Wu-Tang strings and Oriental inflections, there's some weird shit going on: on "Shaolin What", there are about four piano loops running simultaneously, none of which fit with the other three, while "Judgement Day" is six minutes of frenetic gibberish that sounds like MC Silver Bullet. The best tracks here – the drunken, stumbling bongo-fest "Torture", the molasses-thick funk of "Party Crusher", the bass-farting, eardrum-piercing, Redman-featuring

"Big Dogs" - are as good as anything the Wu have done in the

last two years. Sadly, "Suspect Chin Music" doesn't live up to its title, but you can't have everything, "Tical 2000" is an excellent album, and that is surely enough. Except this month, of course, it isn't.

"Bobby Digital. . " is the most fuckedup, frightening hip hop album I've ever



heard. It starts with somebody ranting in German, and just gets weirder. There's things going on in here that suggest somebody's been spiking RZA's skunk. "Handwriting On The Wall" rides a barrel organ (!) loop, and doesn't have a beat. "Kiss Of The Black Widow" would be straight-up hip hop, were it not for the other, rhythmically independent song happily playing over the top of it. "NYC Everything", on which Method Man slays it, is a ridiculously bouncy Eighties synth-pop hardcore rap classic, if you can picture that. "Domestic Violence" starts as a duelling lovers song between RZA and his paramour, and ends with the two of them yelling "Ho!" and "Bastard!" at each other over and over. And "My Lovin' Is Digi" could be the surprise pop classic of the year, with its huge pirouetting strings and P-Funk chorus, except that every other word is an expletive. Even when RZA/Bobby tries to do a straight love song on "Lovejones", the best he can do is "Girl, you're shinin' like a brand new black Glock". Oh, Bobby, you old charmer.

Throughout the rest of the album you can hear musical echoes of Prince, Ennio Morricone, Lalo Schifrin, Ry Cooder, Funkadelic, Miles Davis, and lyrical echoes of. . . Well, nobody. It's hard to make comparisons when for most of the album you can barely decipher what he's on about.

For all its bizarre instrumentation and fluff-coated-stylus sound quality, "Bobby Digital..." still demands the attention of any modern pop lover. It's that good. In fact, we'd tentatively call it "important" in the wider scheme of things. God knows where it came from – perhaps the king of the East Coast finally feels threatened enough by new under-

ground upstarts like Company Flow and Blackstar to start trying again – but the RZA has most definitely upped the ante. After this, I don't even want to guess what other cards he's holding.

KeepThe Faith Arista/Puff Daddy Records

Notorious BIG's wife and r&b sensation's long-time-coming Puffy-produced second album

N the UK Faith Evans is known principally as Notorious BIG's grieving widow, the voice behind the choruses on "I'll Be Missing You". But in the USA she's a platinum-selling soul sensation, a former vocal coach to Mary J Blige who, with her and their mentor, Sean "Puffy" Combs, helped define today's hip hop soul genre.

What with marriage, childbirth and bereavement to worry about, it's no surprise Faith's been away for a while. What is perhaps a little unexpected – particularly to clubbers who've heard the ubiquitous Chicsampling uptempo single "Love Like This" – is the heavy reliance of this second album on conventional soul balladeering. Tracks like "Never Gonna Let You Go" and "Anything You Need" steer precariously close to Whitney Houston schmaltz, as anodyne as much of the dross the new skool of soul innovators were supposed to deliver us from.

Yet at its best – the aforementioned single "All Night Long", which features Puffy and the almost painful home truths of "Life Will Pass You By" ("I've got three children to think about first/I've got so much to do, little time for work") – "Keep The Faith" manages to be sincere, affecting and engaging.

Reassuringly, she has the power to get it right: Evans writes, arranges and produces as well as sings. She just has to better balance what she does best with her obvious need to be respected as a vocal technician. But once she's resolved that, Faith will make believers of us all.

WHY take one idea into the studio when you can take several hundred? Such is the theory deployed on this duo's first album as, around a template of big beat, springy disco, buzzing techno, chirpy house and daft funk come as complementary extras. Fine in theory, but due to a no-fi approach which suggests this was made on a super-cheap budget, it doesn't always work. Whereas "Lightning" flashes into life as a superb merger of soul singing, rumbling bass and persistent rhythms, the cheesy samples of "Rap Is Really Changing" grate heavily, for instance. More like a mix tape than an artist album, though not the best you'll hear.

IF there's one thing which unites much Japanese music and makes it unique, it's the attention to detail. From the impeccable retro-kitsch stylings of Cornelius to the fleshmincingly extreme artcore punk of The Boredoms, you simply can't imagine anyone else taking such

painstaking delight in every last detail of their sound. The same is true of Tanzmuzik and "Version City". They've taken Detroit techno propulsion, precision-tooled electro and harsh ambience and spliced them together with all the zeal of a sex-starved geneticist with a test tube full of supermodel DNA. The results, similarly, are enticing but lacking in a certain essential humanity.

All of which means, if you like your house fat and dirty, then "42 Minutes..." is the perfect disco countdown.

Vienna's Pulsinger and Tunekan send their "Carrera" in for a timely respray

YOU can have your Kid Locos and Dimitris From Paris. In this book, there was only one European band that came anywhere near matching Daft Punk's universal charm last year. And they've probably never even seen the Eiffel Tower. "Carrera" by Vienna's Patrick Pulsinger and Erdem Tunekan aka Sluts 'n' Strings & 909, remains one gobsmacking

Wishmountain Is Dead Antiphono

Odds and sods collection of old and new from the madcap house producer who likes using household implements

"PEPPERPOT". "Crisps". "Bottle". "Salad Tosser". Strange names for tunes, even from a producer as certifiably bonkers as Matthew "Herbert" Herbert. Except that here, for his Wishmountain project, they're the very key to the "music". Because each track is simply an amalgam of sounds sampled by hitting, tapping or breaking the subject matter. Clever stuff? Undoubtedly, as anyone who's seen Wishmountain's insane live sets can vouch. The trouble is that, on record, most of this compilation of previous singles and unreleased takes sounds like partially completed experiments from the laboratory of "Viz"'s Professor Piehead. Minimal, clunking and ultimately rather pointless, it's very much like getting home one night to discover that your Dad's reassembled your favourite Tonka toy as a pepper grinder. Clever, but, er, so what exactly? You'd be well advised to stick to that brilliant Herbert house album instead.

British techno champ Luke Slater reboots an old moniker, returning to this underground label

LUKE Slater has a prime slot in the most exclusive techno club of them all. It's the one reserved for those who don't suffer burn-out or resort to plagiarising themselves the second reknown comes their way. And this, his third Planetary Assault System album, proves emphatically that no one's going to revoke his membership just yet. Where weaving crepuscular, angular

sounds have seemingly become a chore or a way to pay the bills for many, it remains Slater's extreme pleasure. Hence the atmos-overload in the spooked vocals and motorik rhythms of "Shift", the compelling jackhammer throb of "Screen" and the deep-set evil phunk of "You Though It". Elsewhere, there's highly textured ambient and fuzzy, twisted trip hop with large gonads; Slater's triumph being that this album hangs together with an eerie kind of panache through every twist and turn. True, it's a specialist piece of work – but it's also a pretty special one.

