I often start my sets with a helicopter sample," says Lottie of the Apocalypse Now effect you'll hear at the beginning of this month's Muzik CD. "If someone's playing hard before me it's a good way to bridge the gap before I start."

Lottie loves the smell of New Jersey and nu-jacking Chicago house in the

morning. Her mix is packed with "records that stay in my head when I wake up in the morning. I can't wait to play tracks like 'Freak' when I get up!"

Recorded in one take (no computers) at Lottie's Joint, her London recording den, this house mix is a one-hour snapshot of where her head is at right now. Mixed on two turntables with the aid of a Pioneer DJM600 ("it's really good for delays and flanging. I love my flanging!"), the only problem was deciding what order to put the tracks in.

"I worked back to front," she reveals. "I knew I wanted the jacking Chicago bit in the middle so I just went from there."

Delving into her freshest slates, the mix unfolds with the carnival beats of Blakkat's 'Aztec Acid' before sliding into the sunshine house of lan Pooley's 'Quattro' and the rumbling San Fran sub-bass menace of DJ Rasoul's 'Oh Baby'. Working together material from Stateside labels like Om and Siesta as well as UK imprints like NRK and City Rockers, the energy peaks with 'Magic K' by Master H -Soma's secret summer weapon - and the classic filter shimmer of 'You' by Tiefschwarz. All in all, it's a compulsive, acidic late night adventure.

"I'm 29 and I've been doing this for 12 years," says Lottie emphatically, "so if a record's gonna rock my world, it has to stir something in me. All these records have that element."

TRACK BY TRACK

1 Blakkat Aztec Acid

"A very new record from Mark Bell that's already an important part of my set. This is a dark acid adventure "He's got the most amazing hats that builds and builds. It doesn't have any big bass - it's quite top-endy - but it does have a real building loop in it, which is why it's such a good place to start."

2 Ian Pooley

Quatro

"I've been playing this for a long time 6 Davidson Ospina but I never get sick of it. It's very cool and subtle and has a quacking sound all the way through. lan did a great mix of Daft Punk's 'Burnin" a couple of years ago but this is definitely his finest solo venture!"

3 DJ Rasoul

Oh Baby

"A big record for me, not least because the vocals stay in your head. The original mix is completely the one - a very dirty record that sounds like the old Chicago stuff. Proper filthy house that makes me shake my ass."

4 Josh Wink

Superfreak

"It's the most unique record I've heard in a year - it's so simple but everyone likes it. I heard a

progressive DJ play it in Greece, but someone like Jon Carter can play it too. It's just so niggly and beautifuly produced. The perfect DJ tool."

Henpecked

and I don't mean the ones you wear! He uses techno hi-hats in house records, which makes them sound really jacking. His percussion is very strong but his forte is definitely the way he uses hi-hats. The obscure vocal on this really works, too."

I Need More (Original Mix) "Another jacking record that's very bouncy, this sounds like a Sneak record from a couple of years ago. I always play this and the Lab Rats track together because they just sound so good in the mix. I like to have a 25-minute section where there's cut-up Derrick Carter disco madness, and that's what this section does."

7 Lab Rats

Love Jam

"Sexy and saxy! I didn't know it was the Lab Rats for ages - both sides are diverse and odd but the sax always does it for me. It's sexy but it's beautifully done, very East Coast. A very New Yorky club record in the classic sense."

8 Penn & Jabato

Percussive Vibe (Maya Dub) "My favourite record for about five months. It's so simple and does nothing at all but I could listen to it over and over again. I just want to hear it constantly - I'll be playing it for another year. I always dance to this. . . it's just awesome!"

9 Loose Heads

Like This (Dub)

"This to me is a hit. This dub was on the B-side and I think a lot of DJs missed it. It's one of those records that's kind of bubbling but equally it's an unusual, powerful record. This track sends them mental!"

10 Studio Nova

Diabolical Consequence "This starts off uneventfully and then builds and builds and I don't want the record to end! As the record gets more intense, I add the delays on my Pioneer. It's wonderful, very unique, and another one that people may have missed. The squelchy bleeps really win a girl like me over."

11 Mark Farina

Radio

"I'm a massive fan of Mark Farina he's one of my favourite DJs. I saw him play at The Smartie Bar in Chicago and danced for four hours. It was the most awesome thing! It's not a very obvious record but the

more you listen to it, the more it grows on you. There are so many levels to it!"

12 FC Kahuna

Machine Says Yes (Josh Wink Dub)

"We're very lucky to have this. Josh Wink is so on it - he's on fire! The original is a fearsome club record but Josh has made it much housier. I'm a groove merchant and this is a really good groove mix. Proper, modern acid house."

13 Master H

Magic K

"This will be heard a lot around the summer months - I think it's the new Silicone Soul. It's sublime and emotive. DJ Q gave it to me at Alaska in Glasgow and it's already a bit of an anthem up there. I hate the way people put vocals on records sometimes, but I think this record needs a vocal - not one about 'falling' or 'reaching higher', just something a little human!"

14 Tiefschwarz

You (Dub)

"They do a lot of great stuff on Classic, I've been a fan since 'On Up'. This was a big record at The Bomb in Nottingham. It's got a nice little groove that opens up into a beautiful summer song. I wanted to end the mix with nice happy smile!"

NEW UNDERWORLD ALBUM REVEALED

The two-piece Underworld release first new album in three years

nderworld are almost ready to drop their new album, and Muzik has heard it first. Tentatively titled 'A Hundred Days Off', the new album has been produced by Karl Hyde bunker in Romford and is due for release in late September.

November last year after the boys split with long-time band member Darren Emerson. In the last six months Rick and Karl have completed 12 full tracks and, according to Karl, "another two or three albums' worth of stuff we've left on the shelf". Produced with the critical input of long time manager/co-conspirator Steve Hall, the tracks range from robot soul ('Trim') to ghostly lowrider funk ('Sola System'), via more familiar techno ('Dinosaur Adventure 3D').

The departure of Emerson has changed the Underworld dynamic "almost beyond recognition," according to Karl, making it "more chilled". But it's not just the line-up that's changed; the whole dance scene has moved on. Contemporaries such as Leftfield and Fluke have fallen by the wayside, while The

Chemicals, The Orb and Orbital are widely perceived to be treading water.

"The whole scene has fragmented into such tiny pieces that the only way forward was just to do what we felt and see what happened," and Rick Smith in Rick's studio Karl told us. "Not being driven by being part of a scene has actually made things easier. Work on the album started in There's the least feeling of pressure there's ever been for this album. And the feedback we've been getting from the people who've heard the results is extraordinary. I don't think we've ever had such a positive reaction."

> Underworld's return will be accompanied by live dates, starting with Creamfields on August 24th. Heavy investment has been made in new gear to make improvisation easier, and to get the sound closer to the original recordings.

"We've never had much trouble putting on the live shows before," says Karl, "so we thought we'd make it more difficult for ourselves. I have no idea what that chemistry is gonna bring about. But it should be great."

Underworld's new album will be out on JBO at the end of September, and reviewed first in Muzik's September issue, out August 14th


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

NORMSTOCK II: NORM SPEAKS!

"We had to do it again", says Cook

orman Cook has talking exclusively to Muzik about Normstock 2, which will see him make a

triumphant return to Brighton beach, where he played to a crowd of 35,000 last summer.

"We had to do it again," said Cook. "Brighton council were really happy because it brought so much money and attention to the town and there wasn't one arrest or injury."

This year, 60,000 people are expected to attend the free event, which will run from 6.30pm to 11.30pm on Saturday July 13th. What happened after Miami?

"The phone started to ring as soon as I got back. There were so many different deals on the table, I lost count."

What was the highest bid?

"Er, I can't tell you that! But we were being offered amazing deals. It would have been very easy for me to go: 'yeah, lots of money!', but I decided to stay with Underwater."

It must have been tempting though.

"Oh yeah. Totally. But if you have a massive deal, it puts more pressure on you. There are plenty of records with huge advances that have stiffed."

Are you ready to go on CD:UK and have milkmen whistling your tune?

"I've been through that whole thing before with Double 99 [Tim's former group – think 'RIP Groove' – Speed Garage Ed.], so I know what it entails. But I am up for a bit of the limelight."

26 year-old singer on the track "We've got a lot on the table at the moment. The vice-President of Atlantic has just flown over to see us and I've spent the last three weeks in meetings with record labels. We are getting schmoozed like you would not believe!"

EEP ON DRUGS

Did these men invent electroklash?

hey have the pinched cheeks and glazed expressions that say, "I have just dropped a big wrap of Billy with a cheeky little horse chaser. Bring on some underage girls in clown costumes, a pumpkin and a rabbit - I wish to be depraved."

They are Sheep On Drugs, and their music, best represented by 1992's 'Motorbike', is shamelessly synthetic and trashy, yet with the precision that inexpensive sequencers offer. Analogue synths throb and stab over endlessly looping and coiling basslines. The singer boasts, intimidates

and dictates. "Me and Baby Jesus/We take a trip. . . And ride", he says - irresponsibly, given that underage passengers are NOT allowed to ride pillion on motorbikes in the UK.

In short, the tunes on this 12-inch - 'Motorbike' and 'Mary Jane' - are electroklash. They're disco nouveau; they're 'synth-u-like', as those in the know are calling it.

Except, of course, they're not. But this duo, who could be found at the bottom of any remotely 'industrial' bill back in 1992 (or at numerous Megadog 'raves') were electroklash in all but name.



And so a pair of chancers (the singing half of which, Duncan, habitually poured red paint on himself onstage to make a point about the audience's apathy, or something), are revealed as the most important influences on today's white hot electro scene. Maybe.

"Probably the first reggae record I ever bought, after John Lydon told me that reggae music was really 'the thing'. Punk rock was at Year Zero at that point, and Lydon had wiped the slate clean and was beginning to write things on it like 'Reggae' and 'Can'. It all went from here for me, really."

AFRICAN HEADCHARGE Bazaar (On-U Sound)

"I couldn't do a tape without Adrian Sherwood on it. The early Headcharge albums are the most dirty, swampysounding records; you can fucking smell the damp in the room. I always want to make music that sounds like this, like it's been made under the sea, or in a bunker, or a room full of mould and smoke."

MOONBUGGY

Matchbox (Gagarin)

"Something a bit newer now. The one thing everything on this tape has in common is experimentation, but not just for its own sake. It's still got to have the groove and the funk and that's what this record does."

Texas Menstruates (Tigerbeat 6)

"I love digital music but sometimes it's such a one-way street. You don't feel you're communicating, you feel you're listening to a process. This is very digital, but very funky and funny and you feel like there's someone communicating with you. It's like a more precise. you. It's in... funkier Aphex Twin."

BOOTSY'S RUBBER BAND

Bootzilla (Warner)

"At the age of 15 this was an early lesson in 'the funk'. It's a really bad-ass record. It starts off with this really creepy lullaby in a slowed-down voice. That was an influence on me - I love it when something appears to be pleasant but turns out to be dark."

JIMI HENDRIX & **CURTIS KNIGHT**

Love (Jungle)

"It's just a jam session, but it's Hot On The Heels Of Love one of those records where you can smell the room. One drum loop, a solid bass and Hendrix getting more and more out there. It's an early example of black music's interest in technology. Hendrix was obsessed, as much as any techno innovator - like Juan Atkins 20 years later - with experimenting to get an outer space sound. Black music has always been obsessed with technology and space, which is "Back to black music's interest what some people never get."

MILES DAVIS Wili (Part 1) (Columbia)

"Doing the same as Hendrix, but with a trumpet - God, if those two had got together! Again, it's swamp music; it's just dark funk. They get a groove going and Miles starts playing and it's not till the end he gets virtuoso. . . and then in the last two minutes, there's just a drum machine and trumpet noises."

CAPTAIN BEEFHEART Electricity (Reprise)

"Off 'Safe As Milk', which is my favourite Beefheart album. Once again, you can smell the smoke in the room. It's a solid, dirty groove, and that vocal! This must have been an influence on Lydon, because it's a punk-funk song. It's total Lydon. And then a theremin comes in..."

A CERTAIN RATIO And Then Again (Factory)

"Factory is a huge, huge influence, right down to the haircuts. This is just Martin Hannett. The whole spirit and sound of Factory was down to Hannett. He was a maverick genius who wouldn't play the game."

SECTION 25

Looking From A Hilltop (Factory)

"Continuing the Factory obsession. This is a prototype electro record produced by Bernard Sumner. If you play it today people come up and ask if it's new, and it's an absolute influence on why the music of Two Lone Swordsman sounds like it does: quite ethereal melodies but underpinned by phat electro noise."

THROBBING GRISTLE (Industrial)

"This is another one I've been playing and people have said. 'Is this new? Is this on Gigolo?' No, it's Throbbing Gristle. I've said it before, but they were why techno and house were not a surprise to me. They can sound like Jeff Mills at times. Jeff, get on Throbbing Gristle, man!"

MODEL 500

No UFOs (D-Mix) (Metroplex)

in outer space. It's from 1985 but you can still play it out. It's just live-sounding, soulful machine music. To me, it all sounds like it was done live without digital edits. It's just a man and his machines expressing his love for other planets in a funky fashion."

RHYTHIM IS RHYTHIM Icon (Buzz)

"This is a beautiful, beautiful piece of music. It's basically epic, vocal-less electro pop,

which is always a winner in my book. This is the sort of track I could play at the end of a house set or a techno set."

DURUTTI COLUMN

Sketch For Summer (Factory)

"Oh look, it's Martin Hannett again. Did I mention him? Martin apparently made all these electronic squeak sounds and said to [Durutti main man] Vini Reilly, 'Just jam along on this', and they've captured that moment, which to me is the epitome of style."

PUBLIC IMAGE LTD Radio 4 (Virgin)

"It's off 'Metal Box', which is such a dirty, smelly, stinky album. You can smell the filth and oppressive atmosphere, and again, everything sounds like it's been captured as they were doing it. To me, it's an early techno record."

BRIAN ENO

"A very Krautrock-orientated way to go out. This has got these dark nursery rhyme lyrics underpinned by amazing guitar sounds and amazing production. I think in the depths of my subconscious this is a really influential record. I bought it in 1976, and in the dark days of the sixth form common room, this was a breath of fresh air."

"Allegedly invented. But how about 'drum and bag'? It's cheesy drum & bass with lots and lots of vocals."

What makes you angry?

(Z Norfolk, Manchester)

"Listening to more than five minutes of trance makes me angry. Manchester United make me really angry - they just beat us in the league, the bastards. But what makes me furious is people who look great and wear beautiful clothes and then go and listen to pop. What's that about? They should be listening to futuristic tech-house."

How important are clothes?

"Very! You don't look the part, you won't be the part. Clothes should be a statement of your personality, and you need to display it."

What's your biggest luxury?

"Spending quality time with my gorgeous wife: I can never get enough. Her name's Xochitl, which in Aztec means 'flowers'."

We take it you're in love, then.

"Absolutely. Wholeheartedly. It's incredible. My most romantic gesture was proposing - we were in an airport in Croatia, surrounded by people, but I still went down on one knee, the lot! She smiled an enormous smile and said 'yes' straight away."

What winds you up about the dance music industry?

"That none of the dance music press ever cover the really experimental fringes to any degree. They should be covering much more obscure acts and labels. [Like what?] Oh, I dunno. Layo & Bushwacka! live is incredible. I saw their first live set and I tell you, they're gonna be huge stars."

THE MUZIK RANDOM QUESTION GENERATOR

Q&A: MRC

Born Richard West, the gap-toothed geezer in the place is still a-comin' on like a seventh sense. Here he answers Muzik's questions and yours. . .

What was your proudest moment, career-wise?

"It came a few days after doing 'Ebeneezer Goode' on Top Of The Pops. We were being interviewed by Mark Goodier for Radio 1. He asked me about all the drug references, which of course I denied fully. He kept on about it until finally I said, 'Right, there is a drug reference and I'm going to apologise for it to the people listening now. On TOTP we said, "Has anyone got any salmon?", meaning "salmon and trout", which is cockney rhyming slang for snout, or cigarettes - which cause lung disease and cancer. So because of that, we're sorry for talking about it." And Mark replied, 'but you didn't say salmon, you said underlay'. So I said, 'yeah, underlay. It's a rug reference'."

What do you love most about The End?

(George James, Sheffield)

"If I had to pick one thing it'd be DJing at Subterrain when everything clicks and everyone's on the same wavelength and we go on that magical journey together. You can't beat it."

Read a good book lately?

"I'm not reading any books, I don't have time. I read a lot of magazines, and usually fashion publications rather than music, like GQ and Arena Homme. And I love the cover of May's i-D - incredible."

Dance music: crisis or boom?

"Boooooom! There may be a crisis up north because they've got no money, but down south we've got loads of cash. Ask the people at Fabric if there's a crisis! London Rools OK! You know why there's a crisis up north? It's because they don't know how to dress properly. God, it's so ugly. If I lived up there, I wouldn't want to go to clubs where everyone's dressed like a twat. The possible exception is Tribal Sessions at Sankeys Soap, as in they don't dress like twats. But everyone else? Ugh."

What did you want to be when you were 10?

"I don't know why, as I didn't have a fascination with teeth, but for ages I wanted to be a dentist."

Which record's doing it for you just now?

(Tam-Tam. Stoke Newington) "A track called 'Stucco Homes' off Brett Johnson's 'Bounce' EP on Classic, It's so modern, bleepy, sexy, sleazy and futuristic, so funky and techy, and it's got this great psychedelic vocal on it. Classic is a favourite label of mine, and this record is very new. Old things bore me. I've got a very low boredom threshold. If something excites me, it's because it's fresh."

Do you have a temper?

"I do, but it's almost impossible to break it - though I do have scream-ups with the wife, which is okay because it evokes passion."

Why has it taken you 15 years to release a solo album?

(Confused, Stoke)

"Simple: because I was exclusively contracted to The Shamen as 'Mr C' till we disbanded about two and a half years ago. After that, I wanted to release TV to the rest of the universe." some singles first, to build up an awareness of Mr C as a solo artist. Stuff like 'Because' and 'Birds & Bees'...'

What was it like collaborating with **Robert Owens on 'The Club'?**

"He was such a sweetie. He's like. [affects camp American accent] 'Hiii! My name's Raawbert, how agare you?' He's kind, gentle, emotive. His voice has inspired me since way back in the Eighties and I love working with him."

Are you a bit of a film buff?

"I love movies, but I don't get to watch them as often as I would like. I just saw Y Tu Mama Tambien which is really funny and quite shocking. Mexican films usually don't have any swearing or show pussy or anything, because it's a Catholic country, but some of the slang is so vulgar it doesn't even translate properly, like 'go to the dick of the whale'."

Can you play an instrument?

"The keyboards, badly. I'd love to be good at it, because it's every instrument there is. Death to the guitar. All that indie revival shite? Pants to the lot of it! It's all very last millennium, dahling! And that modern electronica that's so fashionable now - it didn't sound good the first time around. Music should be futuristic, sexy, and challenging."

What's your biggest regret?

"I don't think that I have any because everything that I've done has made me who I am today. Maybe my years as a soccer hooligan - pathetic, isn't it? but even that made me who I am."

Is the universe a random collection of events or do you believe in purpose?

"Purpose. My purpose is decreed by me. The rest of the lifeforms can watch how the only telepathic creatures in the universe will ascend together. Very special, we are. We must make great

What's your poison?

'Vodka, lime and soda, and make it Grey Goose. No others that I'm prepared to mention, thanks!"

If you weren't a DJ, producer and record label/club owner, what would you be doing?