Eighties synth pop meets Nineties house in excellent Danish take on deep tech-house

HAVE Wiggle ever been to Denmark? Does Terry Francis have lost relatives in Copenhagen? You have to wonder after listening to "OK". Because it's not often that distant foreign outposts of the house sound come up with something as wondrously fresh and beamingly inventive as this. Rather than push one sound to the limit, Jetster Anders Remmer (of ambienty types Dub Tractor) has co-opted everything into his awesomely

Paul Van Dyk Vorsprung Dyk Technik

Germany's trance deity tops off his best year with a comprehensive retro collection of titanic proportions

OING from being an impoverished carpenter in East Germany to one of the biggest DJs and producers in the world can't be easy. Paul Van Dyk's done it in seven years, moving from his debut at the Tresor club in Berlin through two swoonsome albums in "45 RPM" and "Seven Ways", 1998 has been his year for two reasons — his masterly reworkings of his own "For An Angel" and Binary Finary's awesome "1998", for which Van Dyk transformed a stodgy trance plodder into a euphoric, emotionally charged anthem which still hits the spot even now.

Remixes, original productions, collaborations and rarities — they're all here. Early Nineties trance classics like Humate's devastatingly emotional "Love Stimulation" are here too, sounding as good as ever. Clocking in at a heavyweight three CD set, it is heavy going from time to time, especially without the aid of a VW fizzing through your system. But if crashing breakdowns, sorrowful pianos and uplifting riffs are your thing, get ready to bliss out as BT, Sven Vath, Jens Lissat and Age Of Love remixes are dropped within 33 prime cuts of Euro-trance continuously mixed by Van Dyk. Don't underestimate this collection. It's dance music for the feet, but from the heart.

And from 1989's Raven Maize onwards, Dave "Joey Negro" Lee has cast a greedy Akai around his record collection with the best of them. Now, with The Sunburst Band, he's decided it's time, in the words of Tony Blair, to put something back.

This album might still rely on samples for its backbone, but it actually is a band, including jazz keyboard player Jessica Lauren. Like much of this unapologetic old soul boy's music, The Sunburst Band is shamelessy retro, soaked through with echoes of Prelude and Salsoul classics. But while the whole album provides an extended homage to Greenwich Village gay discos and Essex soul weekenders, it sounds as much Hard Times as it does Paradise Garage.

The covers of club classics like Barbara Lyn's "You Make Me So Hot" and Manu Dibango's "Big Blow" are neatly rearranged into Nineties relevance, while "New York City Woman" places you squarely in the cloakroom queue for Studio 54. "What's Your Sign" rounds off the album with a delightly camp medallion man romp through the zodiac worthy of Barry White himself.

If you like your disco samples philtered and phucked in Daft Punk style, the production here might be a little clean for your tastes. But if you know your bump from your hustle, your Halston from your Gucci and Fiorucci, The Sunburst Band have brightly polished disco to go. Let's boogie.

THAT Celine Dion has got an awful lot to answer for. Not content with having enough dosh from years of peddling MOR guff to buy her own private jet, after "that" bloody song from the
"Titanic" movie, she managed to give the words "Original Soundtrack" all the appeal of dissected hamster entrails for breakfast. Wherever those two words appeared, in their wake a slew of John Williams pastiches and gloopy love songs by Whitney and Mariah was sure to follow. Which, of course, is not how it always was.

The last few years have seen a huge revival of interest in soundtrack music from the Sixties and Seventies. Maybe it was the arrival of trip hop – for example, Portishead's classic plundering of Lalo Schiffrin's "Danube Incident". Or the easy listening revival of a few years ago.
Suddenly, everyone was raiding their grandparents' record collections for that elusive old John Barry or Hugo Montenegro score.

It's that bygone era, where funk met soul met sleazy Blaxploitation skinflicks, that David Holmes clearly had in mind when he put together the score for this new George Clooney

action movie. What could, in other hands, have ended up as hopeless facsimile, is instead the funkiest killer soundtrack this side of "Reservoir Dogs". You could actually make the case for this being the follow-up album to "Let's Get Killed". Anyone who was knocked sideways by "Gritty Shaker" or Holmes' legendary Essential Mix will love it. Apart from a few classic tracks by the likes of The Isley Brothers, Willie Bobo and Dean Martin (!), it's all Holmes' work. And it's a case of Money Mark, eat your heart out. In turns seedy, doleful, rocking, dramatic and downright coolio groovy, it reeks of Hammond Organs, tragic romances in flea-bitten hotels, neon lights and gristly rain.

In 30 years time, this will probably be being fought over by sample-seeking DJs the whole world over.



Two breakbeat jazzy tracks complete a fabulous Moton return. (TF)

Our Sunshine Suite

Those happy filtering London DJs Rocky and Mark Wilkinson take a cool guitar funky approach to their second Paper release. One of those records that creeps up on you with a lovely subtle groove, unlike much of the current crop of disco-sampling tracks that have just become the nu-cheese. (TF)

Ame Strong

Tout Est Bleu Airtight

First "real house" classic for what seems like a couple of years gets a UK release and a fantastic 16B remix. Omid keeps the groove deep but hard and drives it along with a warm bassline. Francois K's original remix is there for those who missed it first time. (TF)

Freestyle Orchestra

Twi-Lite/Just Don't Understand MAW

Kenny and Louie join the disco funk. Producing acts such as Kenny Latimore and Luther probably gives the chaps a bit of studio out time to knock up "tracks" better than those who spend their lives doing it. Here, Dinosaur L's "Go Bang" and something else that goes in the Twi-Lite get the MAW treatment. Both will rock floors too scared to play the real MAW shit. (TF)

Killer 21st Century textures and a thunderous tone hook converge with pinpoint accuracy over a booming groove. Flip for searing spellbinding strings, evocative subs and typically immaculate beat manipulation.

Singles

Clear Skies V Recordings

Die turns up the heat with one of his finest in "Clear Skies". Massive from the word go with tortured string washes and dubbed-out sound FX letting rip into a crisp electronic bass hook, "Reminisce" adds lashings of crashing surges to the minimal funk tones and sultry extended keys.

Dom & Roland

Trauma

Renegade Hardware Dom follows up the excellent "Industry" album with his debut for Hardware. "Trauma" keeps to the agenda with its heavy machine rhythms and infectious crunching bass hook, speckled with typically ominous textures, "Transmissions" is an unadulterated crashing tear-out.

Total Science

Fifth Density

CIA

The Oxford duo continue the rebirth of their imprint with the deadly deep synth extensions, solid chugging beat programming and technoid bass distortion of "Fifth Density". "Radiu" heads into darker waters with its sinister strings and menacing tone hook.

Klute

Silent Weapons (Photek Remix) Cert 18

Photek transforms the "Total Self" cut "Silent Weapons" into a piercing sparse futuristic step groove peppered with subtle subsonic booms and mesmeric washes. Backed by "Blitz" from the essential "Casual Bodies" album.

Blim

Filterzone **Emotif**

Blim's seventh release for Emotif, "Filterzone" is an unrelenting distorted noisecore stomper spiced with bleeping technoid influences and thunderous bass explosions. Check "Booby Trap" for mechanical acidic floor grooving.