"I'd probably be an actor. It's something I experience every day of my life. I definitely want to pursue a career on TV. I'm doing stuff for MTV and the BBC and it's growing steadily. I'm successful because I work my bollocks off every hour of every day, and because I look great and I'm a total bullshitter. Don't believe a word I say."

MS DYNAMITE

The UK diva who's down with the kids

t's early afternoon in Bristol and Ms Dynamite is juggling her interview with Muzik with a fruitless search for a sandwich, conducted via a food-hunting member of her entourage. It's part and parcel of the unglamorous life that is being on the road.

So far the Ms Dynamite UK tour has taken in practically every major city in the country as she promotes her debut LP, 'A Little Deeper', at various clubs and record stores. She's even gone back to the classroom, visiting secondary schools to do PAs and offer big sisterly advice.

"The girls are very confident for their age but the boys are very cheeky," she laughs. "A couple of them have even asked if they can take me out!"

Education is important to the 21 year-old Ms Dynamite. 'Boo!' – her monstrous crossover garage hit with prolific two step producer Sticky – was a lucid account of clubland violence. Her new single, 'Takes More' continues where that left off, addressing issues (AIDS, gold mining in Africa, bad boy posturing) that most young urban acts wouldn't touch

with the tip of a Moet bottle.

More surprisingly, she's ditched the garage MC delivery – not for good, she stresses – and reinvented herself as a fully fledged r&b vocalist.

"It's more important for me to educate than entertain. My objective is to talk about issues no one is really addressing, such as greed. Kids are so materialistic these days because that's all they see in the media. It sounds like such a cliche, but it's about the person inside – it doesn't matter what you own or how you dress. I want to tell the kids that to feel good about yourself is the most important thing."

Let's hope the kids agree.

The Siren Suite's rules are simple – no dance, no pop, no rock. At London's first classical club night, DJ Siren (aka Bishi) plays old classics from Handel and Tchaikovsky alongside new ones by John Cage and Michael Nyman, while found-soundsmith Richard Torry mutates the music through filters, samples and synths.

"We play film soundtracks, world music and new music from electronic composers as well," explains Matthew Glamorre, the act's conductor/mouthpiece. "We class classic music to be exactly that, whether it be Philip Glass, Bach or the Aphex Twin." And before you ask, yes you

can dance to it, but don't expect the Sirens to approve. "By the end of our first night at the Mint Bar in Clerkenwell, everyone was drunk and waltzing about. I was horrified," Matthew chuckles. "The Siren Suite is all about dumbing up, creating a social environment where you don't have to stoop to retard retro or mishy mashy house."

We'd expect little else from Matthew and Richard. Erstwhile members of art pranksters Minty (alongside Leigh Bowery), they went on to promote the anti-acid house club Smashing, industrial hardcore night Harder Faster Louder and foreign language club Pig Lingo, meeting Minty fan Bishi along the way.

A classically trained vocalist, sitar player and pianist, the 19 year-old had never DJed before The Siren Suite began last March. "We got all sorts down, from the art establishment to one kid who came up to me and said "I'm bang into my garage but this stuff is mental!"

Now Siren Suite have launched a radio show (Mind The Gap – It's The Sound Storm on Resonance FM 104.4) and are recording the first ever series of classical mix albums.

"Turntablism goes much wider than dance music," Bishi reckons. "What we do is really the next step in DJing."

To prove the point, they're off to Ibiza this summer to do a clifftop sunset party. So who is DJ Siren hoping to lure to a watery death?

"Andrew Lloyd Webber and the whole cast of Bombay Dreams for a start," she cries. "And Gareth and Will, but Zoe can stay." Get ready to be ravished on the rocks.

The first of seven Siren Suite mix albums is out in September on Universal Classics

Montreal your bass are belong to us

House music is for bimbos, and techno's for brainy people," deadpans Montreal's Marc Leclair. despairing of dance music's self-imposed sectarianism. "So I'm making a statement -Akufen is for everyone."

Ironic, then, that it took a month of total isolation for Marc to produce his debut album 'My Way'. Holed up in a house overlooking a lake in Quebec, Marc had no means of communicating with anyone - no telephone, no e-mail, not even a neighbour in sight. Just the occasional fishermen on skidoos (hence the track Skidoos'). "There were snowstorms every day, and this big window in front of me was just like a white wall, a blank page, so it was perfect. I wanted to make a really personal album, for this music to come straight from my guts."

The results have been gathering gushing praise at a rattling rate, from admirers such as Andrew Weatherall, Matthew Herbert and Craig Richards, who recently booked Akufen to play the main room at Fabric. Yet 'My Way' causes equally frothing reactions in devotees of austere electronica, usually a bit sniffy about anything involving actual 'enjoyment'.

So how does he do it? His clipped house beats have a hypermodern sheen to rival Daft Punk's, his lascivious basslines are as bumpin' as anything by Todd Edwards, and his mastery of the

dynamics of 'deep' is based on an enduring love affair with Cologne's minimal techno scene. But Leclair's killer punch is the combination of all the above with a technique he calls "microsampling".

Plucking split-second snatches of Celine Dion, fragments of interference or gobbets of country & western cheese from the radio airwaves, and chopping up soundbites from banal TV talk shows, he stitches the whole lot back together to create cartoony, percussive hooks that sound naggingly familiar but refeshingly wrong - like "reading a book diagonally", or going to a party where everyone swaps clothes while you're in the toilet.

"I'm like a surgeon - I dissect sounds and grab what I need," Marc elaborates. "I'm trying to put people in a state of mind where they have to think and to imagine something, and to combine that with the funk. People can interpret it any way they want."

There's been much loose talk about Akufen 'reinventing' house and techno. But Marc won't be pinned down that easily. "I'm not reinventing anything, I'm just tired of going into a record store and not finding anything that appeals to me. People need to be stimulated and surprised all the time, but the first person you've got to surprise is yourself. Akufen is about taking a stand and saying 'stop that crap'."

"Whatever people get out of a track is fine by me. . . But that's about not taking problems you have out on yourself physically."

America, after all, is obsessed with expressing its problems. From Jerry Springer to nu-metal, everyone, as Horace Andy once said, has got problems. . .

"Check it - this is how I put it. It's not enough to state your struggle - no one gives a shit about your 'struggle'. I don't care if somebody says something honest. I care if they say something interesting."

And through the production talents of Anticon's producers, from Jel to cLOUDDEAD's Odd Nosdam, and through never going for the obvious conclusion, Sage does just that. We've got used to hip hoppers being repetitive, boring, easy to pin down. Sage, by contrast, confounds the listener at every turn.

Here's one, overly simple example. The track 'Kill Ya Momz' appears to be a parody of the Limp Bizkit, "Feel my demands closure. paaaaiiiin!" skool of hip hop metal. But then it goes into a child's rap about how their mother is "The best mother/ There really is no other". 'How sweet', you think. But then, an adult's voice - Sage's, you assume - comes in. "That's bull", it grunts. 'A-ha,' you think - gotcha! He's another Eminem, obsessed with his nasty mom - the only difference is that he swathes his oedipal complex in layers of irony - it's all become clear. What do you say to that, Mr so-called Sage?

"Er, the line is 'That's all', not 'That's bull'."

Bugger.

could flog fancy goods like he flogs beats and rhymes, with Busta on board, he'd be an even more inhumanly rich man than he is already.

An unrivalled master of showmanship, for the best part of a decade Busta has been the one hip hop artist that Britain has wholeheartedly clasped to its collective bosom. And the laydeez in the house at this west London gig, you sense, would like to do that in a more literal sense. Less forbidding and underground than Wu-Tang, but less of a twat than P Diddy, Busta Rhymes and his Flipmode Squad have consistently scored in the UK with their astute mix of rapidfire flow, obvious samples and crackling studio productions.

Tonight, with a stage set that consists of a slide projector and a pair of decks, Busta and sparring partner Spliff Star perform to a sold-out Apollo with more glee and gusto than any big-name hip hop visitor to London we can recall. Ever the populist, he takes great delight in name-checking local haunts like, uh, China Whites, where

f J Records boss Clive Davis he and his crew evidently had various (mis)adventures. Unsurprisingly, the 2,000strong crowd, who are good-natured and in high spirits in spite of the excessive police presence outside the venue, love every minute of it.

Despite some corny interludes that fall a little flat on occasion, the hits are all present and correct, bristling with raw, twitching energy. That Busta can holler bars and display his dance moves at the same time only adds to the spectacle.

More recent singles like 'Put Your Hands Where My Eyes Can See' and 'Dangerous' are greeted like the gospel, and the Knight Rider-sampling 'Turn It Up' sounds fresh five years on - as So Solid Crew, who recently had the same idea, will vouchsafe.

But you can blame that on Busta's undimmed energy supplies. This man could outlast the Duracell Bunny on a tab of X, as his performance of 'Pass The Courvoisier' gleefully ម្នី demonstrates. There are hip hop showmen, and then there's Busta Rhymes.

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
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
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

In early May, the island is not quite the stuff of modern legend. Most of the bars are shut, and clubbers are comfortably outnumbered by middle-aged hikers savouring the island's natural beauty.

It's a typical Lottie statement. Right now, it's fair to say she doesn't give much of a fuck about other people's preconceptions of what a DJ should be like. She DJs the real house music she likes, when and where she likes, and having come this far she's not about to change that for anyone — an attitude certain big-name DJs could learn from. And now, with a series to be broadcast throughout the Balearic summer, Radio 1 are about to shoot her to the top of the DJ pile.

Lottie's success comes after many years of promise. Partly, it's because the cyberkid phenomenon is about to become an entertaining footnote in the history of dance music – the kids who used to dress as fairies are swapping day-glo funfur for a pair of sexy shoes. There's something of a proper house revolution in the air and Lottie, along with Yousef, is spearheading it on the nation's airwaves. This is a woman who uses the term 'acid house' like it's not 15 years old. Like it means something right now.

Charlotte 'Lottie' Horne has been DJing for 14 years. She doesn't like people who come to see her because they think she's a name, or people who come to see her who think she's a glamorous bird—she flinches when you remind her that she used to spin as DJ Horny (after her surname, of course)—or, least of all, people who don't just love the music.


Lottie speaks about music like a trainspotter: she knows catalogue numbers, reminisces about old house records from her youth like they were beloved cousins. When she talks about learning to mix, her eyes sparkle. The word Lottie most uses about herself is "obsessed".



"I've only thought about dressing up and taking care of my appearance in the last four years," says Lottie unselfconsciously. "I've had some cash lately and I've been able to go shopping. From 1995-98 I had combat trousers with a broken zip held together with a safety pin. I never looked particularly nice."

Yet when she first walks into the small hotel in Ibiza Town, the perception is of someone a little flustered and starry. She wears glossy sunglasses that she doesn't take off and which look incredibly expensive. There are problems because her room is on the third floor, there is no lift, and she has a heavy box of records. There is no porter to help carry the records and she decides to leave them in her manager's room on the first floor. However, when she gets up to her room it is damp and would be impossible to sleep in. She and

Making her own music is something Lottie has conspicuously taken her time getting round to. Her DJing, similarly, has matured gradually. Her DJ sound of a couple of years ago was a bit samey, a bit onepaced, as if she was trying a little too hard. But recently her sound has relaxed. Whether it's down to career success at Radio 1 or relationship security at home, a more playful side to Lottie's music has emerged. Her sets now fizz with experimentation, humour, and fun. Everything seems to have come together at just the right time.

Lottie, what do you accept and decline gig-wise?

"I accept wine and refuse heroin."

ottie was born 29 years ago in Chester. Her older brother loved music and saved up to buy a Linn hi-fi system. He'd play Lottie Kraftwerk and Heaven 17. When she was put to bed she remembers getting up again and dancing to his music she could hear through the wall.

"I first became aware of music when I started ballet," she says. Lottie is doing the Muzik interview in her hotel at 11.30pm, after her 'disco nap'. There'll be a trip to a local bar and some Spanish liqueur shots before her Pacha set — she's on at 3am.

"I'd dance everywhere like a

nutcase. In my garden, the hall, the kitchen, the living room. I wanted to be a pop star cos I didn't think I could be a DJ."

She says her brother found her once crying, with a home recorded Top 40 tape in her hand, screaming, "I want to make a record! I want to make a record!"

In her teens Charlotte got into clubbing. Chester, she reckons, was great for clubs. There was Blast at High Society, which played rare groove until, influenced by the Haçienda in Manchester, it dramatically changed music policy in favour of acid house. Lottie went to Blast every week – her dad would drag her out of the club, furious, because she was 15 at the time.

At 16, she started hitching lifts to the Hacienda, and became fascinated by the DJs' skills. Her mates (all male) started mixing.

"We were collecting records avidly. We were listening to Sasha, Graeme Park, Mike Pickering, Dave Haslam... then Quadrant Park kicked off in Liverpool in 1990..."

At the Haçienda Lottie spent her time by the booth, watching how visiting American DJs like Erick Morillo mixed. She still waxes lyrical about their skills. She froths wildly when she talks of mixing using the EQs. She gets excited talking tech.

At 17 she got decks and a mixer from Global Grooves in Chester, partly paid for by her mum and brother. She spent four hours a night practising and started DJing at 19.


The first big gig was the London

friend Caroline Prothero (cofounder of their London club Missdemeanours) vow to ring another hotel and book in there. Quelle horreur! The star is not happy! Heads must roll!

Sadly, haters, over lunch, Lottie reveals herself to be charming and friendly. Although passionate about her music, she can talk about any subject – especially Princess Diana conspiracy theories, posh bikini tops and Nostradamus's predictions for Ibiza. She can even order food and drink in Spanish. And she then actually eats it, unlike some female stars. There's no hint of performance, it's all natural.

all Paul's favourite DJ started in Chester and graduated to a residency at The Gallery; then came London Calling with Danny Rampling. She was soon a favourite at Back To Basics, Sugar, Bugged Out, and The Boutique, and won Muzik's Best New DJ award in 1999. She says she was always wary of being pushy, and wants to impress people by her performance behind the decks, not through belligerence or networking - ironic given that she goes out with Dan from FC Kahuna. She is uncomfortable with the word "ambitious".

"I'm such a Gemini," she says, throwing out a random astrology

"To go up on a stage in front of all those people was daunting, I was shaking. What was so, so, so important was that I didn't just want it to be alright, I wanted people to go 'Wow!'.

f Lottie's ascent has been atypical in some ways, there is one respect in which she is a model modern DJ. Whether through natural inclination or long experience, she is unwilling to say anything that might be construed as controversial in interviews. Ask Lottie about the divisions in various dance scenes or whether there are DIs she doesn't like, for instance, and she gets very diplomatic, angling answers towards the music not the personalities.

"There are divisions between scenes. I think my boyfriend is really anal about music but sometimes he says I have a tendency to be a house snob. I'm trying not to be. There's a lot of music that I literally can't listen to, I have to run out of the club."

So do you two sit in your house and talk about music all the time?

"We're the most boring fuckers in the world," she says. "We do other things like go to the cinema and talk about books. . . but also we do sit there for hours dissecting records and talking about music. Last night, we had a three hour discussion about what was 'soulful' and what wasn't. We got through bottles and bottles of wine. I've got the best boyfriend in the world as far I'm concerned."

Are you two the Posh and Becks of dance? Lottie looks aghast.


"Oh God! Don't be ridiculous. James Lavelle said that, but no, no. we're not famous enough. And we're not married."

Is it a problem both of you doing the same job?

"I think it helps. Being a girl especially, doing what I do, there's loads of boys that would be pissed off with me running out on Thursday morning shouting, 'See you on Sunday night!' It took us between six months and a year to be really honest with each other, to not even think that that person is going to let you down in any way."

Lottie is well aware that people will zoom in on the fact she's a girl in a male-dominated industry. Does she ever feel any hostility from male DJs? She leans back in her wicker chair.

"Maybe I'm naïve, but I haven't noticed any hostility. If there has been some from people I don't know then I haven't cared. The people I know respect me cos they know I



know what I'm talking about." Quick question: why are there no

fat, ugly female DJs?

She thinks. "I'm not Kate Moss you know. Ooh, I don't know, it's a difficult and cruel question. There's loads of fat and ugly male DJs."

She ponders more, and her face contorts. This is painful.

"By me not knowing how to answer that means that there could be loads of really unattractive girls out there who DI that we don't know about. Then there are some, but I can't say who they are. . . so that's a really hard topic. All the DJs that I know who are girls are pretty good looking."

Lottie has been running the hugely successful Missdemeanors club with Caroline Prothero for the last few years, and they have a record label. Lottie has her Radio 1 slot and is being primed for bigtime broadcasting. She's been in the studio with Dylan and Rob from Mutiny and Steve Mac from Rhythm Masters and the results will be released on her label. After appearing in the TV programme Faking It her profile is higher than ever. So is she happy to be making some money at last? Sort of.

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With one false start behind him, **IIs** is poised to stick a wasp up the nightie of the breaks scene with new album, 'Soul Trader'. Believe us, it's time to get IIs. . .

t could easily have gone horribly wrong for Ils. Instead of sitting in a Notting Hill bar talking about being the most exciting thing to come out of the breaks scene since his label boss and mentor, Adam Freeland, he could be entertaining your gran with cover versions of 'Hi-ho Silver Lining' at weddings, birthdays and bar mitzvahs. His fortunes changed when he waltzed, one happy day, into a studio in Soho's Denmark Street and clapped eyes on his first sampler.

"Our band had saved up and bought studio time," he remembers. "We already had a drum machine, but as soon as I saw the sampler I realised I could do everything myself. Everything. Not only that, but it would sound better, too."

Some eight years later he sits, a bundle of nervous energy, opposite Muzik in The Gate bar. His debut album for Freeland's Marine Parade label, 'Soul Trader', looks like joining the World Cup and Big Brother III as one of the summer's highlights. You may already have heard the album's opener, 'Next Level' – February's chart-bothering tune featured in an advert for Orange mobile phones.

"There's something about that breaks and strings sound that seems to go really well with images," says Ils. "People can have fun with it in the editing suite, and from my point of view it was a total boost, because the single did well, and we recouped all the recording expenses of the album before it was even out. It took the pressure off."

God bless the advertising men. It had been a long road to Ils' big break, if you'll excuse the pun. At around 13, the boy born Ilian Walker ("My mum made up the name. She's a French hippy.") saw footage of Hendrix playing Montreal and took up the bass.

Stints in half-formed and barely remembered bands followed, as did a life clubbing during the Mud Club era, slightly pre-rave. But mates can be unreliable. So when Ils spotted the sampler, he also saw a way out of the band lifestyle.

"The others were always selling their instruments," he moans. "We used an upside-down Habitat bin as a snare drum for a year."

He saved up and snaffled a Prince's Trust grant, eventually hoarding the necessary to buy a sampler, which he installed in his flat, promptly placing an advert in Loot advertising studio services. Drum & bass was happening, and it was mostly happening in Ils' flat, as pirate DJs and would-be producers turned Chez Ils into breakbeat central.

"Everyone who came in wanted to chop some Amen breaks," he laughs. "It was like Groundhog Day. I'd have two different clients a day asking me to chop Amen differently. I'd go to sleep at night dreaming about it..."

For a while he programmed and engineered other people's stuff, before making his own tracks, first for Rugged Vinyl, then for Bukem's Good Looking label as Ils & Solo.

"Drum & bass is like being a womble," he says. "If you've got the talent and energy and you've got a bag of CDs and a sampler, you can make something out of it. It was a celebration of technology."

Nevertheless, as d&b's bpms rose, Ils' enthusiasm shrank. ("I love my breakbeats, and at 170 bpm you can't express your beats"). He defected to the breakbeat sound after overtures from Dave Tipper's Fuel label and the promise of an album deal.