Various

Voyager Audio Blueprint

A double head sampler for the "Voyager" album. The VIP remix of Skynet's "Amorphia" fits the bill with reverberating noise contortion and pounding, stepping beats without straying too far from the original. Psion get bleak with the chugging atmospheric moodiness of "Airships".

Paradox

Dioxide 170873

Paradox delivers a stirring soundscape of mystical swirls and nervous stabs coupled with a complex psychotic groove. It makes a change to hear

some real work put in to drum programming, and "Give The Drummer Some" proves the point further.

DEP

The Rhythm **Urban**Takeover

Urban Takeover continue their string of hits with this strong hip hop flavoured workout from DEP, peppered with familiar guitar licks and rap snippets. Flip for some darker tendencies complete with growling synth bursts and futuristic textures.

Higher Sense

Limiter Moving Shadow

Higher Sense return to Moving Shadow with the wobbling bass madness of "Limiter" running riot over a smooth rolling workout, speckled with sci-fi washes and eerie melodics. "All Night" takes top spot with its hypnotic leaping tones, huge subs and infectious building groove.

Natural Mystic & Future Bound

Solar Level Timeless

Liverpool and Ipswich team up for this blistering minimal groover as "Solar Level"'s swinging rhythms become entwined in surreal pads, subtle tones and a booming bass hook. The Mystic one goes it alone for the exquisite "Chrome" with its tumultuous growling noise breakdown and layered beats.

Alpha Omega

DeepThoughts

Sonica

Alpha Omega moves to Italy's Sonica for the tripped-out sparse beat construction of "Deep Thoughts", laced with distant filtered synths and moody droning tones. "Journeys Through Space" adds haunting chords and extraterrestrial keys.

Seiji

Density Reinforced

Seiji continues to move forward with the spacial atmospheric Detroit-esque keys and synth harmonies of "Density emerging above a mesmeric snare groove. It gets even better with the pure sound oozing from "Tastes" repetitive chord stabs and sleazy bass tones.

Banaczech

Deceptive Emotion Partisan

A splendid double pack of deepness from Banaczech, headed by Total Science's nervous, bass crunching interpretation of "Deceptive Emotion".

From there it's on to the celestial funk of "Warm Vibes". Doubler provides some mean electronic dub and check "Pivotal" for some smooth melodic layers.

Teebone

Mr Bojangels Creative Works

Teebone brings in the live element with Bob Morgan's anxious Rhodes and Jeff Walker's frantic double bass swirling around Marc Gilmore's wild crashing drums for a thrilling funk blast. Jeff does the business again on the harder stepping floor groover "Born Under a Bad Sign".

DJ Reality

Music Maker Trouble On Vinyl Second release in quick succession for the TOV new boy DJ Reality, injecting some serious distorted bass manipulation on "Music Maker", writhing around a driving percussive backbone for some heavy, minimal floor stomping. Flip to "Raw Nerve" for more tripped-out bass manoeuvres.

Blu Mar Ten

Fall

Ascendant Grooves Blu Mar Ten continue to be one of the finer exponents of the melodic aroove with this captivating technoid affair laced with enchanting, sliding synths, sweeping extended pads and rousing drum fills. Check "Suspended Animation" for a sparser drift-out.

DJ Brockie & Ed Solo

Represents Remix Undiluted

Respected stalwart of the jungle scene, Brockie gets round to starting his own label with this hard hitting rework of "Represents" packed with manic bass crunching and filtered rap touches for a solid floor mover. "Showdown" is funkier with a momentous string intro and stepping bassline.

Dylan

Blackout

Droppin'Science Dylan combines the rough with the smooth for his latest outing as "Blackout"'s delicate keys and chugging rhythms develop into a massive crunching overdriven bass explosion. Turn to "Dogfight" for some tense textures, meaty break reverberations and penetrating acidic surges.

The guys from Solid State let loose their jazzual influences with the complex melodic delights of "74th Avenue" as harmonic layers of keys, flute, soulful strings and sleazy bass guitar gel together perfectly for an ultimate retrospective ride. "Bay Area Hustle" is full of similar niceties.



"FOR me, 1998 has been a great year. The most important thing that happened to me was that I left MFS and founded the new German label Initial, with Torsten Jurk and Pascal from Orbit. The label will focus on credible energetic dance stuff which is something of a rarity in Germany at the moment. I think this move is good for me personally and for the other artists on MFS, as too often their sound was being compared to mine when they were aiming to do something completely different.

"On the production front, the success of my mix of Binary Finary and 'For An Angel' brought me to a much wider public. That was definitely cool, and so was the amount of respect I have been shown by so many DJs, producers and the

press. I really appreciated that. "On the negative side, success can bring problems with it, namely that everybody wants a piece of you and the money you make. People have treated me badly, and I've had my stuff ripped off in cover versions, too, which hasn't been too amusing. Once you really start to make money, people start to fuck you up.

"My overriding hope for 1999 is that we can get Berlin's E-Werk open again. Because of a political dispute between the water board and the electricity board, the club was closed. Hopefully the civil servants concerned will be promoted and move on to bother someone else. It's a very frustrating situation, but if I have a Christmas wish and New Year's resolution rolled into one, it's that I'll be playing there again

They're not the cheeriest of folk, but Mood certainly know how to hook up an acoustic guitar riff, a little la-la from the ope-ra and the kind of postapocalyptic lyrical survivalism that makes headz nod that very part of their anatomy while knowledgeably scratching the hair on their chinny chin-chins.

Runaways UK

Finders Kreepers Remixes Ultimate Dilemma Thanks to that grand dame of hip hop, Joan Jett, The Runaways are now Runaways UK (plc). Which hasn't put off Spinna from mixing up an ugly "Twilight Zone" cut up breakdown out of the elements of that "Peter And The Wolf" number. We blame the parents...

DV Alias Khrist

The Attack Is On Tommy Boy Black

Busta cohort and Smoothe buddy DV does his singin' an' apocalypse bringin' act to fine effect. He's the most Southern that New York has ever sounded and for that we say "hallelujah!".

Mark B & Blade

Nobody Relates Jazz Fudge

Mark B's obsession with his bottom end is paying dividends and Blade's sense of injustice can nurture a magnificent lyrical harshness. But with "We'll Survive" coming over a little Primo-for-Jeru and "Nobody Relates" more of a rare groover, there's more variety than that would suggest.

Jay-Z

Hard Knock Life Northwestside

An "Annie" sample? Yeah, it sounds like the apogee of disgusting commercial hip hop, but if it's the 45 King behind it, things become a little different. Roots bass, space and them pesky kids on the

chorus and it works. My god, it works. The best tune Jay-Z's ever done.

Albums

Bad Azz

Word On Tha Streets Priority, USA

There are still people out West making that low riding funk and chatting about banging. Bad Azz (as the name and guests such as Snoop and Kurupt may suggest) is one of them. If you're still interested in that, then this will probably hit the mark. But to everyone else, it's going to sound tired.

Heltah Skeltah

Magnum Force

Duck Down/Priority/Virgin
The ruff'n' rugged Heltah Skeltah return and, once again, keep it sparse and dark. There are a couple of new flavours (flamenco guitar, even a little soul) but basically they have their formula and it can be pretty effective.

Various Artists

Survival Of The Illest Def.Jam

Recorded on the NY date of the Def Jam tour of the same name, here you get Cormega, Foxy, Onyx, DMX and the Def Squad (the highlight). Before buying, try to remember how good most hip hop shows are...

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Jurassic 5

Akil, from the hip hop crew who walked off with Best Album at our recent awards, on how 1998 was for him

"THE best thing that's happened to me this year is being able to pay my bills with the talent that I have. The EP had been out in the United States since November 1997, so at the start of the year we were just getting the buzz from that, doing shows in California. Then we came out to Europe in May and, man, it was just devastating! Doing all these spots from Manchester, Swansea, Scotland, Brighton – all over. The reception we got took me by surprise because the people were just so genuine. When we came back for the last show we did they told us, 'You got nominated for an award? It was like, 'Oh man!' That was beautiful. We ain't never won an award before!

"The record I've loved this year is Black Star's album. They have the same focus as us, but a different path. Hove them. On a broader note, I'm glad the government is being exposed in America - the Clinton thing. I really don't care if he's impeached. Him in office or out

of office, it's still the same shit. "Oh yeah, and I hooked up with this guy, Monster Kody. He wrote this book 'Monster', an autobiography of an LA gang member. If you really wanna know what gang life in Los Angeles is like, read that book and you'll understand the trials and tribulations and the things we go through in America.

The other highlight - do you remember the guy that hit Reginald Denny with that brick during the riots? That was my friend that hit him. He got out of jail this year. And he's a changed person. So that was beautiful - me being able to connect with him."



Lo Fidelity Allstars

Battleflag

Wade through The Wrekked Train's (he's the "singer") turgid, cod surrealist vocal nonsense and you'll discover a big-bellied slab of mid-pace funk which waddles across your decks like an obstreperous teenager with a fat wrap of sulphate and a situationist textbook in his pockets. Lo-fi, high-fat thrills. (KB)

Psychedeliasmith

Athletico

Been hankering after a record which sounds like a tussle between Monk & Canatella, "Mathar", a 303 and The Grateful Dead? Hanker no more. Psychedeliasmith's latest is a profoundly psychedelic off-centre affair which conjures fascinating shapes after a good toke, but which may have you nervously eyeing the bar if you're on the floor. (KB)

Wax Assassins

Waxadelica Easy DB

A groove as deep as the San Andreas fault with nods to Daft Punk and crowdpulverising, Deejay Punk-Roc-style oomph. At times, however, those highly suspect synth twiddles sound like vintage Jean-Michel Jarre. "Rockin' 2 Da Rhythm" on the flip is an excitable trawl through well-charted big beat waters and somewhat irritating. (KB)

Phat Funkateers

Back In The Dayz

Sheffield's NY Sushi launch their label with four functional cuts straddling the dark arts of drum & bass and vocal-free dancefloor hip hop. All cuts work, though the booms and brass of "Flip The Mic" will appeal most readily, while "Back In The Dayz", a mischievous jungle cut, rinses like a Hotpoint mainlining the National Grid. (KB)

Supercharger

Punk Skunk Funk EP China

Four tracks of spirited big beat au naturel, three of which are roughly 348 bpm faster than they ought to be. Still, their cover of Public Image Limited's "Public Image" is neither a bad idea or a horribly executed sham and is certainly worth banging your head against a brick wall for several minutes to, if that's your thing. (KB)

Preacher Gus Versus The Roundheads

On A 45 white label Possibly this year's most mindless, idiotic and dangerously irresponsible tune. These are, of course, compliments: "On A 45", currently circulating on one-sided white label, consists of little more than machine-gunning breaks, a bass drop the size of East Anglia and what sounds curiously like Joe Strummer bellowing "heavy metal" repeatedly. No wonder Norman Cookis a fan. (KB)

Buzuka

Fly Mother Octagon

Another label making a debut this month

Octagon, the breakbeat offshoot of armour-plated junglist stable Trouble On Vinyl. But don't expect moody tech overload, as "Fly Mother" boasts twangy, guitar-led dynamics and an ingratiating sense of humour, even if they can't resist exceeding the speed limit. Junglists these days, eh? (KB)

Mr Natural

Rubberneck

Critical Mass Wilfully daft goonery from the man who profited massively from Norman Cook's patronage of his "That Green Jesus" 303 workout. This is poppier fare, all weedling guitar lines, gurgling synths and yelling, but its self-congratulatory ker-razziness is a huge turn-off, all told. (KB)

Voice Stealer

Electromotive Force Subvert

Carl Finlow demonstrates how close techno and electro really are by merging the two very successfully with this single taken from his excellent "All Electric House" long player. It's minimal, well produced, forward thinking noir electro with enough action to keep your interest. A couple of the cuts are fast enough for those of you addicted to speed.

Lucci Daddo Fuzz Orchestra

Rokk Duurge white label

The A-side is true to its title but luckily on the B-side Eruption honcho Kris Needs takes you on a no-nonsense hard electro journey with tough, driving beats and a distorted lead noise. A definite party track with enough energy to light up Oxford Street at Christmas. (RP/AF)

Subphonic

Vega Beach Party

Subphonic (formerly known as Hybrid, but changed cos of the Hybrid on Distinctive) return harder and darker than ever. Injecting a lethal sting of twisted funk to any dancefloor. On the flip is the wicked "Rogue Electric" and a Tipper remix which is one of the best things he's done. (RP/AF)

Mondo Paradiso

Mezza Luna Opaque Stereo So far drum & bass producer III's foray into the world of breakbeat has been 100% successful. His remix of "Mezza Luna" is no exception. He manages to combine space with rolling beats,

copious amounts of bass, plenty of

melody and he kicks arse on the dancefloor. Very, very classy stuff indeed. (RP/AF)

Chrome Yellow **Communications**

Interesting collaboration of visual artists and their musical counterparts. Two tracks in two different mixes and tempos with plenty of originality and variety. The emphasis is on deep rather than banging. Clever psychedelic electronica with superb artwork and plenty of unusual ideas in the mix. (RP/AF)

Weekend Favourites EP

Sydney-based Thunk bring out their first release available in the UK. As is often the case with Johnny Foreigner's tracks, no-one's told them that to cross-fertilize genres round these parts is punishable by death. The Alien label has made its mark for its very technological electronic sound. This latest release is an innovative meeting between tech-house and West Coaststyle acid breakbeat.

Matt Cantor from the outfit voted Best Band at our recent awards, talks us through the last 12 tumultuous months

"I'VE watched The Freestylers go from being a glorified Bar Mitzvah act with two blokes playing samplers, a couple of mates breakdancing and me MCing on the mic down at Friction to standing in the crowd at Reading, pogoing with thousands of others and watching the Freestylers play as a whole live band - all in the space of the last year. It's been amazing watching the operation tighten up. I've given up playing live now. I've got more of a tendency to go overboard than the others, so I needed to get away from playing live and then partying in all the shitty venues we toured in the first half of the year. I've calmed down a lot, actually. I needed some time off and went to Tenerife with the missus, where we


saw dolphins swimming in the sea. That was incredible. Still, the highlight of the year was playing live at Glastonbury, although managing

The old hardcore classic from '91 gets yet another crack of the whip thanks to Floorplay's huge Mobile Bitch mix, which first turned up as a bootleg several months ago. It's here alongside Knuckleheadz'even more awesome remix, plus 1997 mixes from Sharp and Baby Doc. One hell of a package.