"Richie Warren [A&R man at Fuel] said he wanted the album dark, moody and soundtracky. He wanted something for driving along to, but something that would make him want to drive through walls."

'Idiots Behind The Wheel' was, therefore, aptly titled. Shame it never officially came out. In fact, it's unlikely ever to come out in the form that impressed those DJs and journalists who received one of the 1,000 promo copies.

"I had to literally sit in my house for six months and wait for them to release it, which never happened," says Ils, wincing at the memory. "So I lost eight months out of my career. At that stage I became very demoralised. The songbirds stopped singing, you know?"

He kept himself going with more studio work – the likes of James Lavelle and Derek Dahlarge were regulars – and the odd remix. Thankfully, Adam Freeland had heard 'Idiots. . .', liked it, and wanted to sign its creator to his then-fledgling Marine Parade label, where Ils unleashed the mighty 'Tectonics' and 'About That Time', got remix gigs for Freq Nasty and T-Power and – at last – secured a new album deal.

Ils wrote most of the album at his mum's gaff in France then, on his return, he enlisted vocalists Diane Charlemagne (Moby, Goldie), and Declan, who he talent-scouted at an open-mic night at this very bar, The Gate.

The end result, 'Soul Trader', sparkles with soul and ambition rarely found in breaks productions. Its appeal seems sure to extend beyond the breaks ghetto: beatheads are going to dig the science of, say, 'Unbreakable'; the average punter will get off on the groove and feeling of 'No Soul'. Good news for a scene with something of an image problem. . . .

"There aren't a lot of good breaks producers," says Ils. "There was this brain drain when all the producers moved on from drum & bass to speed garage. Generally, a studio like mine would have catered for that, but it's just not something I wanted to do — I don't particularly enjoy that kind of programming."

And programming, at the end of the day, is what it boils down to for Ils. It's what he was born to do. "I was a bit of a geeky workaholic for the first three years or so," he admits, adding that he's now learned to relax, particularly in front of a PlayStation.

"If you have the concentration to sit and play computer games for more than a couple of hours and stay involved, then you can probably be a music programmer," he concludes. "Most music programmers are addicted to games."

The single 'No Soul' is out now, the album 'Soul Trader' on June 24th, both on Marine Parade

Gary Cobain on FSOL's strange journey from acid house to spiritual enlightenment - and the maddest record of 2002

uture Sound Of London, as much as Orbital or Aphex Twin, defined post-acid house electronica, from 1992's classic 'Papua New Guinea' and its accompanying 'Accelerator' LP to three adventurous albums for Virgin ('Lifeforms', 'ISDN', and 'Dead Cities'). You probably own at least one of their records, and if you haven't heard 'Papua. . .' you must have been sojourning on Uranus for his desire to move on musically. He the past 10 years. Judging by his madly psychedelic, prog rock comeback album 'The Isness', Gary Cobain (one half, with Brian Dougan, of FSOL) appears to have gone rather further out than that, mind you...

"On the track 'Galaxial Pharmaceutical', everything is separate and connected, like the universe itself," Cobain says proudly. "I'm a urine drinker and I created the boy band phenomenon," he adds.

In sandals, pale slacks and a white smock, he's holding forth in the duo's studio. Behind him is a poster of Shri Bagwan Ragneesh, the late Indian mystic who created a commune in Oregon notorious for its free love and ecstasy use.

Such imagery is entirely suited to 'The Isness', which is coming out under FSOL's nom de fou. Amorphous Androgynous. It sits in the headspace between deep space electronics, Ravi Shankar sitar-ism and 'Space Oddity'-style songs. But how did FSOL arrive here from the electronic dancefloor experiments of 'Stakker Humanoid' and 'Papua New Guinea'?

"We were one of the most wayout, experimental electronic artists," exclaims Cobain with characteristic zeal. "We laid the groundwork for people like Radiohead, going where TEXT THOMAS H GREEN PHOTOGRAPHY SARAH TURTON

indie and rock needed to be. I realised, though, that I wasn't half as free as I thought. I was operating within my own prison walls, when people like George Harrison had plugged into esoteric theories, Taoism, Buddhism, Tantra, health food shops. . ."

But FSOL's progress to their current incarnation is as much about Cobain's fluctuating health as became very ill five years ago with an asynchronous heart, arthritic joints, facial eczema, bad digestive problems and depression.

"When you're ill like that," he explains, "you purify yourself. The first things to go are the obvious ones - drink and drugs - but it slowly goes deeper and deeper. . ."

So Gary Cobain headed off across the globe in search of answers. From discovering the teachings of Bagwan Ragneesh with The Cult's Ian Astbury in LA, to investigating the effects mercury fillings have on your immune system in Mexico, he eventually ended up "eating only organic wholefood steamed at certain times and doing yoga. You

strip away the layers and realise the person you thought you were doesn't exist."

During this spiritual quest, he also spent all his Virgin Records dosh.

"Brian invested in a penthouse in Old Street but I'm sleeping on a lilo from Argos in the studio," says Gary without rancour. "I don't need to own - I've come to understand that I'll always be alright."

So Cobain's not having us on. But what turned him on to that most reviled of musical forms, prog rock?

"Brian and I just came round to admitting we'd stopped spending £10 on double pack promos we'd get rid of in six months. We were buying Donovan, Traffic's 'Hole In My Shoe' - what a fucking weird record! In the middle of the song they go into birds tweeting, backwards sound effects, and then talk about being on the back of a giant albatross. Well, do I hear any musicians being as evocative, playful and childish as that now? No, because we're at the point where we're celebrating the miserable radio pluggers, journos and A&R people dictate what records are being made. I want to present something so full of colour maybe people won't even understand it.'

And indeed, maybe some people won't. Many of us will, though. Let the others play catch-up like always.

Oh, and if you're wondering how FSOL invented boy bands. . .

"We made music that was insane and indigestible but making the Top 10," says Cobain. "People reacted against that; they wanted something simple, so along came boy bands. Now though, culture is ready for exploration – the boy bands are creating me again. . ." 🖪



ince the 1992 Olympic Games, and in spite of Freddie Mercury and Montserrat Caballe's theme tune, Barcelona has become recognised across Europe as a trendsetter in food, furniture, design, fashion, music and, of course, architecture. The celebration of Gaudi's anniversary this year gives you a good opportunity to visit the 10 masterpieces he erected - check the Guia Del Ocio, the weekly what's-going-on bible, for details. The MACBA (Museu d'Art Contemporani de Barcelona) or, next to it, the CCCB (Centre de la Cultura Contemporanea de Barcelona), where the Sonar festival takes place (June 13th-15th), are also well worth a look.

The Born is the hippest area, with an everincreasing number of trendy shops, bars and restaurants. Custo (Place de los Olles), designer Mertxe Hernández (Calle Rec), and On Land (Calle Princessa) present limited clubwear. but if you can't find what you're after there head for Calle Avino, around which is a veritable warren of bars, fashion emporiums, internet cafes, and, sadly, petty crime - mugging is a very real threat that you should remain aware of.

Located in an old theatre, there are three dancefloors, a main one where Rephlex, Dave Clarke and Ian Pooley have residencies, and two smaller rooms playing everything from Europe's 'Final Countdown' to X-Zibit.

• La Macarena

Calle Nou de Sant Francesc. On Sunday nights, this is a minimalist, chairless club which lets you vibe for free to urban music selected by Nigel Hayes, DJ Clandestino and Mia till 5 am, sometimes with foreign guests.

La Terrassa

Avda Marques de Comillas, behind Poble Espanol. Fancy some fresh air? Try a rendez-vous here. From May till the end of September, you can listen to tech-house, generally played by a solid line-up of international DJs.







t's said that God invented alcohol to keep the Irish from taking over, which explains the 900-plus drinking establishments to be found in Dublin. A good time is not something you'll have to search too hard for but, if stuck, look for the free What's On Where? and In Dublin listing guides.

The much-lauded economic upturn of recent years has resulted in jobs aplenty and cleaned up the streets. Dublin itself is conveniently compact, and easy to navigate on foot, dissected by the River Liffey which makes it easy to remember your east and west. The most popular district for visitors is the Temple Bar, found just south of the river. All cobbled streets, restaurants and traditional pubs, this area explodes each weekend with drinkers. Nearby Grafton Street is famous for shopping, be it high street or designer, while most of the B&Bs and hostels are found north of the river.

If you've had your full of repetitive beats, many pubs host impromptu sessions of traditional Irish music, most well known being O'Donoghue's (15 Merrion Row). For bigger acts, The Temple Bar Music Centre is great. The Guinness Factory (St James Gate, €8-12 entry) is a must for any serious drinker, and is home to the best pint of the black stuff you'll ever taste.

Spirit

57 Middle Abbey Street. The new Spirit is in the completely refurbished HO venue. Expect five rooms over four floors, including bars, a restaurant, and dancefloors. More emphasis is put on the venue than who's behind the decks - the cover charge being the same if it's Little Louie Vega or your mother.

• Tivoli

135-138 Francis Street. Apparently the new owners blew three million Euros in three weeks turning the basement of this famous old theatre into a cutting edge club. A Dublin

PoD/Red Box

The Old Harcourt Street Train Station, Harcourt Street. PoD won the Muzik Award for Bars Best Club Venue in 1998, and is exceptionally well regarded. Its Siamese twin venue, the Red Box is bigger and hosts big name guests and events. A friendly door policy means a consistently ace atmosphere.

• RiRa

11 South Great George's Street. Upstairs is the Globe bar during the day, downstairs has a proper dancefloor and some excellent secluded booths. Open every night of the week, expect funky house, with some retro and hip hop clubland must-see. thrown in for good measure.

The Kitchen

Basement of the Clarence Hotel, Essex Street East. Yes, it's famously owned by U2. It's also a cracking club in its own right, home to a vast array of regular nights covering prog house, techno, house, drum & bass...you get the picture.

Switch

Eustace Street. Switch is smack bang in the Temple district. A haven for fans of breaks and beats. think of it as intimate and sweaty, not run down and dirty. They thankfully changed their name a while back from Club Zazu.

The bar and pub action centres on the Temple Bar district, with Globe (11 Sth Great George Street) and Hogan's (35 Sth Great George Street) very popular with the pre-clubbing crowd. Thomas House (86 Thomas Street, Liberties) is currently the Dublin version of the Heavenly Social circa 1994, with lots of credible DJs and dancing on tables in this small, sweaty pub.

If you are Northside, check out Jack Nealon's (165 Chapel Street), Life Cafe Bar (Irish Life Centre, Abbey Street Lower), Pravda (Liffey Street Lower) and Voodoo Lounge (39 Arran Quay).

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


To others, the exact opposite is true. For them, Paris is a charming, hopelessly romantic city where one can smoke Gauloises in cafes, don a beret and discuss existentialism, or simply stroll along quaint streets admiring the well-dressed people and grandiose architecture.

Over the last five years there seems to have been a decisive push to modernise the city, but none of this takes away the city's easy charm. Locations such as the Champs-Elysée, the Louvre, the Tuilleries, the Sacre-Coeur and the Seine still bring about a sense of breezy apathy and inner contentment.

But there's vibrancy too. 200 years ago, people here were losing their heads for the revolution on a daily basis. Now the city's youth do it willingly (metaphorically speaking), every weekend. The club scene isn't the best in Europe, but there are plenty of chic bars and cool restaurants to compensate, particularly chilled venues like the Buddha Bar, Barfly and the Mezzanine Del'Alcazar, the music policy of which can be heard on their numerous compilations.

If you are going to eat though, one thing is definitely worth remembering: An Englishman's fish is a Frenchman's 'poisson'. [You're fired - Ed.]

• Le Queen

102 Avenue des Champs Elysées. Still principally a gay club, Le Queen is one of the city's longest serving nightspots and still sticks music at the top of its priority list. Nights here have been getting a little cheesier but it's worth checking listings for the occasional interesting event.

Le Studio

287/33 Ave De La D'Auberviliers. One of Paris' hottest new venues, Le Studio has allegedly helped kickstart the city's club scene again. The best night here is probably the Kit Kat Forever after-hours session, which runs from 6am until 2pm on Sunday, and attracts between 3,000 and 4,000 people, who come to get down to underground sounds in a warm, colourful environment.

• Rex Club

5 Boulevard Poissonniere. Another legendary Paris venue, and the one in which Laurent Garnier made his name. These days the place is a little worn around the edges and the music policy isn't so cutting edge, but nights like the last Saturday of every month, hosted by Charles Schillings, and a few others still provide good clubbing entertainment.

Batofar

Port de la Gare, across from number 11 Quai François Mauriac. This is one of Paris's most celebrated venues - not bad considering it's a boat! Playing everything from dub, trip hop and jungle to jazz and beyond, this is definitely a place to check, especially on a Sunday afternoon.

Café Charbon

109 Rue Oberkampf. A gorgeous chill out bar with gas lamps, tall mirrors and high ceilings. Lots of local DJs put on good nights here, supplying the artsy leftfield crowd with plenty of house, hip hop and drum & bass.

Buddha Bar

8 Rue Boissy d'Anglas. One of the city's most renowned bars (and the instigator of the bar/ restaurant/hotel compilation fever that is starting to reach fever pitch in Paris), this place is quite a touristy hangout but can still be a nice place to relax to world music-styled chill out sounds. It's bloody pricey though.

What's Up Bar

11 Rue Daval. Yet another classy venue with a tight music policy and a slick-to-the-gills, ultra-cool clientele.







However, Berlin's best club is not afraid of being roaringly camp - DJ Hell and his International Deejay Gigolos are regulars and Fischerspooner played their debut German gig here. Even Cabaret chanteuse Liza Minnelli has been behind the decks, looking like a cosmetic car-crash.

Kitkat Club

The Metropol, Nollendorfplatz 5, Schöneberg. www.kitkatclub.de. Infamous fetish club, where after Saturday night's revelry, it's mandatory to get naked at 11am on Sunday. It may

be called Kitkat, but the only chocolate fingers you're likely to find here will be the result of bizarre rituals involving enemas and rectal probing.

Tresor

Leipziger Str. 126a, Mitte. www.tresorclub.de Profoundly influential techno dungeon situated inside the safe deposit vault of a Twenties department store. The club has been credited with formulating its own Tresor sound, and Sven Vath loves it so much that he always turns in a DJ set on Love Parade day.

E-Werk

Wilhelmstraße 43, 10117, Mitte. Berlin clubbing institution where Paul Van Dyk pioneered his legendary ninehour sets when he was still living in East Berlin with his mum. Re-opened in 2001 on the site of a disused

power-plant. Check out their crazed No UFO parties.

e Parade: A r

Leibnizstr. 57 in 10629. www.klo.de Klo (translation: 'toilet') features bog seats to sit on, booby trapped toilets and drinks served in bedpans. The food is comprised of sausages with sauerkraut beautifully presented in huge enamel potties. And as for the music? It's shit, obviously.

Volksbuhne

Rosa-Luxemburg-Platz. Berlin label Kitty-Yo stage electronica showcases here. Don't be surprised to see selfproclaimed 'President of the Berlin Underground' Gonzales prancing about in stilettos.

Ostgut

Mühlenstr. 26-30, Friedrichshain. Aging Euro-house DJ Westbam still packs in Berliners here.

It's a huge, beautifully decorated club with two floors and a capacity of 3,000, and any DJ will tell you it's one of the best in the world. It's significantly pricier than other Slovenian clubs, but the guest DJs include the likes of Laurent Garnier, Claude Young, Sven Vath, Jeff Mills and Luke Slater. People come here every weekend from all over Slovenia, Croatia and Italy.

A 15 year-old club in the center of Ljubljana, K4's name comes from the club's address. Kersnikova 4. Capacity is about 1,000 people over two floors. This is a great place with no regular programme but a team of

Near Ljubljana. A really great sound system and rustic decor, with lots of wood inside and mad lighting. Guests have included Jeff Mills, Oliver Ho, Marshall Jefferson and Ian Pooley.

Located in a small village called Trebnje, 70 km from Ljubljana, this is an ace, three-floor, 1,500 capacity club. The lighting's good, but the sound on two of the floors tends to leave a certain amount to be desired. Marco Carola and DJ Rush have both played there recently.

In Nova Gorica, very near the Italian border. An interesting place because it doesn't seem to have a single music policy like so many Slovenian clubs. Two floors, a capacity of 2,000, and great lighting.

There are also infrequent, bigger events such as Meet Me, Design Of Love and Space Night. They're once or twice a year happenings with massive line-ups.






first traces of electronic music began to be found in the region. There were two main names at the time; Tanja (house) and DJ Pero Fullhouse (techno). Pero, his friend e1 and their company Omegaritam became central to the nascent scene, organising more than 200 tech-house and techno parties featuring the likes of Coxy, Nasty, Millsy, Pulleny, Bushwacky et al. From a few hundred people in 1995, right after the Bosnian war, their parties are now attended by several thousand ravers.

Never mind the raving, though, every coastal town (Dubrovnik, Split, Solin, Zadar and Korcula to name but a few) has its own distinct flavour and walking through the tiny alleyways between the ancient stone houses in the area takes you back in time. The fishing is spot on too!

Euro Clubbing WHATEVER TURNS YOU ON NOW

Aurora in Trimoten is the place to be. During winter and autumn it has two indoor dancefloors, and during summer they open the stunning terrace. Mediterranean sunrises, with great music and a view over a small island city, surrounded by sea: it's something everyone needs to experience.

Apart from that, Dalmatia, like the rest of Croatia, doesn't have club spaces that specialise in dance music. Instead they offer day: Monday and Tuesday is Sixties and Seventies, Wednesday and Thursday local music, Friday and Saturday techno and techhouse. The cities are quite

small, so it's hard for clubs to live off one genre of music. Also, most of the clubs are busiest during the summer tourist season, and as so many different people visit, they have to appeal to a very wide audience. So don't be surprised if you end up listening to the folk music with Grandpa, But relax. have a bit to drink and hey, you'll probably end up dancing on the tables.

There are many tiny clubs along the coast to discover in Bars the grand exploratory Croatian tradition. Maybe different kinds of music each you'll dig up something even the locals don't know about! With the hot climate in Dalmatia the only place to be is outdoors: on the beaches and the secret bays where there are plenty of parties

going on (the main islands are Hvar, Korcula and Brac). Every beach cafe has its own DJ, but often an international DJ will turn up while they're on holiday and DJ for fun. These are the ones that you'll remember. More recently, boat parties have begun to take place with some going on for two days.

Local DJs you should look out for are Pero Fullhouse. Silvio Hrabar, Lushi, Josip, Jake, Zorro, Vinketa and Tolle. As for the DJs from the rest of Croatia, look for Frajman, Felver, Kiki and, most importantly, Ivan Komlinovic who is about to became Croatia's Umek. Don't underestimate these guys because you don't know them, they've embarrassed plenty of

superstar DJs in their time. Today, electronic music specifically techno and techhouse - is the major form of entertainment in Dalmatia. All the other genres are covered, except one: trance (cue malevolent titter!).

There's a long tradition of drinking coffee in bars while the sun is too hot, and during summer there are literally thousands of bars you can and will enjoy. Try a few out and you won't have trouble finding one to call your own.

D. Coast: Fact File

Also known as: Ibiza '87 all over again - so keep the fucking Brit promoters out at all costs! • Price of a beer? £1, tops, and you can usually get it much cheaper. • Best souvenir? Get yourself a bottle of seawater [Why? - Ed], a piece of pine tree, a rock and a girl or boy to your liking. Leave the food and drink for when you return. Orug laws: The police are very strict, as no drugs are legal, but drug availability and drug culture is pretty much the same as everywhere else in Europe.

How to get there

The best way is by plane. Prices for return flights from London to Split tend to be about £200-£250. As for the prices, food and drinks are not as cheap as you'd think but don't go to expensive restaurants and you'll be more than happy. The main towns are Split, Zadar and Dubrovnik, but it doesn't matter where you choose as your base, because everywhere is an hour or two away by car, bus or ferry.

Pressure of space means we've had to omit that innovative new Andorran syntheore scene. But the best-of-the-rest-of continental clubbing is compressed here. . .

Athens

Best club: Paradizzio. Top DJs like François K, and a heavy fug of Greek geezers in cheap aftershave.

Getting there: EasyJet (0870-6000-000) from Luton. Prices from £59.

Souvenir: A stray dog. Athens has 50,000 of them and the authorities plan to kill them all with hammers in time for the 2004 Olympics.

Drug laws: Heavy. Very.

Prague

Best club: The Roxy. Prague's most happening, but also most decrepit club.

Getting there: Flights from Stansted with Go (0870-60-76543) from Stansted, from £95 return. Or Czech Airlines (020-7255-1898).

Price of a beer: About 30p! Souvenir: A Czech cartoon about mice being menaced by the forces of oppression, represented by a plasticine dog and some wire wool.

Drug laws: Most recreational drugs have been decriminalised. Nice!

Copenhagen

Best club: Vega. Very hip. The woman from Aqua goes there. Getting there: Go from Stansted, from £55 return. Or fly to nearby Aarhus and Esbjerg with Ryanair (£19.00) and then get a bus.

Price of a beer: 5 Zloty/85p. Souvenir: A woolly Boxing Day pullover. Everybody dresses a bit like Norman Wisdom in Poland.

Drugs: They're available but nobody can afford them. Stick to the apple vodka.

Tallinn, Estonia

Best club: Mutant Disco. Estonia may have won Eurovision, but its youth are better acquainted with nu-jazz and deep house. Expect to be asked questions like "What are your relations with Gilles Peterson?".

Getting there: Estonian Air (020-7333-0196) flies from Gatwick. Prices start at around £231 return.

Price of a beer: £1.68 Souvenir: Blood sausages and blood pancakes - the national delicacy.

Drug laws: The same as the UK, pretty much.

Bergen, Norway

Best club: Clubbing in Norway used to mean whacking baby seals over the head with a truncheon. Get on the net

The best site to get yourself a cheap flight to Europe is www.expedia.co.uk, which keeps an eye out for offers from all airlines. Also try budget airline sites go-fly.com, easyjet.co.uk, and ryanair.com. At buzz.com they usually run special offers towards the tail end of summer, and you may be able to save up to £100 by travelling a few hours earlier or later than originally planned.

Travel last minute

The British Airways travel shop is currently offering smart last minute deals all over Europe. Visit batravelshops.com or ring

0845-606-0747 (8am-8pm). lastminute.com offers a variety of flight only and flight plus accommodation deals and is worth checking on a daily basis.

Book hotels and flights together

You can often get flights at heavily reduced rates if you book them with a couple of nights' accommodation as well. It's sometimes only a few pounds more expensive than when the flights are booked separately. British Airways are currently offering package holidays to Paris from as little as £169. This includes return air flights and

accommodation for two nights. They also have the same offer flying to Madrid for two nights, starting from £231. Website majortravel.com (020-7393-1070) have similar deals that are changed on a regular basis, and travel.guardian.co.uk also have part of their website solely devoted to last minute package deals to Europe and beyond.

Be a student

Full time students and people aged under 26 can visit student travel centres throughout the UK and Ireland for discounted holidays. See statravel.co.uk or call 0870-1600-599.


Use an obscure airline

Remember. . .

- . If you can, use a credit or debit card when booking flights rather than cash. Booking on a card will act as a secondary receipt, in case anything goes wrong, and many credit cards offer automatic insurance.
- Beware of hidden charges. Airport taxes, agent fees and credit card charges can add up to 30% onto the price of an advertised discounted flight offer. Always ask how much the total price of the ticket will be if paying with a debit/credit card before you purchase it.
- Make sure the company you are booking your flights and/or holiday with are both ABTA and ATOL registered wherever possible.



LAYO & BUSHWACKA!

Night Works (XL)

Superior tech-house from the inscrutable End boys

It's an enviable position that Matthew 'Bushwacka!' B and Layo 'Layo' Paskin find themselves in. Quietly revered by those in the know for their immaculate production skills and rumpshaking DJ sets, they've been key figures in the dance scene since the mid-Nineties. But key figures without superstar girlfriends, without legions of blindly worshipping fans, and without so much as a whiff of a sell-out.

Refusing to claw at the big bucks and take short cuts to greater exposure has landed the two beat scientists with a consensus of respect paralleled by very few. Among the cognoscenti, 'Night Works' is as highly anticipated as this year's opuses from Underworld and The Chemical Brothers.

Which perhaps makes it a bit unfortunate that the album opens with a pointless 40 seconds of run-out groove static accompanied by pompous synth washes. There are a further four sub-60 second mini-tunes on the album. This was a device that worked brilliantly on The Black Dog's 'Bytes' 10 years ago, but where that album was a slowly evolving aural travelogue, 'Night Works' is more of a collection of tracks,

and one that clocks in at a mere 45 minutes, at that. It's not that there's anything wrong with that, it just makes these little musical interludes, these tech-house testcards, seem a bit superfluous.

Nevertheless, what is left is more than worthy. Take the taut Transmat-isms of 'All Night Long' for example. Lush, deep tech-house for the first three minutes, it morphs into a great jacking groove with ace scat vocals layered on top.

Better still, the Devosampling 'Love Story' – a showstopper on white label – reappears. Shorn of its tough opening half, what's left is soft bluesy keys and the perfect soundtrack to Terrace-related euphoria for the whole summer.

'2MRW', meanwhile, revisits Bushwacka!'s hardcore past, all brooding suspended chords and sharp snares, and the spectacular 'Automate' lopes out of the shadows of a film noir back alley, out G-Stoning G-Stone in the downtempo stakes.

But what really shines through every track on 'Night Works' is Layo & Bushwacka!'s sophisticated and intricate production. In a concerted effort not to make an album of purely club tracks, it may go slightly awry at times, but for the most part 'Night Works' works. Carl Stroud

Last year's excellent 'Let's Dance'-sampling single 'Can't Punish Me' provides some scant light relief, but in the main, 'Back For The Future' is d&b as it should be: a remorseless onslaught of titanium beats and house-shaking bass. With a cinematic production so impeccably constructed it leaves competitors floundering in its wake, 'Back For The Future' is a cold hearted, shape-shifting white knuckle ride par excellence. 



onight Matthew, I want to be Lauryn Hill. That Ms Dynamite has the former Fugees star firmly fixed in her sights was evident on her single 'It Takes More', and now this fixation gets played out in full on her debut album.

Hooking up with former Fugee producer Salaam Remi, the 20 year-old London MC and singer has dumped the two-step beats that made her name to produce an album that verges on pastiche, singing like Hill on virtually every track and even roping in one of the Marley clan on 'Seed Will Grow'.

In her defence, Dynamite is young and younger artists often start out by mimicking their musical heroes: after all, Marvin Gaye spent the early years of his career trying to be Frank Sinatra, and look where he ended up.

The problem lies in the fact that while Dynamite's album is not without its own charm, it's being hyped to a ridiculous degree. Her record company may think they have a ready-made international recording superstar on their hands, but there simply aren't the hits here to do it.

Dynamite will no doubt be lapped up by the media, but in the long term, she may face problems turning that hype into sales.




AKUFEN My Way (Force Inc)

Chugging beats, anguished, ethereal vocals and an endless stream of identikit releases are only the beginning of the end for this long-beleaguered genre. No

artist in their right mind wants to be labelled prog any more, least of all the DJs, who are actively distancing themselves from the big, bad prog tag. Danny Howells, Red Jerry and James Zabiela are

just three of the DJs who have stopped playing prog in 2002. "We just play house," they reckon, "and breaks."

Breaks is the new fancy of the previously progressive DJ. As the prog tag becomes tired, DJs try to stay ahead of the game, and right now that means making - and playing - breaks. Sasha's saying it, and Digweed is playing it on his new compilation (see page 117 for review). If the beats are boring then the DJ is too and that's the last thing these hipsters want.

Compared to prog, breaks are exciting, experimental and unpredictable.

"All the progressive DJs

switched to playing a mixture of sounds," explains Muzik's own James Zabiela. "There are only a few people - like Anthony Pappa - playing prog now!"

Indeed, even staunch prog-defenders Choo Choo Records are planning to launch a new breakbeat offshoot called Akademia.

"There are only so many synth lines you can listen to again and again," shrugs James. "About 30% of my music is breaks now. I love the warped bassline of people like Meat Katie and Whole 9 Yards."

So there we have it progressive house is dead. Long live the breaks.

by Air and Radiohead were a bit prog-rockist? This makes them sound like Chas & Dave. Granted, things start simply enough on this Future Sound Of London in disguise. The percussive, dramatic 'Elysian Feels' is a cracker, although...isn't that doubt, let's be clear. This is punning title a tad suspicious, and those flutes a little ripe?

But nothing can prepare you for second track, 'The Mello Hippo Disco Show'. Here, 'Strawberry Fields' Mellotron and Pink Floyd guitar scrunches announce Gary Cobain's voice, a little like Svd Barrett or early Bowie, intoning "She's hiding

FSOL under a different name set from the yo-yo/lt's a real nono/Life with Jo-jo".

It seldom gets any less silly from that point onwards, as id you think the albums massed ranks of musicians recreate the sound of the Seventies, while Cobain asks important questions like "Excuse me Mr Spaceman, can't you really spare the long, long-awaited album from time/To float in inner space?" (it is, apparently, "A most extraordinary place".)

Just in case you were in any NOT about the harsh electro of 'Dead Cities', nor the digitally sheened chill of 'Lifeforms', nor, least of all, the rough hardcore alchemy of 'Papua New Guinea'.

'The Isness' can be summed up by its central track, 'The Galaxial Pharmaceutical', an epic that manages to be flatulent, moving, hilarious

and monolithically impressive in its 15-minute span. For this, my friends, is the show that never ends: progressive rock - the most reviled, most financially successful genre of all time. Is that a bad thing? Empirically, yes - but if the alternative is an album's worth of some spunk-bubble with the brass neck to call his third rate electronic farting 'progressive trance' or 'dirty house', we should embrace it with the desperation of thirtysomething spinsters.

And so, through rune manipulation - and maybe just a little bit of cider - we open our third eye and see a vision of the future. Gary Cobain and the other one are atop Mount Vesuvius, capes and hair billowing in the wind. A droplet of sweat falls, as if in slow-mo, from Gary's

Amophous Androgynous head to the country to, like, get their heads together and do some jamming

beard as he grasps the microphone stand, which is made of gold. Behind him, the other one's hands blur through a glissando down the length of one of the 25 keyboards that surround him like a corral. All the while, sitarists, multiple drummers. a children's choir, a 64-piece orchestra, 'luminescence design co-ordinators', vibe watchers, tiger wranglers and mark goes all the way up dancing dwarves are a frenzy

of activity. And the sound. . . the sound is like a beam of white light from Heaven, concentrated into a speck the size of the head of a pin, on which a million billion pixie space-elves dance.

It's a vision that is at once ludicrous and heroic. Just like this album.

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


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

GROOVE ARMADA

Another Late Night (Whoa/Azuli)

ith previous deliveries from such smartly attired sonic postmen as Zero 7 and Rae & Christian, the 'Another Late Night' series appears to have carved itself out a nice little niche in the overstuffed compilation market. Their in-house remit would appear to be mix CDs that sit somewhere between the dancefloor and sunny summer afternoons in the park.

True to form, then, the Armada boys hop gamely around dance music's everexpanding shop in an effort to splice together something that reflects the diversity of the grooves available therein.

Their longstanding deep house credentials are shown off with some classic DiY sound system shaking alongside Charles Webster's unfeasibly deep rewiring of Kimbu Kimra's 'Wake The Dead' and even a touch of Mr Fingers' anthem 'Can You Feel It'.

Meanwhile, those with an aversion to house can take refuge amidst the likes of

Roy Ayers, Al Green, Shuggie Otis (with the spellbinding 'Strawberry Letter 23'), Aretha Franklin and Loose Ends.

The way that big names are sat next to underground producers is echoed in the duo's own mix and match of commerce and club cred. The flitting between tempos and moods comes naturally to the artists who flitted from 'At The River' to 'Shake That Ass' without skipping a beat.

Zero 7's 'Another Late Night' sold over 40,000 copies. Only a fool would bet against Groove Armada repeating such success. (CG)

STEVE LAWLER

Lights Out (Global Underground)

eing Steve Lawler is not an easy job. You start out virtually unknown, but through a lucky mix of right music, right time and a devoted PR man you spin up to the dizzying heights of DJ stardom. However, once there, cynics hold you up as the nemesis of interesting music. A power struggle ensues behind the scenes just as the musical landscape

shifts, until you end up with a two CD compilation on GU that feels like mix albums from two different people.


CD1 is The Sound Of Prog Right Now, baby, and it chugs and plods like a good 'un. You can't dance to it, it doesn't go anywhere, and it's riddled with prog scene cliches such as big, echoey female vocals in uncertain languages. There's a nod to a sense of humour (come on, pick yourself up, it's not that surprising) but generally we've heard all this before.


CD2, however, is an altogether different beast and contains one of the

most astonishing musical transformations since Blur went grunge. Steve Lawler goes electroklash. It takes him five tracks (and peters out towards the end), but it's all here: the sleazy, Germanic robot vocals, growling Eighties synths and staccato riffs.

In fact, blind listening tests in the office have proved that you cannot tell the difference between an electroklash compilation and a Steve Lawler mix album for GU. Mr Lawler, sir, you are evidently still capable of surprising us. Fair play to you. (CM)

Subliminal Sessions 3 (Subliminal)


iminutive minister of funk and Subliminal label head Morillo returns with the third, supremely groovy Session. Picking up the baton from Harry 'Choo Choo' Romero's rather schizophrenic 'Session Two', Morillo ups the ante with a superlative three-disc blowout during which the baby-faced maestro broadens and redefines the Subliminal sound.

Don't fret though – the classic and rightly well-loved Subliminal 'proper house' blueprint is present and correct, especially on the third, vocal-heavy mix, but elsewhere the wind of change blows.

The autobahn electroklash fury of Who Da Funk's 'Sting Me Red' kicks off CD2, girding the loins for what is to come – a joyful dirty house racket that forces you to dance and makes you wanna fuck. Even when the heavy Scandinavian gear of Adam Beyer is slamming it into the rattling glamour of FC Kahuna's' 'Glitterball'.

This mix is more than merely a label showcase. XL Recordings crop up with possibly the greatest single of the year in the shape of 'Love Story' by Layo & Bushwacka!. Josh Wink's Ovum imprint is drafted in for 'Freak'. Also included is the ultra-exclusive and gloriously sophisticated, gimmick-free banger of 'Come Make Me Over' by Morillo himself, making us love him even more.

At times splendidly joyful, at times, deviantly sexy. Crucially, never strictly Subliminal. But this third Session is consistently brilliant. (CS)



CreamCollect Techno

CreamCollect Techno is the third installment in this series showcasing the best past, present and future techno on 3xCD. Includes Dave Clarke, Robert Armani, Oxia, Speedy J, Laurent Garnier, Plastikman, Samuel L Sessions, DJ Hell, Model 500, Hardfloor, Carl Craig, Ron Trent, Octave One and many more.

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DJ KICKS: **PLAYGROUP** (!K7)

What's It all about? Taking a breather from releasing endless Kruder & Dorfmeister outtakes, sorry remix collections, the tragically hip !K7 recordings have got the tragically hip Trevor 'Playgroup' Jackson to put together the most nebulous compilation for some time

What's on it? Interstellar space jazz (I:Cube's mix of Ana Rago's 'You're Good'), no-wave post punk shrieking (Smith 'N' Hack's 'To Our Disco Friends'), defiantly odd Eighties Chicago-style jack trax (Random Factor's 'Broken Mirror') and Himalayan nose-flute boogaloo (not really). And numerous other less-ismore slabs of aural deviance.

Any cop then? A belter, certainly, if you enjoy spending time being baffled and mildly frustrated by wanton and determined obscurantism. (CS) * *

(Gatecrasher Music) What's it all about? It's about thinking outside the box, driving the market - oh sorry, wrong meeting. The clubbing equivalent of Sainsbury's sets out its latest stall, offering easily consumable trance products at unbeatable prices. Yum! What's on it? 'Consequence' by MORPH packs a satisfyingly psychedelic punch, but 'Believe' by the Traveller In Motion sounds as if it was written to sell Ford Mondeos. CD2 is a bit beefier, but you'll have heard much of this before, even if you've never been to Gatecrasher. Any cop then? What's on it? Available in mixed and unmixed versions, there's the fluffy (Dubtribe Sound System's 'Do It Now'), the kitsch (Lazyboy's 'Don't Fret George') and, in the case of Gutbrod's remix of Vangelis' 'Love Theme' from Blade Runner, a classic overhauled respectfully.

Any cop then? Deep, spirited, and free of ambient slop, here's a perfect addition to your chill out canon. (AC)



JOHN DIGWEED MMII (Bedrock)

What's it all about? As the big name progressive DJs edge away from the sound, Diggers lumbers towards a new agenda.

What's on it? Breaks, more breaks, then prog. It opens with the glittering 'Lonely Planet' from Pollon, turns car advert dreamy, bounces for a bit then gets flaccid, as five tracks in we hit Flash Brothers' prog chug. Inevitably features tracks from James Holden, Spooky and, er,

Shakespear's Sister (a remix). Any cop then? The breaks stuff sounds fresh and interesting, and more importantly, this is as close as you'll get to a preview of the forthcoming Sasha album. John and Sasha have been spending so much time together their periods have coincided and this is the sounds of where both their heads are at. For Diggers fans, a work of genius. For the rest of us the beginning of something a bit more interesting. (CM)



MANTRONIX That's My Beats! (Soul Jazz)

What's it all about? This beat is Mantronik: the authentic sound of an android b-boy's block party circa 1982, on the world's most lavishly hand-tooled reissue label.

What's on it? An electronic soup of early hip hop (Funky Four Plus One, T La Rock); disco (Machine, Unlimited Touch) and some o' that goddam Yoor o-peen electro faggot music (Visage, Yello, Art Of Noise), Lyrical concerns run from the pressing need for all party people to get funky, to dark social satire, with Machine's 'There But For The Grace Of God' managing both.

Any cop then? Sure is. Buy this and relive a time when the Africans In Space futurism of Herbie Hancock and Funkadelic met up with chilly, post-Kraftwerk European computer rock and anything seemed possible, fleetingly. (DB) * * *

What's on it? Guess. Miss Kittin and The Hacker? Yes. Tiga? Yes. Ellen Alien? Yes, yes, yes, they're all here, but there is a lot of less well-known

stuff too. CD1 is more tuneful, CD2 much harder and nastier, but both do an excellent job of exploring the world around the much-hyped centre of the scene There's hits of techno. industrial, art-rock, rap, breaks and even tracks that verge on (gasp!) house music

Any cop then? Best stab so far at an electroklash introduction and gets across that this is something genuinely thrilling in a way dance music hasn't been for a while. It does make you realise, though, that this whole electroklash thing is essentially just goth techno. (CM) ***



TWISTED SESSIONS: TRISTAN MIX

(Twisted)

What's it all about? Nothing to do with Rob di Stefano and Danny Tenaglia (the American Twisted) and everything to do with world-hopping psychedelic trance boshed together by the Soho-to-Singapore scenester with the posh name, DJ Tristan.