Singles Digital Masters

The Fifth Element Phoenix Uprising Originally released on producers Graham Eden and Rachel Shock's own Shock imprint, "The Fifth Element" was quickly licensed by Jon The Dentist, who turns in one of his most exciting remixes in ages. Jon's mix builds brilliantly to an uplifting climax that shows plenty of teeth thanks to a very infectious riff. Both of the originals are also included, making this a great value for money package.

Trauma

Tidy Trax

Paul King ends a hugely successful year for him (two killer singles on Tripoli Trax, one on TdV and a host of devastating remixes) with his debut for Tidy Trax, taking his better known F1 winning recipe and adding a couple of fresh ingredients to spice things up. They don't come much tastier than this.

D-Monsta

There's Some Disco Fans Here Tonight Episode Records, USA If you like the discotastic grooves on Alan Thompson's Sublime label, then this is something well worth checking out. Robbie Riviera and Richard F provide the mixes that matter, with all manner of funky filtering going on, but not in the stale and tired way that so many producers have bored us with this year. Ideal warm-up material.

Radical Playaz

Release number three from Tall Paul's burgeoning stamp is a Stonebridge and Vito Benito creation that was big on import earlier this year thanks to a funky guitar riff borrowed from Ohio Players' "Love Rollercoaster". The original mixes will be followed by a second 12-inch with the more desirable "Rubber Dub" mix from Dave Aude - a breezy and bouncy affair with a big bassline, nagging synths and not too much of that sample.

Cadenza

Trading Faces Friction Burns

Madame Friction and Robert Burns have been on a bit of a roll this year and their latest release continues their policy of refusing to pull any punches. This collaboration with Ben Keen was originally released on the now defunct Shift label, and resurfaces with very worthwhile new mixes. Pick of the bunch is a relentless and pounding assault from Razor Babes

Mankey

Slamm

The recent Next Generation single marked a welcome departure from Slamm's dated Euro-trash formula, and thankfully the new Mankey single follows suit. Blending crisp percussion, a bumping bassline, simple stabs and a familiar hook, this effective groover shuffles along very nicely, thank you.

RR Fierce Versus Amino

Alien Trax

Respected hard house producer RR Fierce teams up with Max and Amino for a delightful double-header. On the Aside Amino takes centre stage with the galloping "Keep On", a punter-friendly cut that should appeal to all manner of jocks. On the flip, Max's superior "Alien Gate Scandal" fuses fierce rumbling bass with metallic drum sounds, punchy stabs and a savage hoover. Wicked.

Chopper

Jo & Lisa MRM

Following the success of the cocaineridiculing "Seven Hours In A Bathroom" (which has been signed by the Neo label), Chopper return with a party house anthem that will still fill floors, but doesn't win too many points in the originality stakes, as it borrows heavily from the recent Big Noddy hit "Slut (I Like To Be Naked)".

Billie

She Wants You Innocent

Hit number three from Billie comes with two collectable mixes that will fit into your set. Those ever loveable Sharp Boys turn in a tough tribal workout that doesn't disappoint, with Cevin Fisher also coming up trumps with a loosely rolling funky house mix with disco overtones. Both mixes come with (surprisingly okay) full vocals, but I'm sure there will be dubs too.

Harry "Choo Choo" Romero

Presents Inava Day Just Can't Get Enough Subliminal Records, USA The voice behind the Boris Dlugosch hit "Keep Pushin" teams up with Harry for a Latin-tinged tribal house workout. Flip it over to find a deeper and darker twisted dub that will suit those who occasionally travel into Tenaglia territory. Ace.

Chiller Productions

Perfect Every Time

City Grooves

Another slammer from the Chiller crew. The predecessor "Popular Place" is one of the best tunes of the year and this follows suit: quirky rap samples, big plopping sub bass and frantic beats meshed together before really erupting after the breakdown.

NEVER LOST HIS HARDCORE

Floorplay Joey – Help Me Automatic

The Floorplay boys follow their NRG bootleg with a single that marks a major shift in direction for Automatic. The "Mobile Bitch" remix is the one to watch tough, rattling beats drive a seductively stabbed groove which builds and drops at every opportunity. The "Mobile Bitch Trade Mix" is probably less suited to Trade lovers, adding guitar effects and a more progressive house slant.

Twisted Angel

white label

From the same people as the above track comes an addictive little white that will no doubt be snapped up quickly. Powerful percussion and a pumping bass combine before the piercing synth stabs and a catchy "Feel it" vocal come into the fray and make it something to remember. Well worth seeking out.

Signum

Pressure

The follow up to the awesome "What Ya Got 4 Me" is also licensed from Jinx. Remix honours here go to the ever reliable Baby Doc, who turns in one of his trademark dark and doom-laden mixes that's already going down a storm with DJs like lan M.

Tom Wax & Jan Jacarta Wormhole '98

Tetsuo, Germany

A classic from late last year revisited with new mixes from Jan Jacarta and Marino Stephano, who both do the original justice. This is worth buying solely for the new track "Get Back In Da Groove" which will suit all those who like it hard, fast and sweaty.

Triple

Deep House Southeast

Like the second Southeast single from LAC, "Deep House" is another old Trade classic. New mixes come from the ubiquitous Untidy Dubs and Paul King. The former turn in one of their best ever remixes and Paul King goes for the no-nonsense approach. Buy two copies and keep yourself happy.

Pete Wardman

Lizard Queen Tripoli Trax

Two absolutely amazing tracks from the Kiss FM and Trade supremo for his debut on the world's best hard house label. Both "Lizard Queen" and 'Tragically Glamorous" are delivered in

Wardman's sublime and sexy style the former edging out in front thanks to the hilarious sample of Lisa Simpson telling us "I am the lizard queen".

Year In The

Untidy Dubs

Amo, Paul and Andy from Tidy Trax recall the year when everyone went crazy for Untidy Dubs

"THINGS started going crazy for us just after we released the first Untidy Dubs EP. We set up a new label, Untidy Trax, for this new sound we had, which is like the earliest house sound toughened up for the Nineties. It's a minimal, yet acceptable drum & bass house style that's most definitely not speed garage. You can tell it's made an impact by the number of people who've copied us. I suppose that's a compliment for our fresh new sound."

Within two weeks the first Untidy Dubs EP had outsold almost every Tidy Trax release. Everyone from Tony De Vit to Judge Jules went mad for "Funky Groove" and the latter then licensed it for release on Manifesto.

"We were caught short by the success of Volume 1, so the second volume was a stocking filler. We found we were moving too fast with the third volume a year later and people are still going crazy for the first one.

"We now get offered up to three remixes a week and we try

not to turn any down. Our favourites were Westbam and DJ Quicksilver, and we are currently working on Dina Carroll and Loop Da Loop.

"It's been such a busy, frustrating and hectic 365 days that we've had little time to do anything but work. Amo describes 1998 as an up and down, in and out year - a bit like his sex life! Our favourite records were Signum's mix of Yves Deruyter and F1's "Cuz I'm Rockin". "Something About Mary" and "LA Confidential" are two of the enjoyable films we got a chance to see.