What's on it? A sound that's only a tweak away from progressive but harsher, more driving, and more obviously techno-influenced. Someone called Aphid Moon contributes which can only be a good thing.

Any cop then? A fair amount. There was a time many (aphid) moons ago when the market was so saturated with 303-addled, effects-heavy 4/4 throb, it became both annoying and boring. Other standout tracks include the hypnotic bass growl of 'At That Place' by Lil' Mark, 'Drug' by The Drug Punks, which can only be described as 'druggy', and DJ Vibe's mix of 'The Light' by PIMP. And that's just the first CD!

Any cop then? Solid, dependable and frequently squiffy, Orde Meikle and Stuart McMillan are two of the most reliable figures in the techno fraternity - and this is their mix. History repeating

Reissue frenzy grips dance music - should we care?

hat do Frog-house compilation 'Super Discount', Coldcut's '70 Minutes Of Madness' and De La Soul's 'Three Feet High And Rising' have in common? No, they haven't all been mixed together into a backing track for the next Sugababes single, they're all classic dance albums that have recently been re-released.

Electronic dance music, formerly the constantly evolving sound of now. is increasingly looking to the past. This, before you seize pitchforks, tar and feathers and head off to the nearest record company office, need not be a bad thing. Although feel free to do that if you want, obviously. Post-acid house British dance music's obsession with what's going on this week, to the exclusion

of everything else, has long been a failing as much as a strength. That a market is emerging for 'classics' in our throwaway world is something to be cautiously welcomed.


"'70 Minutes Of Madness' had a limited run," says Jonathon More of Coldcut. "Copies of the original CD were changing hands on ebay for £70 a pop. It makes good business sense for JDJ to have a reissue."

But if the reissue of '70 Minutes. . is good news, the reappearance of 'Super Discount' is more dubious. It never became unavailable, but it's


now out in a 'Fifth Anniversary Edition', complete with some rather average remixes. It feels like the record company are trying to flog us something we've already got - a familiar ploy in the rock world.



VITAL RELEASE

JAY HOWARD Trackdown EP (Cordless)

rom its first release, Blackman's wiggedout 'Muestra Me', Cordless has consistently delivered the deep dollar. DJ Q's '2 Bad Acid' EP was one of the finest dancefloor cut-ups of last year (ripping 'Uptown' into a seriously sick groove) and now, with Jay Howard's 'Trackdown', they have another prime time floorfiller. The title track is a furious mix of heavy beats, bubbling basslines and 'Sueno Latino' synths, all tied up with Carl Craig-style cool. Just imagine DJ Q's funky DJing



technique distilled into 12 loud inches and you have the sound of 'Trackdown'. For those looking for a deeper cut, check out 'On My Mind' and 'Change', where Howard takes us back to the early Nineties with some laid back afterhours house. (KM)

KIM ENGLISH Been So Long (Hysteria)

Take a classic New Jersey singer: Miss English. Add a classic song: Ms Anita Baker. And a classic remix team: Wamdue Kids. You know the result's gonna be quality. As deep and warm as you can go without losing the floor, Kim English keeps Ms Baker's original soulful vibe. Purist shit. (TF)

HECHER & WARD Cosmic Vibes EP (Tweakin')

Keeping with that Jacked-up, tracky thang, this is jazz noodle at its best – it's like Dexter Wansell having a wank with DJ Sneak. The drums are just so good, and to be honest without that trackheadness it could have been a bit Dad. Great production usually frightens off the Teds and probably this will probably be no different. Well, fuck 'em. (TF)

LOS AMIGOS INVISIBLES Bruia (Luaka Bop, USA)

Following right on from their swish reworking of Nina Simone for Verve, the Masters give Los Amigos Invisibles the Latin house once-over. 'Bruja' presses all the right buttons with Kenny Dope delivering fat and chunky beats while Louier's smooth chords and bumpy bass are the perfect backing for Jose Luis Pardo's bossa grooves. Classy. (KM)

SHADOW KINGS Get Strong (Chez)

A quality label, Chez are also throwers of one of the best Miami parties. I don't know who the Shadow Kings are, but the spoken word speaks wisdom about slavery and injustice in Amerikkka, underpinned by deep, jazzy, Detroit undertones. Buy it. (TF)

KIMRA

Essential Things (Mantis)

'Raise The Dead', Kimra's three year-old cut on Mantis is a bona fide house classic. And while 'Essential things' might not be cut out of the same (Mood II Swing-style) cloth, it is, as the title suggests, equally indispensable. The 4/4 electronic grooves that made 'RTD' such a smash are replaced with a percussive groove, jerky bass and some smart keyboard soloing, with Kimra's dangerously cool vocal floated over the top. (KM)

ATOMFUNK Outsider (Toko)

After a recent run of deep and musical workouts, Toko are back with a bang. 'Outsider' is one of those special floorfillers where the moodlifting chords are kept in check by the rhythms and bass, which perform the more rudimentary operations of dance music. The result is a superb crowd pleaser that will still be around after many a filtered disco loop has wearily packed its bags and gone home. Like the awesome Salt City Orchestra mix of Nick Holder's 'Paradise' - a cut from the same studio - this is a record that you should not be without, (KM)

DAVID CHONG

Kenny's Girlfriend/Auto Ed (Trax)

For lovers of house, Trax Records out of Chicago will always be a Pandora's box of memories. Well now they're back and this time it's near-virgin vinyl they're pressing on. David Chong's excellent pairing is just bad to the bone, old school Chicago. Jazzy melodies mix with funk samples and that 'bumpity bump' you get from anything of note that comes from the windy city. (TF)

TRIBALATION

Falling Down/Ghetto People (Nightshift, US)

The Tribalation duo of Grant Dell and Gareth Oxby follow up their EPs for Loaded and Big Chief with a solid two-tracker for Tony Hewitt's Tango subsidiary Nightshift. 'Falling Down' is the standout cut, its conga rhythms spiced up with some Chicken Lipsstyle dub action. (KM)

AUDIO SOUL PROJECT Community (NRK)

Ignore all the other mixes and head straight for the Francois K and Rob Rives interpretations on this juicy double pack from NRK. The New York experimentalists hit home with dark and moody mixes of elastic basslines and distorted dub effects. Add to that some spoken words about the house community and a splash of warm chords and rubbery keys and NRK have another fine addition to their catalogue. (KM)

ROCKET

Out With The Tide (Jeno's Keyed In Mix) (Grayhound, USA)

On first listen, this sounds like little more than some San Francisco beats, two Rhodes chords, a classy guitar lick and a deep, funky bassline.

Actually, that's all it is, if you break it down like that. However this is one of those records that is greater than the sum of its parts, and I can imagine this rocking the likes of the Bomb and the Sub Club with ease. (KM)

STEPHANIE COOKE I Thank You (King Street)

Again, purist heaven for the heads. This comes in a good Lenny Fontana 'classic style' mix and a wonderful Shelter family mix from the superb Blaze and Timmy Regisford. A lot of music is now coming out of New York that's aimed squarely at floors such as Shelter and Andre Collins' warehouse up in The Bronx. Yes, it is a soulboy niche, yes it is old-fashioned, but unlike faddy styles of dance, it remains constant and sounds brill with a bit of love powder. Or so my mate Dave tells me. (TF)

KENNY HAWKES & LOUISE CARVER Play The Game (Music For

Freaks)

After the successes of 'Ashley's War' and 'Sleaze Walking' I thought we would have seen a lot more Kenny Hawkes releases than we have. Here, everyone's favourite globetrotting house head drops another stone-cold killer. Making great use of the impressive vocals of South African rock chick Louise Carver, Hawkes has created a dark, funky anthem that comes across like a sleazy Billie Ray Martin (or an upbeat Ethyl Meatplow - take your pick). And if they can find a way to oust Sophie Ellis Bextor and her posh singing pap from the radio, Music For Freaks could have a hit on their

PETE MOSS & TERRA DEVA

After 2 (Definity, US)

hands, Don't miss out. (KM)

Pete Moss follows up his recent collaboration with Denise De La Cruz on Ovum with this spooky workout for Definity. Here, Moss' bumpy electronics are accompanied by the breathy vocals of Terra Deva and, where De La Cruz's vocals added a shimmering quality to his work, Deva's flickering delivery contributes a funky edge that gives the piece a wonderfully unusual flavour. For those looking for a more direct route to success, Satoshi Tomile provides the main room boom on the flip. (KM) ***

LOUIE BALO FEATURING JEANIE HOPPER Guiding Light (NRK)

Pete Heller returns to form on the seriously on-form NRK label. 'Guiding Light' is a sleeper from last season featuring the wonderfully dark, percussive vibes of Luie Balo and some sensual spoken words from the fab Ms Hopper. Peteski works a mood that's both retro and futuristic, with an old school Detroit bassline and strings that lead into a more techy finale. Tons of harder, cosmic-appella and big room-style mixes make this a near-unbeatable package. (TF)

EVOLUTION FEATURING JAYNE HANNA Walking On Fire (Bedrock) hat an anthem! A

limited run of TPs earlier this year on its original Fluid label saw an unprecedented 12 plays on Pete Tong - incredible. It was duly snapped up by Diggers and remixed by him and Nick Muir as Bedrock and also by The Beloved. The resulting package is simply mind-blowing. The original on its own warrants Vital Release status, but when you add a monster Bedrock vocal and a cool 'n' deadly dub to the quirky

Beloved mix there is simply no choice - this record wins hands down. Jayne Hanna's sublime vocal and choice lyrics set this release so far ahead of the rest it's painful. With the massive Bedrock behind it, could we even see some chart action now?

YUNUS Red Pilot (Silver Planet)

They are back on a roll down at Silver Planet, with James Holden and now Yunus Guvenen, their latest discovery, who follows his fabulous 'IP True' with this, even better, release. Deep, chuggy progressive house with a Nineties-style melody that simply takes your breath away. Awesome! ***

SPYLAB

Celluloid Hypnotic (Guidance)

A few years back you would never have found one of their records reviewed here, but now, with everything converging back to one house sound, even Guidance are releasing progressive-based records! With its deep, techy grooves and incredible, spaced-out vocals, this is a tune that fans of the Creamer & K sound will flip over. Ace!

MARA

Stripped Beats EP (Choo Choo)

A whopping double-header. On the A-side, 'Computer Beats' is a fat, tough, quirky house workout that gets all twisted and dirty through the break. The flip has a more typical mix (if there is such a thing for Mara), dark bass driving through hypnotic percussive. Sexily different! ***

AKODAMA Slightly Forward

(SAW Recordings)

We spoke here last month of this new guy, a genius no less - Madoka, Well here he is again under another guise. Akodama. 'Slightly Forward' has a more underground vibe to it. An overwhelmingly deep, warm bassline with an eerie, female vocodered vocal, fused with mountains of percussion. Superb stuff. ***

FORCE MASS MOTION Release Me (Fluid)

A departure from the norm for FMM. The very now and trendy, minimal

progressive vibe is displayed perfectly here and that's probably the reason we find it sat proudly on Fluid. A simple female vocal adds a seductive edge to the main mix, with a deeper dub completing the package nicely. ***

SUBTECH Try Me/Piano Heaven

(Subtech) Matts Dunning and Jackson are back with another mind-blowing production.

'Try Me' rocks, building with weird, ethnic percussion to a strangely infectious breakdown. 'Piano Heaven' is redolent of Ibiza terrace parties back in the early Nineties - close your eyes and you're there!

CHAMBER Thunder Dub (Progress Inn)

The original mix of 'Thunder Dub' has a dark, dirty vibe - but in a very positive way. Techy round the edges with a great bassline and a moody. Eighties-style synth through the break. Cool! Greed tighten it all up and make it 'arder.



GASTON & PHILLIPS Nsolacion (POD)

The first double-pack for POD and a new direction too, with soulful female vocals over a deeper house groove than usual. PP&M remix it into a more typical prog workout and Wawa provide two underground tribal mixes. Definitely worth checking, even if POD ain't your usual cup of tea.

ROBBIE RIVERA

Trippin' (Fuju)

The rhythms on 'Trippin" are totally wacked-out, almost like early Detroit techno. The original will appeal to those with broader minds but for those less open to diversity, head for the Futureshock re-edit where a punchier kick pulls the track together in a tighter and slightly more progressive way. Fantastically original! ***

MOONY

Dove (I'll Be Loving You) (Positiva)

John Creamer and Stephan K - do I need say any more? [Yes: we pay you by the word - Ed.] Each and every time they produce, new and awesome things happen. Here, a simple bassline and melody lie perfectly below the exquisite vocals of Monica Bragato (DB Boulevard). A must! ***

PERPETUAL TWO Disorientation (Perpetual Tunes)

Fred Numf Versus Five Point O are possibly the most UK-sounding of the Dutch producers, as 'Disorientation' demonstrates perfectly. Full-on, driving progressive house with the potential to attract a wider audience. Worth a good look.

* * *

LORIENT Salvation (Inversus)

Hot on the heels of Sunkissed & Technology, the US indie Inversus drops another huge release. 'Salvation' is best in its Sphere remix form - dark and solid. There's also an original mix, Luke Fair's slightly lighter and techy effort and Digby & Oliver do their Oz thing too. Something for everyone?

CASS & SLIDE

Havoc (Fire)

The original mix is a funky electro oddity typical of this year's C&S album. Mixes come from the Flash Brothers who add 4/4 flavours; Tom Mangan, with a deep, minimal mix; and Voodoo Jedi Lounge Collective with a tougher. breaks-based groove. It's a far cry from classics like 'Opera' though. . . 賣賣賣

MOSHIC & ZIDAN 10@ZE (Plastica)

The first three minutes of this are minimal almost to the point of being ridiculous - just a pounding kick and tight hats with the odd spaced-out synth wash. But then a fiendish bassline comes in and an 'Flements' type vocal gives the wow factor. Brave

INDIGO

Division (EQ)

Keith McDonnell from Innate and Baroque teams up with Andy Moor to form Indigo for the Aussie label EQ. 'Division' is the outcome and rather nice it is too, sneakily creeping up on you with its seductive strings and cheeky melody. Then, Moshic somehow manages to make even this ray of sunshine dark and techy - how does he do it? * * * *

JAMES HOLDEN **VERSUS BEN POUND**

Kaern Turned (Easy Access)

When James mixed last year's 'Fear Of A Silver Planet' compilation last year he placed his ambient track 'Kaern' over Ben Pound's 'Turned'. The result was breathtaking - so much so that Silver Planet's sister label, Easy Access, have thought 'Hey! Let's put it out'. The resulting 'official bootleg' is awesome, and guess what - they have put the original ambient mix on the B-side and put the record in a limited edition, hand-sprayed sleeve. Aren't they good? ***

RAISANI & BORGESIUS Turn Don't Push (Majestic)

'Who the Hell are Raisani & Borgesius?' I hear you cry. Well, they are none other than Pako & Frederik. Now that's got your attention, hasn't it? These guys are soon going to be challenging Sander and Remy for the crown of Dutch kings of prog and 'Turn Don't Push' is quite simply another great, simple record.

DAVE GARDNER & ANDY MOOR

Lose Yourself (white label)

On first listen you could be fooled into thinking 'Okay, not bad', but ferfuxache go back and listen again. There's something about this record - granted it doesn't come crashing through the speakers screaming 'listen to me'. What it does instead is to craftily entice you in and take you on a very pleasant journey, a bit like a summer drive in a sports car, with the top down. * * *

EDDIE FLASHIN' FOWLKES

My Soul (Tresor, Germany)

ddie Fowlkes is something of a legend. Outspoken. opinionated and awkward, he's Detroit's original moodyman and in techno circles he's either dismissed as a moaning ninny or revered as a bullshit-cutting hero. That, however, is not the reason why he's sitting pretty at the top of this month's page. He's made this month's Vital Release because the two original tracks here, taken from his genre-busting 'Technosoul' album, still sound as fresh,



vibrant and essential as they did when they first came out in 1992. Add to that a Mark Broom re-rub that has to rate as remix of the year and you've got a pretty tasty record. Two classics and one future classic - not bad for seven quid, eh? (DM)

JEL FORD

Coming Of Age (Jericho)

The A-side track here is typical Ford business: dark, fast, percussive, funky techno with a slightly ravey edge that will, I'm sure, do well all over Europe. Don't ignore the flipside though, it's slower, groovier and to these ears, altogether the better cut. Another strong release from one of Britain's best techno producers. (DM)

MR C FEATURING **ROBERT OWENS**

The Club (The End)

The first single from Mr C's forthcoming debut album, in which the former pop star, club owner and all round top-notch international DJ marries his trademark percussionfuelled grooves to the voice of house music. The flip, meanwhile, sees 16B strip things down and

deliver one of his typically chuggy, nu-prog groovers. (DM)

EDDIE RICHARDS Untitled (Adroit)

Eddie Richards' new label gets off to a flying start with this Latino-style tech-houser. Built around a simple, slightly disco-styled b-line, some funky percussion and a few choice samples ('Sueno Latino' and 'Carnival De Cassa') it's an absolute joy to mix. The flipside features a surprisingly mellow, downtempo cut-up of Kool & The Gang's 'Summer Madness'. (DM)

SPINCYCLE

She Loves Me (Surreal) Even though the title track here probably won't go down in history as

one of Spincycle's best efforts, it

matters little, because over on the flip our lads from Leeds have pulled out all the stops. They've studied their old Black Dog records, found the perfect synth sound and produced what might just be remembered as - you guessed it one of their best efforts. (DM) ***

LEN LEWIS Dark Cavern (Poodle)

A daft name for a label of course, but seeing as they've been putting out some pretty decent music of late, we won't hold that against them. This time round, south London's Len Lewis is at the controls and if you're in to funky tech-house with a decidedly deep, almost mellow slant, then this is definitely something you'll want to track down. (DM)

ALAN BARRATT House Music/Don't (Suburbia)

True to its name the lead track here is a bouncy, US-style house groove nice, but nothing special. Over on the flip, though - a recurring theme this month - Barratt delivers an absolutely splendid, ultra-driving, funky techno lick that's beautifully tempered with some huge, sweeping pads. Think Jel Ford on a West Coast tip and you're there. (DM)

LEIGH DICKSON

Praise (Qube)

The great thing about this label is its complete unpredictability. You never know what you're going to get, but invariably it's good. On this occasion it's old school, string-fuelled, Detroit style electronica with a nice, shiny, new school vibe. And with Peter Ford remixing the rather lovely title track, this really is worthwhile. (DM)

DIMENSION 5 Dark City (Delsin, Holland)

Another trench-deep outing of deep, moody techno from what has to rate as the world's deepest label. Rrrolling, old school toms, Mayday acid licks, dark strings and low slung Chicago style bass grooves - yep, this is proper deep shit alright. (DM)

SONIC INSOMNIAC Tareth EP (New Religion)

It's official, New Religion have done the impossible. They've made deep techno trendy again. Not since the days of Fat Cat, New Electronica LPs and the Aphex Twin making listenable records has so much attention been given to the genre, and this Red Planet-style threetracker can only help things along. Well done those chaps. (DM)

STOP OUTS

Sensual (Oblong)

After Oblong's last slice of ultra deepness with 100 HZ, Rob Coleman joins the roster with a techno-tinged deep house cut that truly lives up to its name. Backed by the lush strings and early Nineties electronica style beats of 'Absorption' this is a really strong debut from an artist to watch. (DM)

* * * *

JOLLY MUSIC EP 3/Radio Jolly (Illustrious, Italy)

After trawling through dozens of crappy Eighties re-hashes (of which, incidentally, Linda Lamb's 'Hot Rooms' had to rate as this month's most embarrassing) 'EP 3' sounds pretty good. Featuring two new mixes by Detroit's Adult. and Holland's Parallax Corporation, this actually has some groove and feeling, instead of the usual camp reference points and daft 'we're sooo decadent' lyrics. (DM)

PERCY X Afterplan (Soma)

Capable of causing mayhem in any club, both on and off the decks, Tony 'Mad Dog' McMad of the Soma clan cranks the old sporran up to 11 once

more with a cheeky steal from disco's most infamous bassline I'Ra Ra Rasputin'? - Ed.1 laced with some heavy duty techno trickery. With three tracks to choose from, the wigged out Detroitian funk of the title track wins the day by being tighter than a gnat's chuff. Just don't let this man near your whiskey. (JS)

SCAPE 1 **Planet Funk Express** (Electrix)

Once in a blue moon, a record comes along that stops you dead in your tracks. 'Planet Funk Express' is just that - a whistle-stop tour across the globe on the deviant electro express with eight (count 'em, baby) outrageously stonking killers. Taking in various elements of electronica, techno and lashings of dark bass with a keen sense of minimalism, Kurt Baggaley has well and truly fulfilled the potential he's so often shown. Unstoppable. (JS)

SMASH TV Nobody (Remixes) (Bpitch Control)

Running on high-octane electro power, Smash TV prove once more that this ain't no retro revival, baby, with three mixes of their futureshockin' 'Nobody' jamming the airwaves with plenty of spiky grit and determined robo chic. With remix action from Modeselektor, GROM and Babs Morgernstern, it could well be time to chuck your television out of the window. Smashin'. (JS)

BLACK FACTION Manchesteriqueconcrete (Dalriada)

The Rub-A-Dub crew unleash another experiment onto the field of electronic soundscapery with the help of Manchester-based Black Faction's tripped out sonic design. Blending beats, de rigeur eastern/ethnic influences and downtempo electronica, Mr Faction mixes a heady brew of rhythmic patterns for a more discerning home listening techno experience. Quality assured. (JS) ***

IEART OF PERCY X

The X-man gives us a guided tour through some of the highlights of his excellent new album, 'Where's The Music?