"Our biggest achievement was the launch and success of the Untidy Trax label, and the new label deal we have done with Jason Nevins for the States. Our highlight was the opportunity and privilege to work with Tony De Vit. His tragic death has had a huge effect on us and he is greatly missed."





Mark Ambrose

Further proof, if any were needed, that when he's on form the South Coast boy wonder is right up there with the best of 'em. Perfectly balancing his cutting edge beats and basslines with an instantly accessible, impossibly funky sensibility, Ambrose has done it again. An

Deep otherwordly future jazz from a new imprint aimed at fans of labels like Op-Art and 2000 Black. Already a fave with quality spinners like Kirk Degiorgio, Dego and Mixmaster Morris, the four tracks here utilise elements of techno, drum & bass and electro while somehow managing to sound like nothing else. Armchair astral projection for pre-millennium be-boppers and space age nu-bohemians

Various Artists

Katzen EP District Six

Four tracks of forward looking atmospheric dancefloor techno which serve as a taster to the forthcoming "Buckingham Palace" album. LA Synthesis offer up typically expansive 808 powered escapades, Electrospy comes over all melancholy, The Horn gets quirky and ADJ goes deep into Black Dog-esque Latino mode. Far out and thoroughly worthwhile.

Rob Pearson

untitled

Online Collective Drum & bass producer Rob Pearson with one of his occasional forays into Detroit tinged techno. As you might expect the basslines are on the large side, but better still the snares are imbued with that certain funkiness that only fat Americans and moody looking jungle bods seem capable of capturing properly.

Florence

The California EP

Eevolute

Although it's generally accepted that mid Eighties Euro-disco was a huge influence on techno, decent homages to that groundbreaking era are almost non-existent. Until now that is, because what you get here is the spirit and sound of acts like Boytronic, Telex, Alexander Robotnick and Koto reactivated and reshaped for late Eighties dancefloor consumption. Absolutely splendid.

John Tejada

Genre EP Palette, USA

If you've liked some of Tejada's previous material but found that it doesn't always work that well in the mix then this ought to keep you happy. Effortlessly switching from deep minimal techno to Moroder-style electronic disco via some stripped down elastic robo-funk, this is easily his most club friendly effort for some time.

Keith Tucker

Automation EF Puzzlebox, USA

Losing patience with Tucker for repeating himself too much? Then this may restore your faith. Okay, so two of the tracks are pretty much the same old thing, but the brilliant "Oscillator" makes up for that with its spooky strings, housey bassline and haunting quasi-subliminal textures.

Buckfunk 3000

Fried Funk & Microchips

Language Some people think we shouldn't review records like this on the techno page. But if techno still means having the balls to break the rules and the talent to create your own style then this is at least 10,000 times more techno than all that hopelessly crap, irritatingly funkless drivel that often passes for "the real thing". Fuck the purists, let's party.

Mobile Space Unit

Snakeman

Electrocute, Germany The third release on a new label that seems determined to drag electro kicking and screaming into the Nineties and beyond. The beats are super tough and highly contemporary, the sounds are warped in that most techno of ways and the whole thing is more Matthew B than Aux 88. Proper club music.

The Advent

Warhead Tortured

With clattering drums, rapid fire hats and wonky off beat hooks all falling in and out of the mix with deft precision,

"Warhead" has all the ingredients of a surefire techno smash and as such it's bound to do well. However, if you like a little less bang and a bit more funk, the flipside is the one.

Andy Heart

Qwerty

More lo-fi experimental alchemy from one of London's most unusual and uncompromising talents. The beats are disjointed, the textures are dangerously warped and the overall effect is like the soundtrack to an all-out alien invasion.

Selway

They understand that the less layered a record is, the better it'll sound in the mix and consequently this bass-heavy groover is sure to please the ever expanding tech-house massive who, let's face it, like nothing more than a long, satisfying, seamless mix.

Plasmek, Italy Top drawer cutting edge electroid madness from the series that gave us Anthony Rother's brilliant "Destroy Him My Robots". Keith Tucker does his Detroit bass thang, Ra-X goes deep into the experimental vortex while Marco Passarani hits the dancefloor.

Pick of the bunch though is the Autechre-meets-Richard James funky weirdness of Frame's aptly named "Abstract 3132".

April Denmark A curious album which takes in everything from lush otherwordly electronica and clean pristine synth pop to deep fluid house and atmospheric technotica. The production is so spotlessly shiny that analogue freaks might be put off, but there is nevertheless a certain synthetic charm to these silicon harmonies and gently unfolding digital beats.

Solo artist, restaurateur, Shamen rapper and supremo at The End – Mr C's had a hectic year

"THE year's gone really well. It's been very hard work but at the same time it's been very rewarding. The high points have been releasing my debut solo single and being able to use my own name again and also releasing the last Shamen album. I think it's the most progressive thing we've ever done and because it's the last album, it's like the end of an era.

"Which brings us on to the Mr C and Robert Owens project which I'm really excited about. We got on really well and we'll definitely be working together a lot more To me Robert Owens is the greatest house singer ever, I've worshipped his stuff over the years so I'm really pleased that it's an ongoing project.

"Doing The End sound system has been fantastic as well, we've worked all over the world this year. We do real four deck mixing with two mixers, so basically decks one and two are in control and decks three and four are ancillary. We rotate every 20 minutes so there's always a minimum of two records playing at any time. It makes it all sound so much fatter. Opening aka (The End's

restaurant/bar) has been a real high point too.

"The Shamen ending was definitely a low point but it had run its course and it was time to move on. It was still sad'cos it did a lot for me and my career. Also closing down Plink Plonk was quite difficult, but my biggest downer this year was my old accountant fucking up. I had to go back over four whole years of incomings and outgoings in one hit which was murder.

"The general pace of my work rate has been hard too but on the whole it's been brilliant and all the hard work has been really rewarding. Around the world we've been really well received and I love working with Layo and Matthew ('Bushwaka' B) and feel that I've had a fantastic year. I'm very lucky and very fortunate to be in the position that I'm in at the moment so that I can move on to next year and do other things. It's been great for my spirituality and my career, all in all."

It's a while since we had some brand new material from this cult soulster that's been worth shouting about, but that's all about to change. Leon is one of that rare breed of singer/songwriters who has the ability to pour out his feelings and turn the ladies in the house into emotional wrecks.

"IT'S been a blinding year, Danny and I have been really busy. We finished the 187 Lockdown album and started the follow up, began producing the Nu Birth album, we've also been writing songs for other people, and we've been going in a bit of a new direction, more r&b-based. There's been a bit of a backlash against the scene which isn't really fair. You've got to give music a chance to breathe but the media seem to get bored of things really quickly. "Meeting [society 'It Girl'] Tara Palmer-Tomkinson at the Muzik awards was excellent. Turns out she's a big fan of 'Gunman'. Did she approach me? Let's just say our eyes met across the dancefloor [swoons]. We went to Germany and Canada to do promotion, which was fun. We expected Germany to be really technoish, but the people were really responsive to our stuff. The same for Canada, which is the most amazing place I've ever been to. Shooting the videos for Gunman' and 'Kung Fu' was fun.