"I was finding that audiences were looking for me to play either straight, looped techno or more electronic, analogue-style music. What I wanted was to combine the two and I think I've achieved that.

"Now You're Mine' is the kind of thing I've always wanted to make, a cross between classic Detroit electro and Kraftwerk/romantic electro (hence the title). 'Dark 'N'

Sharp', which is only available on the vinyl release, is like early Hood and Mills, the kind of techno which isn't being made enough these days but which still rocks the clubs. 'Club X' is a cross between looped techno and the Gigolo style, with minimalism being the key.

"'Afterplan' takes the bassline essence of 'Now You're Mine' to the dancefloor while maintaining the

soul, while 'Casiotone' is the most light-hearted track on the album.

"Finally, 'Time To Jack' was inspired by Channel 4's Pump Up The Volume programme, I was battered on the green stuff, and remembered how much I like old school Chicago basslines."

STIMULANT DJS **Blow Da Roof (Stimulant)**

'Blow Da Roof' sees the Stims continue towards more uplifting and melodic territory, seemingly aiming for a UK take on the currently popular German style, and they are getting there. MAURO PICOTTO Back To Cali (BXR UK)

Head of the Italian hard house mafia Mauro is positively schizophrenic on 'Back To Cali'. On the non-DJ friendly 'Original Claxixx Mix', a sea of summer sounds and swirling synths are so happy there should be a law against them. The dark drums and analogue whines and screeches of the 'Megavoices Mix', meanwhile, are about as dark as it gets. At least I hope so. It will be massive, mind. * * *

VARIOUS ARTISTS The Circle Of Friends EP Remixes Part 1 (Vicious Circle)

More top-notch toughness from the man like Glazby's label. Knuckleheadz turn in one of their best remixes in a while with a fast, furious and funky job on 'Rock Da House', while on the flip, Mik Cree dons his Dynamic Intervention suit and gives the RR

Fierce epic 'Yamamba' an ace, hoover-tastic makeover that's positively destructive on the floor.

PHIL REYNOLDS & **CHRIS HAMPSHIRE** (Let's) Ride The Wave

(Interflow)

Frantic's Phil Reynolds teams up with respected producer Chris Hampshire for a delightful dip in less, um, frantic waters than usual. It's got an old skool nu-NRG feel, bounding along with a big smile on its mush, with a floaty synth hook teasing until the main riff seduces you. The 'Vince Nysse Remix' is a stripped bare alternative, all acidic sweeps and top-end tomfoolery.

VINYL COUP **Bang Goes The Drum** (12-Inch Thumpers)

Sometimes less is more, and the minimal but monstrous 'BGTD' proves the case in point. Relying on a rolling b-line and crisp percussion, topped with only one catchy riff and intermittently prodded by the nagging title refrain, you need to hear it in a club to appreciate it fully. The slightly tougher 'Ladies & Gentlemen' is similar, but the slowed down section kills it, in my opinion.

ASYS Nightmare (Solar)

Kicking off with wobbly bass and thumping drums, this slightly Germanic affair erupts with 303s, then settles into a subtle stompathon with plenty of sharp synths. It's refreshing in both style and arrangement. The full-on Germanic '140 Squadron Mix' adds military drums, and the 303 takes centrestage. Relax - the Germans might be all over clubland, but they won't win the World Cup.

DJ LOVE Who Do You Love? (Baby Doll)

An unsung hero of hard house history, having been responsible, as co-writer, for much of the classic Tripoli Trax sound of old, Harry Love is now inhouse programmer at Baby Doll. His solo debut is more infectious than a worm virus, an uplifting anthem best described as a 21st century version of Klubbheads at their peak versus Red Jerry at his peak. It's that good it brings tears to your eyes.

DARREN STYLES

Black Magic (Nukleuz)

While we eagerly await new material from their in-house hero BK, Nukleuz continues on its trancier - or should I say more 'hard dance' (snigger) path with the debut offering from Taiko remixer Darren Styles, It's very catchy, with a recognisable riff and optimum melody content in both of its similar mixes. Unlikely to set the world on fire, but a promising debut nonetheless.

* * *

DJ ASTRID VERSUS **TOMMY PULSE**

Twinkle (Warner Music, Belgium)

Knocking kick-drums and a deep bass combine on this Dutch-flavoured effort from two continental DJs. Twisted acid lines drive it superbly until the classy, almost ethereal breakdown, then the sort of niggling synths you'd expect take over until the acidic bursts return. Not strictly hard house, but I can think of dozens of our DJs that will spin it.

JON THE BAPTIST Schmoo (2XS Recordings)

An intriguing double-header. 'Schmoo' is underpinned by a grumbling bass and sits somewhere between the trance, techno and hard house camps, while the more energetic 'Boombaa' from Stormtrooper & Spinout - great name, don't you think? - is tuneful hard trance that doesn't lose it on the aggression front.

BLACKSTONE **FEATURING TUFF INC** State Of Mind (Remote)

This deep and soulful house workout features the haunting vocals of Tuff Inc. and comes accompanied by a tougher, bass-heavy workout from Remote's head honcho Ziad. Ideal material for the likes of Steve Thomas, Jody Osman and Alan Thompson, and another great example of less being much more.

NARCOMANIACS **Kick Some Ass (Hard Dance)**

After their storming debut on DIP, Narcomaniacs (aka one-to-watch Matt Clarke and Mik Cree) return on their own label with another slamming session of NRG, replete with quirky stabs and insistent vocal bites. The tough Paul Glazby remix adds acidic touches and extra synth lines while retaining the original's euphoric exuberance. A savage label debut! ***

SPECIALIST ALBUM

KOO

Urban Anthems (Recover)

Popular live act K90 - who has remixed for big guns Tidy and Nukleuz - unleashes a solid debut album that pushes all the right buttons for lovers of tuneful trance and banging house. Tough beats and mesmerising melodies are the order of the day, and highlights include the uplifting 'Colours', the menacing 'Chemical Love' and the blistering 'Ultimate Frontier'.

WAL RELEASE

THE RAPID EYE Circa Forever (ATCR)

teve Helstrip and Tim Stark have been working long hours recently in an effort to finish production on what is possibly their finest work to date. As with all previous releases, the boys have worked to get the sound just so. Every instrument is placed to perfection, every sound used to its fullest potential. The result is a high-class trancer with a melody to die for. "I handed a copy to Ferry Corsten in Passion," says Tim, "and he played it a few records later! You should have seen



the crowd's reaction - it was incredible!" Pedro Del Mar Versus DJ Shah, Free Radical and Iberia's 'Mainroom Mix' will feature on the finished copy. The Rapid Eye's 'REMix' is, without doubt, a formidable piece of dance music. Seek it out.

THOMAS TROUBLE The Real Hardcore (Blutonium)

Prepare for trouble and make it double! Thomas Trouble, one of San Francisco's most popular DJs, is creating all kinds of mayhem with this, his latest and greatest track. An absolutely blaring, hard combination of melody, pounding basslines and uncompromising kicks, this is intense! For the icing, Thomas adds air raid sirens, just to make things totally berserk.

ORGAN DONORS Bad Karma (Sectioned)

I find constant amusement that this label is called Sectioned: imagine the fun you could have being locked up in the nut bin for a few weeks! [Are you sure? - Ed.1 In case you were wondering, brothers Scot and Matt Harris are the Organ Donors, and with four years' production experience behind them, this initial outing into the harder end of the trance spectrum is extremely promising. Überdruck provide corking acid mayhem remixes. Lock me up and throw away the key!

MEDWAY VERSUS PETE GAWTRY

Geno Sequence (Remixes) (Decipher)

Although I didn't think that this track could be made any better, I stand or rather sit, while typing - corrected. Mark Shimmon, something of a dab hand in the studio, has once again proved his mettle with a gutsy trance remix of the original track. But wait, there is more: Paul Rodgers & Chris Gainer supply a darkly progressive Substructure remix and it would be a sin not to mention it here.

INSIDE

Fly To My Arms (Future Sound Corporation)

Do sir and madam prefer it hard and banging, or more trancey? It's a question that often perplexes ardent clubbers as they try to follow the rise and fall of the hypnotic soundscape. What if you could have your cake and eat it, with a tearingly aggressive bassline teasingly melded to an uplifting synthesizer melody? 'Fly To My Arms' combines these elements to exceptional effect. That will do nicely, thank you...

SOL RAY & DAN BASELEY

Speechless (Solar)

While previous Solar tracks have been very good, they were just not for this cat, However, when I tentatively placed 'Speechless' on my turntable on a recent Sunday afternoon, I was indeed struck dumb. Sol and Dan have concocted a tune that builds and builds with the most pleasing 303 stabs for ages. Apparently this is 'trancetek'. Hmm.

AIRWAVE

Another Dimension (Bonzai Trance Progressive, Italy)

Airwave, one of the shining stars in the Bonzai firmament, has been responsible for countless dancefloor smashes across the globe. 'Another Dimension', from his forthcoming artist album 'Believe', is one you will definitely want to add to your collection, then sit back smugly as it becomes acknowledged as a modern classic. A cert for UK release very soon.

GRAHAM GOLD High Lady (Good:As)

Graham appears to be blurring the distinction between trance and progressive with the genre-fusing 'High Lady'. Depending on the pitch,

it could be played comfortably in either style. The simple yet effective melody complements the overall production, giving a very smooth finish, and Jez Ansell provides the remix. Is it about a woman who's off

her cake? We may never know.

JONES & STEPHENSON The First Rebirth (Bonzai Italy)

This trance masterpiece first appeared as Prolekult Number 5 in the early Nineties and quickly became a legend in its own lunchtime, setting the standard for trance in its day. Various remixes popped up, but nothing really captured the essence of that original version. And then came Airwave, turning everything on its head. This remix is exquisite, the perfect addition to any trance DJ's box. Grab one on import now!

FRED NUMF VERSUS ETIENNE OVERDIJK

Love Is The Drug (Tune Inn)

With such an abundance of trance music available at the moment, it takes a carefully moderated filter to screen out the wheat from the chaff. They must be doing something right at Tune Inn HQ, then, because Fred and Etienne's latest offering is an absolute inter-continental ballistic missile! Although a few CD-Rs were mailed last year, it's only now, with Redshift's 'Wicked Cartel' remix, that a full release has been scheduled. ***

MIDWAY Travelling (In Trance We Trust)

Tiesto's Black Hole label is constantly seeking to develop new production talent through its various sub-labels. ITWT is just one of them, catering for the more intelligent, thoughtful corner of the trance market. Ralphie B - surprise surprise! - is Midway, the young producer responsible for the enormously massive 'Massive'. Pleased to report, then, that this follow-up track is perfect for the coming summer months. Expect to see it cropping up on compilations everywhere.

FLUTLICHT

The Dark Blue Series (1-4) (Blockbusters)

Holy flamin' old age pensioners - I can't believe that this EP actually exists! Four of the most unbelievable tracks by Flutlicht from the last three years have been assembled, Company Of The Ring style, for this smouldering piece of translucent

blue vinyl. 'Icarus', 'Mutterkorn', 'Ahmea' and 'Das Siegal' feature on this fantastic slab of trance magic, and every track is a peak-time blinder. This spin-off label from Drizzly is well worth checking out.

DJ SEQUENZA

Black Rain (Overdose)

Overdose is possibly the most versatile of all the tougher German labels, each new release exploring a slightly different avenue of trance, techno and electronic dance, DJ Sequenza has produced a track that is hard as nails, but in a 'let's have a jaunty dance before my ribs disintegrate' kind of style - you know exactly what I'm talking about! [Wanna bet? - Ed.] The quality of this track is superb. How can anything this hard sound so inviting?


ANDORA Let It Flow (DDE)

The holidays are fast approaching and subtle changes in production which can help emphasise and augment the summertime mood are blatantly obvious in this latest Andora track. To say this is heavensent for the sun-drenched clubs in Ibiza is an understatement - it has flawless production, an infectious melody and a complex arrangement, taking this track to the top of any serious DJ's wants list. Better still, the Tomba-style drums perfectly offset the throbbing bassline. What a tune!

PHIL REYNOLDS & CHRIS HAMSHIRE Let's Ride The Wave (Interflow)

You just can't beat an energetic synthesizer lead in contemporary trance. It can make the difference between obscurity and mainstream recognition. Well check the synth on this, readers - it's wicked! Phil Reynolds has steadily evolved as a producer. No doubt you will have heard at least one of his hard trance tracks. In this instance he is working with label frontman Chris Hamshire and with their powers combined, they are unstoppable!



With an almost deep house approach to breakbeat and two-step, Landslide once again prove they're taking no prisoners – just patients. (DB)

VIGI & ZERO ARTIST UNKNOWN Ultrafunk (TCR) Ring The Alarm (white label)

Another TCR nugget for your platters that matter. While the A-side is a good breakbeat cut, it's the Latino mix on the flip which works for me. Latin-tinged breakbeat funk at its best, the groove maintains its heated energy throughout. With summer upon us it'll be nice to here more tracks like this. . . it's not all about the gnarly basslines! (DB)

VIGI & ZERO Pro Teen (Akademia)

If this was a person it would still have a pony-tail and make boxes with its hands. Old school stabs married to electro, breaks and house in a cut and paste style similar to the rawness of their 'Freak Frequency' lick from last year. You know the score. (T)

ILS No Soul (Marine Parade)

Second single from the forthcoming 'Soul Trader' LP is a male vocalled, bluesy, electro-breaks track that evokes Moby, Robert Johnson and Kevin Beber all at the same time some feat - while IIs' trademark soundtrack-style production twinkles and shimmies in the background. The rather leaden PMT remix is a minor disappointment, though a larger sound system improves it somewhat. (T)

ORIS JAY Sid The Spider (white label)

Oris has been turning some fresh beats of late and this continues on that theme. Interesting two-step/ breakbeat-style drums give way to a dark and menacing bassline that will challenge even the largest speakers. Oris then steps it up with deep, analogue, Detroit-esque tones, turning the whole thing into a fresh piece of pirate radio future funk. (DB)

FREQ NASTY VERSUS

PUBLIC ENEMY Amp The Noise (white label)

Our favourite dread lays one of Chuck D's most incendiary moments over the top of his own disco-punk-funkbreaks moment from last year. Proof again that dance music isn't rocket science, and proof also that hip hop and breaks have a little way to go before they become comfortable bedfellows. Other people will love this. (T) * * *

ARTIST UNKNOWN Punks (Against The Grain)

Another slammer from Krafty Kuts' label - a simple yet effective tune that interpolates a killer James Brown

riff with deep, haunting chord

sounds, naughty hip hop vocals and tough, on-point drums. And if that doesn't get the crowd jumping, the bass drop's just coming up! It was game over when we dropped this at The Boutique. But who are these 'Punks'? (DB)

Old school smokers The Ragga Twins get all heavy with Master Blaster and the Aquasky boys. The Raggas delivery work well with the bass, stabbing groove and strong beats. It's good to see these two back on wax can't wait till Carnival. (DB)

EASY B Found The Gonzo (Finger Lickin')



"I get up at around 6.30am as I have a young daughter who can't tell the time yet. I try to make it to the gym at 9am - yes I know, I'm sad! On a typical day I'll then swing by the PO Box to collect my records and post, then to the Whole 9 Yards office for about 10.30 to check e-mails, demos, etc. Tom who works for us normally turns up at about 11.30; he's meant to be

in at 10.00am but he's only managed It once!

"Then I'm back to my studio for the rest of the day, or to Kingsize Records where I've been working a lot lately. Then I might go to studios that our artists are working in to touch base, or to meetings with various labels, artists, press, or our distributor. I also collaborate with other people a fair bit: I've been

working with Shack (Elite Force) today on something new, and I was in with Lee Coombs last week and Blim the week before. On Thursdays and Fridays I often DJ, so the day is cut short, especially if it's abroad. "I'm very lucky: each day is different. That's why I do it." (GW)

VITAL RELEASI

VARIOUS ARTISTS Timeless EP Volume 1 (Timeless)

his summer may be being talked up as the second coming of jazz-step, but, as this near faultless EP demonstrates, darkness well done is very hard to beat. Spirit starts things off with 'Hit & Miss', a typically taut piece of bongolicious speed dub that comes across like Lee Perry with a nasty dose of the fear. Sonic's 'The Bells' is the weakest of the four tracks, well constructed beatwise but somehow a little cold, so turn to the second disc for the real killer cuts. Opening with the kind of fluid, razor-edged, fast rolling



breaks used by Teebee, Danny
C's Thinking Of You' blends divastyle vocals and malevolent
Mentasm blasts in a devastating
genre mix-up. Last up, 'Jah Bless'
by those Usual Suspects is a
thunderous, twisted, bleep-laced
hardstepper that might just have
you recalling a certain
'Spacefunk', Awesome.

JUJU On The Run (Phuturo, USA)

It may ape Digital to the point where he could sue for piracy, but Juju's 'On The Run' is superb all the same. Various industrial whirrs and whines approximate the sound of a munitions factory in overdrive, but it's the darting breaks – one heavy and hemmed-in, the other a lighter drumflicker – that give it its intensity. 'Soul Free' does the bass-driven future funk thing with equal aplomb, resurrecting those early Nineties timestretched breaks along the way. Masterly.

BLUE SONIX Beautiful (Phuturistic Bluez, USA)

While it probably couldn't hold its own in the company of the great love poets ("you're so beautiful... yes you are" runs the lyric in its entirety), Ricky Blue's 'Beautiful' is a highly pleasant,

Swerve-friendly roller. Nothing unduly flashy, but the chattering, boom-driven break is an addictive delight. Flipside 'Can You Handle It' explores similar territory to the High Contrast album (last month's Vital Release), a wonderful little bongo flicker lifting it well out of the ordinary. File next to your Defunked releases.