We're massive Benny Hill fans and Danny collects moustaches, so he finally got the chance to use one. We just want to put some humour back into music. There definitely isn't enough humour in the scene. We've been doing this for the best part of 10 years and people have just got to lighten up a bit. We manage to have fun -Danny and I must have seen each other every day for the last two years and it gels really well.

"This has been a quality year for music as well. American music has come back strong,

especially things like Jazz'n' **Groove and 95** North. It's good to hear the sound of old records coming back. Seventies and Eighties music is my thing and it's good for people to hear things that were made 20 years ago."

"IT'S been a really busy year for me and the band. Our album went gold in the UK and my second child Kiki was born. She was about the only release date that didn't change on our schedule. It was funny because a few months later when we were on tour in Belgium the customs wouldn't let us leave because they thought I'd kidnapped my own baby. We got out of it in the end.

"It has been very hard work doing the tour but we've played some wicked gigs and met some people that I've wanted to meet for ages. I've even danced with Bobby Womack and Jason Priestley. The best club we played at was Fletcher's in Baltimore which is the smallest gig of our career (so far!) with only 300 people. It was really laid back though and we had fun. We played in Minneapolis after that and that was very weird. It turned into this strange S&M thing after the show with a man dressed up in a rubber policeman's outfit gently slapping a handcuffed and

blindfolded woman with a

feather duster. Strange.

Lead singer Skye tells how chill out's finest coped with this year

"The highlight of the live shows must have been playing to a sold out show in Italy for 2000 people and then being presented with our 'Disco Di Platino' platinum disc for sales over there. That was easily as exciting as going to the Sound Factory in New York where we saw Puff Daddy play. It was a real pop star glamour night with loads of free champagne. I just wish I could have had some more quality time with my friends this year as we've been on the road for eight months. All I want to do now, for Christmas, is go to a little island in the middle of nowhere with not a single trace of tinsel or fairy lights. But actually I've got to learn how to work my laptop computer too."

Buried Treasure

Diving for pearls in an ocean of tunes



The Dust Brothers Song To The Siren Junior Boys Own, 1993

BACK in 1993 breakbeats didn't have the best reputation. Tainted by years of ravetastic abuse from hardcore producers and forgotten by a house scene journeying ever further up a trance tunnel, it seemed everyone had forgotten the

simple joys of a booming bassline and a butt-shaking drumbeat stolen from some long-forgotten funk record. Then in 1993 Andy Weatherall started playing this strange record. Blasting in with ear drum-tearing sirens, it mangled an angular, disjointed breakbeat at a house tempo with a weird techno bassline and a distorted vocal beamed in from some shoegazing indie record. It sounded like nothing on Earth. It still doesn't. The record was "Song To The Siren" by The Dust Brothers.

The pair behind this obscure white label were Manchester University students Tom Rowlands and Ed Simons. The title was nicked from an Eighties indie record by This Mortal Coil, the artist name from the hip hop producers behind Young MC and The Beastie Boys' "Paul's Boutique". The pilfered names summed up the record perfectly: two blokes raised on indie and hip hop making a smash and grab raid on both. The result was both outrageously original and utterly derivative, a skewiff tribute to Mantronix's 1988 breakbeat B-side "King Of The Beats".

Weatherall picked up the boys' debut single for Junior Boys Own, along with two turbo-powered Sabres Of Paradise mixes. A year later they followed "Song To The Siren" with the "14th Century Sky" EP, where acid house was thrown into the mix along with the breakbeats. Heavenly gave the pair the chance to air their record collections at their new night down the pub, the Sunday Social. Even before the original American Dust Brothers forced the pair to go Chemical, the Brothers were already working it out. And more importantly, the breakbeat was back.



on hunting down rare vinyl

The record buyer's guide to:

African Rhythms

OW often have you checked that wicked percussive break on that funky new house record you've just purchased and thought, "Hmmm... I wonder where they got that from?" Well, more often than not those cool grooves go way back in time and originate in some form or other from Africa.

Of course, pretty much all of the Black American music of this century – blues, gospel, jazz, soul, funk, fusion, etc – can be traced back along the family tree to their roots in traditional African songs and rhythms with a fair degree of tinkering, experimentation, and no shortage of passion and soul along the way.

As popular music in its own right, it is mainly the Nigerian juju music from the early Seventies onwards that most people in Britain are more familiar with. The homegrown African rhythms started to be incorporated into the heavy funk sounds coming across the Atlantic from America. The first real crossover hit was Manu Dibango's "Soul Makossa" in 1972, a frantic funky tune that became a cult record on the early New York disco scene, has been endlessly covered and re-released and still rips it up on dancefloors today.

Also crossing boundaries with his funky Afrobeat grooves around the same time was Fela Anikulapo Kuti, the Nigerian band leader, saxophonist and political activist who has a body of work which spans at least 70 plus albums. James Brown once described him as his African equivalent. Fela is best known among the dance fraternity for "Shakara", an awesome 20 minute monster groove which is still bootlegged and sampled, most recently on Afro Elements' "Lagos Jump". Following the man's death last year, prices have rocketed on classic Fela albums, like "Expensive Shit", "Upside Down" and "Black President". Demand in New York and Tokyo particularly is reaching daft proportions. CD fans can now find albums like these as mid price two-for-one purchases from any good world music section, but that doesn't really help the vinyl junkies out there.

Other artists worth checking include Plunky and The Oneness Of Juju, who's once rare "African Rhythms" album has just been re-released. From South Africa, singer Letta Mbulu made some rocking horse-rare funk tracks and cool jazz in the late Sixties, while trumpeter Hugh Masekela's career ranges from tough jazz in the early Seventies right through to the leftfield garage of his 1983 electro soul cut "Don't Go Lose It Baby".

Mandingo weren't an African band at all, but a bunch of UK session musicians, whose easy listening funk owed a heavy debt to the motherland. The same could be said of Matata, whose one album for UK label President still fetches big bucks.

A good starting point for this bottomless pit of compulsive dance music is the new "Funky Africa" compilation on Harmless. Some of the dance specialist shops sell reissues and, ahem, "special" represses. To touch the tip of the iceberg, here's a selection of the more sought after tracks by both the garage and the funk underground.







For those in the know, an Eighties club biggie with the funky B-side "Love You Forever".

Soca-flavoured Afro disco with heavy dub effects.

The Coachhouse Rhythm Section "Timewarp" (Ice Records 12-inch 1977) £20

Okay, okay, it's not African but it's on a very similar tip. This

hypnotic New York club anthem from Eddy Grant (yes, him) was 10 years ahead of its time.

MUZIK SAYS: For too long the tech-house sound has been restricted to clubs like Wiggle, Heart & Soul, Subterrain and Whoop Whoop, but now the sound is breaking out of the underground thanks to the support of jocks like Sasha, John Digweed and Danny Tenaglia. Clubs like Tyrant are booking Terry Lee Brown Jnr, while a growing amount of Bedroom Bedlam entries are coming from you blending tech-house as warm-up into epic progressive sounds as the clean up. Proof that it works comes in our latest winning tape from Simon Tilbury of Bedford, even though the over-use of cuts from The Timewriter suggests that he may have just discovered how these two sounds can work well together. He opens with around five cuts from the German master, with the classic KOT release on Yoshitoshi dropped in for good measure. It all builds well in preparation for Sasha & BT's rework of Madonna's "Substitute For Love", which is when the tape really kicks off. Despite an apalling record from Social Security, the rest of the tape is spot on Amnesia, as Paul Van Dyk's unbeatable "For An Angel" has you reminiscing about Cream's main room at the birthday party. Also featured are Agnelli & Nelson, Jose Padilla's work with Chicane, before Tilbury drops down the pace with a closing cut from The Timewriter again. The mixing is basic, but he's certainly more than capable of holding his own at any Muzik club night. If one tape represents how times are-a-changing out there on the nation's dancefloor, it's this tape from Simon Tilbury. Congratulations are in order.


Some people don't care what the prices are, they just

"ON Saturday September 13, 1986, the

Astoria Theatre in

London experienced a brand new adventure in night clubbing. Delirium opened as a new Saturday nighter to a hungry crowd. The opening party featured LL Cool J, Run DMC, The Beastie Boys and Whodini all jamming live together in front of 2500 ecstatic punters. Delirium changed its theme every week presenting house and camp disco acts alongside the rare groove scene. Transvestites would swing across the stage while BMX bikers, acrobats and fire eaters performed. Chuck Brown & The Soul Searchers, Marshall Jefferson, Frankie Knuckles, Schooly D, Virgo, Fingers Inc and Terence Trent D'Arby all played.

Inspired by the Paradise Garage in New York, we were discovering house and disco to the dismay of a narrow-minded hip hop audience. A special cage had to be built around the DJ booth to protect us from the cans and bottles and abuse dished out by the junior Chuck Ds in the crowd. We realised we must be doing something right so took the plunge and moved to Thursdays at Heaven.

The main floor rocked exclusively to house, we hosted parties upstairs for Boy George and Mick Jones. The hip hop moodys had the middle floor to themselves with Afrika Bambaataa and Cash Money and elsewhere topless trannies danced in a haze of smoke and lights. Many would-be promoters learnt the ropes there.



One more massive Delirium took place but it





Will 1 get in? We only charge admission on Friday and Saturday nights. Fridays is £2 after 10pm, £4 after 11pm and Saturdays £2 after 10pm, £5 after 11pm. We don't have a specific dress code, basically it's anything goes. Well, anything but tramps.





Techno takes on the North – and wins

TOMIC JAM, The Orbit, Pure, Slam, Lost and Bugged Out are all techno institutions which will never go away. Serving different corners of the UK, all have survived suggestions of recession or the supposed demise of techno. Take Bugged Out. What once was a weekly affair at Sankey's Soap in Manchester has now moved along with Golden's Jon Hill to Cream. The geographical difference between the two cities has has had no effect. Tonight, the second Bugged Out event at Cream is mobbed, enough to move Cream director James Barton to state: "These bastards are more popular than us!" Not quite true seeing as Bugged Out is monthly, but the club is rammed with the kind of crowd Garnier and Cox used to pull into the Annexe three years ago. Taking punters from all surrounding areas, tonight peaks with the return of the techno twins. Cox tears apart the Courtyard with technical proficiency, demonstrating why he is still unbeatable. With Cox, records are secondary, as people respond to the mixing and not the original sounds.

Next door, Garnier makes a rare appearance, using the opportunity to drop two cuts from his new CD, both of which prove to be the highpoints of his set. A walk to the Annexe finds Adam Freeland's perfectly-tailored breakbeat set going down a storm, compromising his often-esoteric set to introduce people to his advanced sounds. Bob Sinclar bottles it at the last minute and cancels, further proof that the industry is right to rally round our cover star Thomas Bangalter.

Cream have made an astute move drafting in these boys (the world's best techno DJs at half the price) and Bugged Out has moved on to become a superclub. Proof that taking techno to the masses does work.

London garage delights for gay boys and girls

E'RE in south London and Spoony is on the decks. No surprise there. Look around and there's a good mix of black and white faces. No surprise again. But some of the guys have got their tops off. Hmmm. Not much champagne or slick tailoring in evidence here and two of the guys are snogging. Twice As Nice it ain't. Queer Nation is one of London's longest-running gay clubs, and like the better-known Trade it has lasted because it concentrates firstly on the music. But while Trade plays it tough, Queer Nation has always played it funky, with dollops of throbbing garage.

"It's the music of the melting pot," says promoter Patrick Lilley. The night starts with startlingly good US deep house from Luke Howard, then Jeffrey Hinton takes it back to Britain with underground garage and finishes with Supadon's disco grooves.

Tonight Spoony and Matt "Jam" Lamont are guesting. You can tell how much a guest enjoys their spot by how they DJ, and Spoony is in his element. The crowd mirrors the music – a glorious melting pot, yelping to choice tunes and dancing beyond dawn. Spoony drops the garage mix of George Michael's "Outside" and it fits like a glove. The music is so organic you could grow tomatoes the Prince of Wales could eat without a murmur and... well, this is the best club in Britain.

You're not supposed to like garage if you're gay, you're supposed to train at the gym every night and listen to prance (gay trance, stupid). Equally, you're not supposed to be gay if you're black. The massive cultural bias against something seen as anti-macho still exists and the concept of just going to a club and maybe having a few spliffs instead of getting pilled off your head is, if not alien, then underground. Thank God.

Queer Nation has just celebrated its eighth birthday, so how much longer can it last? "Underground clubs can last longer," says Patrick. But would he rather be bigger? Apparently not. "Wembley isn't the final destination of a successful club," he insists. "Brixton is."

Eight years and counting. You know he's doing something right.





Goldie - Live

Metalheadz at Heaven, London

Can the king of drum & bass reclaim his crown?

ROOVERIDER may have wowed more dancefloors. DJ Rap may have grabbed more column inches. But Goldie, as comeback king Gary Glitter might have put it, is still the leader of the drum & bass gang. The fact that Heaven is heaving tonight (at a hefty £17.50 a head, too) proves as much. A loyal lot, these drum & bassheads. And they are to be rewarded. As indeed anyone who actually exchanged honest cash money for the lumpy excesses of "Saturnz Return" deserves to be. Therefore, there's little trace of either said prize vinyl turkey or the uncomfortable ramble that used to pass for his live show. The gaggle of musos who used to inhabit the stage appear to have been given their P45s and told to shove their jazz-wank solos where the Sun Ra don't shine. With only a bassist and keyboard player for company, Goldie is forced into the spotlight, the place he belonged all along. Where once he would linger self-consciously in the shadows, now he roams the stage, stripped to the waist and glistening with sweat. He even manages to turn "Mother", suitably stripped to an infinitely preferable seven minutes, into something engaging and passionate. Will wonders never cease? Far better, though, is the wealth of material from G's latest offering "Ring Of Saturn". Tracks like "Hyena" and "Kaiser Soze" mark the new territory out perfectly messy but urgent breaks tumbling out one after the other, rave stabs that would be retro if only they hadn't been so sadistically sharpened. It's these moments that really rock the crowd, as opposed to, say, the still-too-long "Inner City Life". Thankfully, they are in ready supply tonight. So, while it might be nice to tell your mates you saw Noel Gallagher pop in to wheeze and grunt his way though encore "Temper Temper", tonight still feels much more about burying Goldie's mainstream-courting past than praising it. This time the raver really has returned.