SYNTAX

Love On Love (Aquasonic)

More bongo-embellished funk, not this time from Ricky Blue himself, but from his Aquasonic label. 'Love On Love', a likeable if somewhat perfunctory sounding piece of Detroit-styled jazz-step, reprises the break-driven synthetics of Ricky's own 'Got Me In Its Spell'. Turn to 'Forever' for some okayish Swerve beats, spiced up by the improbable eruption of an Amen break.

MODUL

High Voltage (Music Forever)

Wow. When you're used to the munitions-factory clatter of 90% of so-called 'dark' tracks, a sound this big and with this much depth comes as some surprise. Modul's 'High Voltage' has got the lot – gargantuan sub-bass, sci-fi effects that are more Solaris than Star Wars, breaks that flicker and chatter as if possessed. Sensational stuff. What's more, the other side boasts a killer remix from Teebee & Form. So seek it out.

INFLUX DATUM Back For More (Formation)

Transatlantic combo Influx Datum recently bagged a Vital Spot with their lovely 'M.U.S.I.C' track, but they'll have to do better than this if they want to stay in our good books. 'Back For More' is one of those bouncy, good natured, eager to please vocal tracks that Intercom release a lot of, while flipside 'Alright' (by name and by nature) chugs along on a plodding, half-asleep break. Not exactly bad, just uninspiring.

* * *

DJ DAMAGE Issues (Muzica)

Muzica, a new label "focusing on the more funky, experimental side of drum & bass", debuts with this breathy vocal number from the normally sadistic DJ Damage. The one to watch, though, is Dylan's remix (which they've cannily stuck on the A-side), a majestically rolling bliss out that sounds like a resurrected Speed anthem. Coming after Dylan's incendiary breaks, the original sounds a little flat. Lots more of those intelligent beats please.

LONDON ELEKTRICITY Come Dancing (Hospital)

Hospital's head witchdoctors return from a lengthy absence with a silky, synthetic-sounding, bass-driven roller of the sort the label is making its own. Pleasant if a little lightweight. Flipside 'Down Low' benefits from tighter breaks and a greater sense of urgency, occasional horn and bongo bursts and that ubiquitous bass hum

slowly casting a warm and unthreatening spell. Bodes well for the promised second album.

ED RUSH & OPTICAL Pacman (Ram Trilogy Remix) (Virus)

By now you either like Ram or you don't, and nothing written on this page is likely to change things one way or another. I for one have never liked their leaden, one-dimensional beats, and the 'Pacman' remix – in spite of some cool lost-in-Nintendo effects – is just more of the same. Turn instead to Universal Project's far superior 'Vessel', whose tough but intricate drum patterns are threaded through with some mindbending sounds. One for fans of Digital & Spirit.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Tambor Y Bajo EP (Phuturo, USA)

The second excellent release from Phuturo this month starts with some more of Greg Packer's tight, deep and superbly soulful future funk on 'Brazilian Fire'. On to 'Left Of Centre' by New York's Mathematics, a similarly close clipped stepper with some stunning sci-fi trickery – just watch those breaks fly. Highlight of the second disc is 'Corazon' from Colombian-born label-boss Juju, a haunting little vocal track vaguely reminiscent of last year's Brazilian stuff. 'Either you want this or you don't", she says. You do.

PESHAY VERSUS FLYTRONIX Satisfy My Love (Cubik)

Satisfy My Love (Cubik) So Peshay's 'U Got Me Burning' made the Radio 1 playlist. Fabulous. Only thing is, when drum & bass is whittering out of your greengrocer's

Only thing is, when drum & bass is whittering out of your greengrocer's Sanyo it tends to sound teeny, tinny and not a little lame. Radio's made for pop, and tracks like 'U Got Me Burning' and this brash, brassy vocal lick (another taster for the forthcoming Cubik album) need the kick of a big system if they're going to get their point across. The B-side, not available for review, promises to be Peshay's remix of his own classic 'Miles From Home'.

FRESH, BAD COMPANY & TRACE

Mutated EP (Breakbeat Punk)

Kicking off Bad Company's new (and aptly named) Breakbeat Punk imprint is yet another reincarnation of 'Mutant Jazz', notoriously remixed by DJ Trace back in 1995 as 'The Mutant'. 'Mutated 200X' doesn't differ hugely from the razor-bristling noisecore that Renegade are pushing at the moment, but the breaks have a tautness and propulsion that sets it apart. 'U Boat' and 'Sunrise' have a flatness and discordance that resembles current Full Cycle stuff, but it's the subtler 'Chain Of Thought' with its clipped, rolling breaks that gets my vote as the standout track.

PANACEA Underground Superstardom (Position Chrome)

This perhaps slightly optimistically titled album bristles with more boys' toys bass throb and pitch-bending hoover menace than you could shake a Panzer tank at, sounding like some mad industrial estate in Russia making hubcaps out of chromed human skulls. Something like that, anyway. Sturm und drang has seldom sounded sturmer. Or dranger. (DB)

DIGITAL Dubzilla (Function)

Over the past year or so, Digital's releases on his own Function label have been pushing a very specific vibe - a discordant, metallic, mechanised jungle dub, the sound not so much of funky drumming as the blurred cogs and pistons of an industrial process. And that's exactly what you get, track after hammering track, on his debut album. The one thing you can't fault him on is his breaks (no half-arsed Ram bullshit here), but factory noise palls after a while and nothing ever quite reaches the sublime heights of 'Gateman', 'Deadline' or 'Spacefunk'.

LABEL STABLE PHUTURISTIC BLUEZ The phabulous soundz of

With a string of releases including this month's excellent 'Beautiful'/ 'Can You Handle It?' from Blue Sonix (see above), Phuturistic Bluez is taking its place alongside Defunked, Double Zero and Creative Source as one of the leading purveyors of Jazzy licks.

Newly relocated to Brooklyn, the

Newly relocated to Brooklyn, the label is presided over by one Al Fougy, who was turned onto the demonic sounds of hardcore when Kemistry and Storm took him to Fabio and Grooverider's legendary Rage night at London's Heaven.

Frustrated at the lack of US representation on drum & bass labels, he set up Phuturistic Bluez. His mission statement is simple: to push music "with originality and focus," and to promote diversity by constantly listening to demos and

keeping an ear out for new sounds. Above all, every release has to be of the highest calibre. "Other labels just don't want to be patient," notes Al. "We want to keep people interested, by pushing what we really believe in." The policy seems to paying off.

his collaboration came about when vocalist and songwriter Sevi G hooked up with a friend at **Public Demand Records,** with the idea of covering Pete Bouncer's Eighties reggae anthem 'Ruff Neck Sound'. PD brought in Artful Dodger for the production. Then Richie Dan was approached and the rest, as they say, is history. This is a far darker production than we're used to from Artful Dodger, with a big bassline and beats that will infect



the breaks scene as much as any. Richie is considered by many to be the best live performer on the UK garage scene could this be the year he breaks through as an album artist? (DC)

BOYZ NDA HOOD VERSUS NXUS Bringin' Da Mayhem

(white label)

Featuring Dirty Doogz (representing Boyz NDa Hood) with UK hip hop outfit Nxus, this newbie answers the criticism that many have of MC-led UK garage - its lack of conscious lyrics. Boyz Nda Hood are fast earning respect for their landmark pirate show and this pushes the boundaries of the scene. Recognise. (DC)



EL NINO FEATURING MIRIAM GERY

Dirty Cash (Urban Heat)

If you loved the original then you will die for this cover of Stevie V's 'Dirty Cash'. Featuring the vocals of the original singer Miriam Grey, this was produced by the All Star Boys and DJ Shax, with the best mix being Wiley's from Pay As You Go. Dark, dirty. dancefloor - need I say more? (M&M) ***

YBF Dreamin' (Zed Bias Mixes) (Engagement Music)

The original mix of this track is a thumping house track but Zed Bias has worked his magic, creating a storming bassline that can only be described as a monsta. This has the World Cup anthem written all over it just listen and you'll know why! (M&M) ***

Locked On have done it again with a ruff, tuff original raw dub. The kings of the moment D'N'D play their trump cards yet again to deliver a perfect jump up track for the carnival season. The vibe is there and the use of pan pipes, steel pan & timps to create the summery feeling is spot on. I will be interested to see how popular this is in August. (M&M)

TUBBY T

Ganja Man (Social Circles)

It's been an amazing year so far for Tubby T. Breaking though on the star-studded Social Circles label (Dynamite/\$tush/Sticky), news of album deal offers flying around and that the 'Tails Of The Hood' track reached anthem status comes as no surprise. This latest underground cut sets Tubby on a pirate radio show discussing the quality of various herbs that one might smoke, laced over some seriously infectious Sticky beats. (DC)

KALU Here I Am (Ceema)

This is the debut track by two sisters, with mixes from Oracle (known for his success with Luck & Neat), Deeper Rhythm and Kapp & Chino. It's the latter mix that's the one to look out for if you love your vocal garage tracks, as it's a very laid back, commercial mix with all the right ingredients - strings, hardcore beats and sweet vocals. All the underground heads should check out the 'Oracle Mix', which has been turned inside out for that extra raw effect. (M&M) * * *

Currently very in demand due to their 'Monster' track, Conan and Dan haven't forgotten their more soulful disco roots, as this infectious little number proves. I'm not sure what the sample is, but the vocal snippet is very catchy and I've been working many an acappella over the instrumental sections. The Problem

Kid also turns out a worthy alternative that grooves along in a deeper Jazz 'N' Groove stylee.

MASTERS AT WORK FEATURING INDIA Backfired (MAW, USA)

It's been simmering away on a limited CD-R provided only to a lucky few, and now it's finally released properly. The original version wasn't too playable on most dancefloors but Dave Lee has toughened it up and stretched it out to perfection. Not unlike his re-workings for Blaze and Erro, this has been ending many a set on a real high for me!


NEXT EVIDENCE Dance On (EMI, France)

Notably, it's one of the minority of tracks on the new album not produced by Rodney Jerkins, but created instead by Mike City of Sunshine Anderson and Bilal fame.



Obviously written for Brandy's new husband and the father of her baby, Robert Antony Smith, Brandy sounds as good as she ever has and City mixes pure romance with dancefloor appeal. What a shame the whole LP wasn't up to this quality.

P DIDDY FEATURING USHER

I Need A Girl (Bad Boy)

You would have thought, after the pasting he was given by ex-flame J-Lo in the lyrics for 'Ain't It Funny', that P Diddy would be less than inclined to poor his heartbreak out on vinyl again. It seems not, and with a new remix featuring Usher and Loon. Diddy tells us once more about the girl he lost and the one he hasn't yet found. He also racks up a real slick radio hit along the way, which should help drown his sorrows.



BEATNUTS FEATURING AL TARIO

Duck Season (Sequence)

Sequence Records is a new indie hip hop label started by ex-Payday hoss and Gang Starr manager. Patrick Moxey. It's launching with a mix album from Babu of The Dilated Peoples fame and this Beatnuts track will be an exclusive cut. Produced by Babu himself, the backing track features a harpsichord riff and some pretty nifty programming, while Psycho Les and the boys do their thing over the top. Good stuff.

DONNELL JONES You Know That I Love You (Arista)

If you were hoping for another 'U Know What's Up', you may well be disappointed when you first hear this new Donnell Jones single. However, no doubt you'll also find that within a couple of plays it's well and truly lodged itself in your head. If you like Glen Lewis' 'Don't You Forget It', this will go very nicely on the same tape and looks likely to be a staple for radio over the summer.



CAM'RON

Oh Boy (Roc-A-Fella)

Out of his deal with Sony, Harlem's finest. Cam'ron, has found himself a new home at Roc-A-Fella: a meeting seemingly made in thug heaven. His first release is this already huge underground track which cleverly cuts up Rose Royce's 'I'm Going Down' (popularised more recently by Mary J Blige). Each line is answered by a sample going "Oh boy", which hooks you in rather than irritating. Let's hope the LP keeps up the quality. * * * *

USHER

U Don't Have To Call (Arista)

Yes, it is yet another new Usher single that begins with 'U', but respect to Mr Raymond for making an album that can be spawning singles like this over a year after its release. Produced by the inimitable Neptunes, both song and vocal are excellent, and Ludacris has been wheeled in to add a rap for the remix. If for whatever reason you don't own this, get a copy now.

STYLES & PHAROAHE MONCH

The Life (Rawkus)

Thankfully Rawkus' recent move into the corporate world doesn't seem to have affected their quality control, and this is currently one of the biggest hip hop tunes on the streets. Telling it how it is about life as an MC, Styles from The Lox and Pharoahe Monch make up a lethal combination. A must for rap fans and a great taster for the forthcoming 'Soundbombing II' album.

SWIZZ BEATS FEATURING **BOUNTY KILLER** Guilty (Swizz Beats/

Dreamworks)

His slick new single, featuring the gruff and growling vocal talents of Bounty Killer, should prove to his critics that there's more to Swizz Beats than fiddling around with the preset riffs on Casio keyboards. Reminiscent of the Babycham single 'Rise To The Top', reviewed a couple of months back, this is a convincing fusion of ragga and hip hop.

NIKKA COSTA

Everybody Got Their Something (Virgin)

Almost back from the dead, Nikka Costa returns with a new single from her album, which most presumed dead and buried. This was always the most obvious single and in its original form is a thoroughly enjoyable Sly Stone pastiche. However, it's the remix by the Soundhustlers, utilising Grover Washington's well-worn 'Mister Magi' which is getting the DJs' attention. Well worth tracking down.

DAZZ BAND

Starship (white label)

Getting lots of radio exposure - and deservedly so - is this new single from the Dazz Band. A very 'now' version of Norman Connor's classic 'Starship', it's hard to believe that this is the same Dazz Band who vanished from the musical radar at the end of the Eighties. Certainly there's nothing old fashioned about this production, which gives what was originally a midtempo number dancefloor appeal for 2002.

BRANDY What About Us? (white label)

It sounds like someone fished the tapes for this Steve 'Silk' Hurley remix of 'What About Us?' out of a bin. Perhaps whoever it was should have left them there. In fairness to Mr. Hurley, these sound like monitor mixes rather than the finished article, but even so the Eighties-style vibe adds little to the original. Also featured on this bootleg is a version of the original with an intro rap from Nas.

VENUS TRIBE Slow Down (Angel Baby Recordings/So Urban)

Originally released independently last year, this track from UK's Dodge, based around the Brand Nubian 'Slow Down' hook, has now been picked up by Sony's new urban imprint. For its reissue, fellow Sony artist from over the water, Tash from Tha Liks, has been wheeled in to provide an intro rap. It sounded good last year and still sounds good now.

ANNE MARIE

Any Other Night (Columbia)

Anne Marie is a new artist very much in the Sunshine Anderson mould who adds a real touch of soul to this tale of love gone wrong. As with Sunshine Anderson's best efforts, the songwriting and particularly the lyrics are a touch above the rest. Good stuff roll on the album.

TONY SUNSHINE

T.o.n.y (Terror Squad/Atlantic)

From Fat Joe's Terror Squad comes this very strong fusion of hip hop and street r&b. In a self-referential lyric, Mr Sunshine relays his rise from the streets, accompanied by a fittingly cinematic and epic backing track. It's not something that's going to end up in the charts, but who cares?



NELLY Not In Here (Universal)

After the success of Nelly's collaboration with the Neptunes for the brilliant remix of N*Sync's 'Girlfriend', it's come as little surprise that Virginia Beach's production superstars have produced this new single for the St Louis rapper. Musically, the backing track is guitardriven and the percussion gives a nod towards Eighties go-go music, and this influence is made more explicit by the chorus, which quotes Chuck Brown's go-go classic 'Bustin' Loose'. Not as obvious as Nelly's previous hits but okay nonetheless. ***

MIS-TEEO Roll On/This Is How We Do It (Inferno/Telstar)

A double A-side from Alesha, Sabrina and Su-Elise, basically separated into good and, well, not so good. The A-side is a nice slice of slick, uptempo, radio-friendly r&b with a bit more of a US feel than previous Mis-Teeq singles. The flipside is a reworking of the girls' version of Montell Jordan's 'This Is How We Do It', which first reared its ugly head on the 'Ali G In Da House' soundtrack. Featuring the Big Pun, 'Don't Wanna Be A Player' piano riff, it's a bit obvious, to say the least.

"With A Tribe Called Quest no longer around, I felt it was time for a new use of the 'tribe' concept," says long-established UK producer Dodge, "It reflects the fact that it's a collective. The 'Venus' part means something beautiful, or a good thing which pretty much sums us up!"

After years of production and remix work for everyone from The Isley Brothers to Jill Scott, Venus

Tribe is Dodge's first 'group'. Their debut single, 'Slow Down', has already created a stir with its funky production, familiar sample and vocals courtesy of ex-Truce singer DJ. But versatility is the name of their game. .

"The idea was to create all the kinds of music we love," explains Dodge, "whether that be funk, soul, gospel, jazz... The only consistent point of the album will be me!

"We see it as music for mature people who don't buy into the whole manufactured sound. It's good after all this time to have found a credible outlet for the type of music I really want to be doing."

'Slow Down' is out on July 1st on Baby Angel/Epic. The album will follow later this year

FALLACY & FUSION Groundbreaker (Wordplay)

ry to ignore the title, because 'Groundbreaker' is nothing of the sort. It is, however, the most commercial emanation of a trend that has been gaining momentum in UK hip hop for the best part of two years. A trend that acknowledges the musical power of Yanks like Timbaland and the Neptunes, the fast forward thrill of the UK garage scene and the rhythmic and musical possibilities of dancehall, and harnesses them all to inspired word-



spitting. So two veterans of the London hip hop scene combine a rollicking horn riff, frantic drum programming and a litany of label names and sheer bravado for the first (but not the last) bona fide hit to come out of bouncement. Fantastic.

BLAK TWANG Trixsta (Bad Magic)

Tony Rotton returns, as lyrically exacting as we've come to expect, in tandem with Est'Elle (sounding just about as good as she ever has) over a beat that draws on reggae, Afrobeat and all the other good things that are currently making UK hip hop an exciting place to be. Alongside Fusion and Fallacy and the new one from New Flesh, this is the most exciting singles month for the UK since. . . . when?

NEW FLESH

Lie Low (Big Dada)
Blam. The non-London contribution
to this monthus mirabilis (uh?)
revolves around a punishingly hard
b-line that will cave chests in clubs
and a chorus of such righteous roots

that you're being threatened. Just as compelling as the capital's contributions and one of the most immediate pieces of music this trio have yet produced.

NIKKFURIE Mannifesto (Kerozen/ Wagram, France)

If there is one group besides TTC who exemplify the Paris Underground, it's La Caution. Here their producer (who also contributed to TTC's 'Ceci N'est Pas Un Disque') shows why, with a six-track instrumental EP of electronic nastiness, kitsch weirdness, nouveau romanticism and emotional pull. Compare this to the photofit sameness of so much 'underground' hip hop and you begin to understand why listeners worldwide are becoming so excited about the new wave of French hip hop.

MIKE GLC

The Mike GLC EP (Eastside)

Mr GLC has a good, deep voice that he uses on the opening track for pure boasts and the kind of self-belief that doesn't tolerate dissent. But it's 'My Life', a harrowing tale of a harrowing childhood, which shows there's more depth to his persona than you might have thought. Throw in some production from Mike Skillagin and you've got a really promising debut.

FUNKY FRESH FEW Heavy Hittin' (Grand Central)

The Blackpool-based duo return in conjunction with Wildflower, Stradegy and Sinista, dropping some transatlantic doin'-it-for-the-ladies verses. It's an understated, melancholic little number, a little reminiscent of 'Shook Ones', though without the lyrical bleakness or the sheer power of that track.

* * *

OUTKAST Land Of A Million Drums (Realplayer file)

Available on the internet at the time of writing, this is Outkast's contribution to the Scooby Doo soundtrack and is as inspired as you would hope. Over a slappy rock beat and some electrical madness, Dre and Big Boi pile through some great lyrics with enough references to 'those meddling kids' to amuse giggling stoners who are old enough to remember Thelma and co. Believe me, nothing Outkast do at the moment is throwaway, and this is a little like getting Michaelangelo to do the animation. Lovely.

DUTCH MASSIVE Evaporate (Gameplan)

Another new UK label sets up shop with this jazzy, bouncy three-tracker from Floridian Dutch Massive, part of the Equilibrium crew alongside Celph Titled and Majik Most. When Mr Titled isn't hooking up the beats, J Rawls comes through just as jazzily, while over it all, Massive comes through with a style not a gazillion miles from 'Marshall Mathers', Well done, with some good lines.

* * *

CREATIVE CONTROLE Bloodrush (Volta, Eire)

There's something going on in Dublin – first up Exile Eye (see albums) and now this. A huge orchestral sample is constantly bettered by the sheer attack of MC Messiah J, who absolutely kills it, not by being technically clever but just through the ferocity and utter commitment of his delivery. Proper proper.

STIGG OF THE DUMP Still Alive At The Veglia Lounge (Endemik, Canada)

Featuring vocals from the Sebutones (Buck65, who played some well-received shows in the UK recently, and Sixtoo), Stigg specialises in the kind of 1984-sampling, bleak, essentially melancholic electronic hip hop which immediately makes you think of Anticon. Which isn't to say it's no good – in fact, if creeping dread and the-horror-the-horror are your cup of hemlock, you'll love this. Some serious shit.

DJ STEG G & THE FREESTYLE MASTER Universal (Powercut)

Glasgow's best known hip hop duo return with a really varied EP, running from modernist club cuts like 'Adrenaline' and 'Dynamics', through a funky break like 'The Realm' (featuring excellent vocal performances from Gamma) and into weirdness like 'Isolation'. Freestyle Master matches the beats, his voice defiantly Scottish, never lacking in clever lyrics. A giant leap forward.

RODNEY P Riddim Killa (Riddim Killa/ Lowlife)

Mr P returns yet again with the theme tune for his label and his forthcoming album. The reggae influence is brought through nicely by The Sea and the Godfather does what he does like only he can. 'A Love Song', produced by Dobie and featuring Julie Dexter on some 'Night In Tunisia' skat, shows another side to what he's about, right down to big soul chorus, but with complete class. The don.

SPECIALIST ALBUMS

THE PLANETS The Opening (Redsea)

The Planets, born out of Mecca2Medina, have finally got their album out. Coming from a fairly straight up (but very well done) musical perspective, they place their Islamic faith into a broader picture and pull in guests like Planet Asia, Slug and Zion I. With some very nimble wordspitting, this is a really solid, varied and accomplished album.

EXILE EYE Pressure Points (Equilibrium, Eire)

Exile Eye spent his first 18 years in San Jose, but then ended up in Ireland. He's brought a couple of very good, very original singles out over the last few months and now his album hits. Exile Eye isn't a supersharp rapper, but he can tell a story ('Mary Reilly'), comes through with some great images and ideas and his beats are excellent – a sparse, uptempo, minimal electronic stutter. There's some really strong material here.

RICHY PITCH Live At Home (7Heads, USA)

Yes, that's right, Richy Pitch from Scratch in London has signed to the Brooklyn label 7Heads and hooked up with the likes of J-Live, Apani B Fly, Asheru, Mr Complex and El Da Sensei for this minialbum. The sound is what you would expect from that line-up, all tight jazz and funk samples with the bip boom done just so. But Mr Pitch does it very, very well, with some neat touches and more than enough imagination to hold the attention. And he also seems to have coaxed some very good performances from MCs who do so many guest slots that they sometimes coast. Nice one.

ANGELA JOHNSON They Don't Know (Dome)

riginally put away in Japan via Wood Records, this collection of near-perfect soulful offerings is the debut maxi from Cooly's **Hotbox songbird Ms** Johnson. The lady really is an unbelievable talent, not only writing all 14 cuts on here but also producing and arranging them as well. For a young singer this is a daunting task, but it seems this young woman has a real gift for turning all things that she touches into pure



gold. Without doubt, she's got a mature head on young shoulders and she'll be around and hopefully praised with high accolades for many years to come. Very entertaining and incredibly inspirational.

BLANCO & WRIGHT

The Dance (white label)

I know nothing about this, except that it's from London and has a gorgeous, retro feel, like some long lost boogie tune. The production is so damn good, with an incredible live presence and subtle hints of jazz fusion flowing throughout. Search this out.

LIBERACION Free (Chilli Funk)

Originally from Staten Island, now residing in Phoenix, Arizona, this young man has a formidable depth and spirituality to his sound, not unlike Osulade, who released 'Que Vive El Canto' on his Yoruba imprint to much acclaim at Miami last year. This is a beautifully crafted slice of pure modern dance.

E-SMOOVE

Life Rhythms (Raw Deal Mix) (Fuego)

A brilliant rewash from one of the UK's leading exponents of the funky groove. Extremely simplistic, loose production with a bassline that truly rocks and drums that really sound fresh. Raw Deal has done a fabulous job on this

and deserves to get major work as a result. Brilliantly organic and made

strictly for heads who know.



SPECIALIST ALBUMS

FERTILE GROUND Seasons Change (Counterpoint)

Their fresh, innovative debut album was rightly praised by those in the know, but this second maxi is even better. Loose in parts with lyrics that stand the test and vocals to drift to. In short this is a superb example of future soul – acquire immediately or face the consequences.

SUBA Tributo (Ziriguiboom)

In November 1999, this brilliantly talented Serbian-born musician/composer was tragically taken from this planet just as his debut album 'Sao Paulo Confessions' was receiving accolades across the globe. This is a tribute to this phenomenal young man, whose immaculate talent is only now being truly appreciated and felt.

WILL DOWNING Sensual Journey (GRP)

Back in the day, the big man was never off our turntables. But times change and in these days of 'dance rules', artists who possess the soul factor get overlooked for manufactured crap. Will has always been about longevity and meaningful songs, and this is no exception. Welcome back Mr Downing – it's always good to hear from you.

OLA ONABULE Ambitions For Deeper Breadth (Rugged Ram)

This gentle giant is possibly the most underrated soulful voice that the UK has to offer – always fresh, and with a production technique that's highly individual and does not buckle to trends. Like his previous output, this is a one for lovers of meaningful music and should be taken on a daily basis – wonderful stuff indeed and not to missed.

WITAL DELEACE

JOHNNY CLARKE A Ruffer Version (Trojan)

superb, 78-minute rootsfest, this celebration of the heavenly combination of Johnny Clarke's devotional voice and King Tubby's studio sorcery represents both parties at the peak of their powers. Recorded between 1974-78, it's shocking how vibrant the results remain, as conscious classics like 'None Shall Escape The Judgement', 'Poor Marcus' and 'Blood Dunza' capture the captivating force of Clarke's singing, as he subversively delivers hardcore political rants with the voice of an angel. The sublime productions of Bunny Lee,



Prince Jammy and Tubby himself set the singer adrift in waves of delirious dub, and even relocating the Egyptian Sand Dance to Trench Town pays off, as Lee's 'Flying Cymbal' innovation transforms high cheese into pure genius on 'None Shall. . . '.

ASSASSIN Ruffest & Tuffest (40/40) SPICE

Robbery (Annex) **BLING DAWG**Super Gun (Blacker Dread)

Three of dancehall's finest riddims. First up, Assassin beefs up the machismo to great effect on Lenky's exotic dervish ritual 'Diwali'. Next up, she-wolf Spice assaults Elephant Man, on the Timbaland-style gyrations of the 'Bus A Sweat' backing track. Finally, Steve 'Blacker Dread' Martin militantly mashes up Clement Dodd's old skool twister on the '(King) Answer King' platform for Bling Dawg's homicidal rant.

New Direction (Staubgold)

German electronic stalwarts
Mapstation develop a fresh angle on
fellow countrymen Rhythm & Sound's
mantric blueprints. Donovan's bluesy

makes a mesmeric marriage of Sun
Ra, Studio One and Boards of Canada.
'Stop' doesn't quite fulfil the promise,

SPECIALIST ALBUMS

VARIOUS ARTISTS Hard Drive (Greensleeves)

The finest rhythm to be mercilessly exploited for some time, 'Hard Drive''s sublime combination of displaced guitar twang, honky tonk piano and military snare will trigger involuntary twitching in the stiffest dance. Elephant Man and Capleton predictably shine, but Turbulence, and Original Nuttahs Xsytment Gang memorably eclipse their elders. This virulently infectious rhythm will burn out the boglers.

STEREOTYP My Sound (G-Stone)

Kruder & Dorfmeister's bogle Borg sidekick refits dancehall with a polished chrome finish. By adopting the clinical vocabulary of Euro electro, he perplexingly loses the sex, dirt 'n' sweat, yet retains an unexpected charm, aided by Tikiman's intimate croon and Cesar's ruff-tongued lechery. Stylishly

original, yet curiously superficial.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Ready When You Dub (Smugg)

Selecting a solid Tubby's cut, some fine Horace Andy dubs and a vintage Sugar Minott appearance on 'Ident Dub', is a persuasive declaration of good taste. The inclusion of Uptempo Players and Mickey Dread's compellingly oddball pairing with Jackie Mittoo increases the pressure further. But this collection nosedives with some poor digi-dubs and a sub-standard Mad Professor cameo. Ho hum.

HORACE ANDY Horace Andy's Dub Box 1973-76 (Jamaican)

Primarily from Bunny Lee's dub archives, scarce or lost recordings of Andy's finest moments are gathered for this swoonsome selection. The Roy Orbison of reggae has his golden falsetto melted into punishingly irresistible grooves for this entrancing example of dub artistry. Shredding timeless classics like 'Skylarking' or 'My Guiding Star' merely amplifies the hypnotically beautiful mystique of the originals.



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
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

ETIENNE DE CRECY Prix Choc (Remix) (PIAS)

This is a limited 10-inch (on yellow vinyl) released to celebrate the fifth anniversary of the 'Super Discount' album. As well as Alex Gopher's original classic house version there's a great new dubby mix from Manasseh that brings the whole thing bang up to date. (CC)



LAMBCHOP Is A Woman (City Slang) he title track from Lambchop's inspirational album is now available as a single

with the inevitable extra mixes. Both remixers, Alpha and Maxwell Implosion, keep the bones of the song and add texture and colour to create variations on the theme that, while not bettering the original, give it a longer life. The Alpha version is smoother while Maxwell Implosion's will work best in a Balearic summer setting. There's also a slightly 'difficult', bleepy

rework of another album track, 'The New Cobweb Summer', from Schneider TM. But perhaps the finest addition is a beautifully simple cartoon video featuring a leaf floating down a stream and a very cute bunny. Inspirational as always. (CC)

VARIOUS ARTISTS Discerning Dancefloor Volume One (CITC)

Care In The Community branch out from their audio-visual work with a fine EP. Featuring cosmic rockers Versus Yam Yam, Aphratec and Russ Gabriel, the standout track is Ontimo's 'Cake & Milk' A spaced-out bassline-driven percussive groove with shades of Detroit and Jazzanova in there for good measure. (PM)



MORDANT MUSIC Baud With You (Mordant Music)

This piece of deep electronica takes the riff from The Carpenters' 'We've Only Just Begun' as its starting point before morphing into a far darker, more contemporary song that finishes with the haunting line "...into nothing". Brilliant. (CC)

UNKNOWN **Jacko Goes Lounge** (white label)

Chill goes bootleg with this little gem that samples big chunks of Michael Jackson's 'Rock My World' and turns them into a surprisingly good, wellproduced downtempo gem. It's one of those tunes that even the coolest Jackson-hater will find it hard to resist - just check the sub-bass, feel the summer vibes and dance. (CC) ***

SOUVENIR

There is Only One Thing Left **Now (Touch Tones)**

Another great tune in the series of seven-inch singles from Touch Tones. This time, the drum machine beat is a little more uptempo but the sweet piano riff helps you drift off into the live soundscape. There's a CD collecting all the highlights of the limited vinyl to follow too. (CC)

MAGNET Where Happiness Lives EP (Ultimate Dilemma)

Magnet are a great new act from Norway. Their music sits somewhere to the left of Kings Of Convenience and to the right of Radiohead. So they're a bit moody and atmospheric but somehow uplifting at the same time. And there are some good songs hidden in the textures. (CC) * * * *

NYLON RHYTHM MACHINE

Pantheon EP (Catskills)

Lo-fi chill meets hip hop meets future film soundtracks on this varied EP. The highlight is 'One Rubber' which features a neat acoustic guitar riff and an opera sample over some crunchy beats and a bit of scratching. The sound of summer, (CC)

SKIP ID Slumber In Graceland (white label)

A lovely, quirky ambient track which would fit snugly on the decks at Sunday Best or The Big Chill. 'Slumber Of Graceland' mixes a gentle breakbeat and cascading pianos with a vocal that sounds uncannily like a certain deceased rock 'n' roll singer from Memphis. Beautiful and well worth seeking out. (PM) * * * *

KARUAN DOHUKI

Ballet (Sunshine Enterprise)

Born in Vienna, the son of Kurdish parents. Karuan combines elements of traditional Middle Eastern music with contemporary Western beats. From the offbeat jazzuality of 'Sirene' to the chilled 'Walk', Karuan never strays too far over the noodlesome world music line and as a result this should appeal to downbeat and Buddha Bar fans alike. (PM)



PETROULA

For You (Five Degrees Below)

This will be too sweet for some. It's a very nice, chilled song, sung by the very nice sounding Lucy Atherton. the sort of very nice little gem that will turn up on a Hed Kandi 'Winter Chill' album. Proper cuddling on the sofa music. (CC)

VARIOUS ARTISTS Sunday Best 3 Sampler (Sunday Best)

An EP of exclusives from the recent 'Sunday Best 3' compilation. Ranging from the nu-Med chill of Caia's 'La Telecabine' and Neon Heights' summery 'There's A Place' to Lazyboy's dubby, discofied mix of Royksopp's 'Poor Leno', there's enough variety here to keep most parts of the chill family happy. You can't get better than Sunday Best. (PM)

EMO

Relief For Free (Stereo Deluxe)

A well-produced, deep house/dub piece with a lazy, soulful male vocal on the top. If the singing is a bit much for you there's a useful instrumental version too. The Butti 49 remix on the flip goes all broken beats. (CC)

ROTHKO

A Continual Search For Origins (Too Pure)

This album, which is based on the lush sound of delayed guitar, plus ambient washes and found sounds, was inspired by a summer trip to Switzerland, Most of it is so incredibly laid back and languid it does create an atmosphere of calm and peace. By definition, not exactly eventful, but it does its job. (CC)



VARIOUS ARTISTS Pathaan's Small World (Stoned Asia Music)

Small World is super-busy DJ Pathaan's new compilation series. The idea is to play a broader range of global beats than he can on his successful 'Stoned Asia' collections. This double CD covers the same area as Claude Challe's 'Buddha Bar' comps, but with a slightly more street feel. There's a hippy. Ibiza vibe to the mix which will make it work much better when the sun is shining. (CC)



VARIOUS ARTISTS Nirvana Lounge 02 (Chall O Music)

It must be frustrating being worldbeat DJ Claude Challe. His concept (double album of global sounds in a nice box with booklet) has been so comprehensively plundered that anything that he does is in danger of looking and sounding like a copy of the copies. He hasn't, perhaps, moved on enough from 'Nirvana Lounge 01', but he still creates a luxurious audio banquet with your best, most beautiful friends. The perfect soundtrack for intimate parties on hot summer nights. (CC)

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
DOT ALLISON We Are Science (Mantra)

VITAL RELEASE

POSITION NORMAL Goodly Time (Rum Records)

his was thrust into our hands the other day by Muzik's gobby Scouse designer. Our first reaction (after checking our wallets and phones were still there), on seeing the luxurious Eley Kishimoto screen-printed sleeve, was 'fashion vanity project - probably crap'. But the name rang a few bells and we played it anyway. Fortunately, as it turns out, as its unassuming, hugely inventive and endearingly neurotic mix of charity-shop psychedelia, lo-fi guitar and wistful songs immediately banished every trace of



cynicism and bitterness from our hearts. So we immediately played it again. It's an album for those moments of clarity, perhaps as a nasty hangover is finally fading, when all you need to do is sit and stare at a shaft of sunlight on a sleeping cat. Magic. (TM)

AUTECHRE Gantz Graf (Warp) JELLO

Chamchimzee (Peacefrog)

Autechre's career increasingly resembles a Chris Morris parody of electronica, so it's apt that 'Gantz Graf' sounds like 'Stay Away From Me' by "US chart-toppers Smash My Brother's Face In" from the Brass Eye paedophilia special. It speeds up, slows down, stretches and warps, just like the otherwise sensible 'critics' who will tie themselves up in knots to avoid criticising it. B-side, 'Cap. IV' redeems things slightly - possessing both melody and rhythm, it even quite resembles music. Jello, aka Bola, meanwhile, helped produce the 'Techre's still-unsurpassed debut 'Incunabula', and his work still sounds like the duo circa 'Tri Repetae', which, if it hardly puts him at the cutting edge, does at least make 'Chimchamzee' a pulsing, intelligent bit of electronica. Unfortunately, Autechre then turn up with a 'remix' that sounds like them learning to play the piano while drunk. The overall effect is one of two very talented people pissing about. Just like this page! (DB)

VENETIAN SNARES Higgins Ultra Low Track Glue Funk Hits (Planet Mu)

Venetian Snares opens his latest album with 'Dance Like You're Selling Nails', on which a volley of Gatling gun spazz-beats are fired at some sort of trance 'anthem', while a female opera singer (probably Venetian Snares' mum) trills "Rude boys", "Junglist massive" and other d&b MC staples the top. The result would be the best record of all time, if we hadn't awarded that accolade to somebody else last month. The rest of the album? Oh, you don't want to worry about that. (DB)

DAVID GRUBBS Rickets & Scurvy (Fat Cat)

Grubbs was once in the 'legendary' Gastr Del Sol with Jim O'Rourke, and if you enjoyed the intellectual country rock of the latter's 'Insignificance' album, you'll probably also dig the more downbeat 'Rickets & Scurry'. With contributors including John McEntire of Tortoise and Matmos (adding subtle treatments and electronics), this is a collection of quietly innovative, grown-up songs, though thankfully less Jools Holland-friendly than that description implies. (TM)

RADIOBOY

The Mechanics Of Destruction (Accidental)

The list of sound sources reads like a day out at Lakeside Thurrock: 'A Big Mac meal, Hear'Say CD, The Sun newspaper...' That's the point, of course, as Matthew Herbert turns the products of global capitalism to his own musical ends. While much of the music on this CD stands on its own merits ('Gap', 'Starbucks' and 'Hollywood' are classic 'Mistakes'-style Herbert), it's the accompanying texts at themechanicsofdestruction.org that really hold your attention. (TM)



VARIOUS ARTISTS Staedtizism 3: Instrumentals (~Scape)

Curiously enough, just as the artists on Big Dada, Mush and Anticon take hip hop off the map, unlikely nu-conservatives ~Scape appear to be trying to drag it back. On 'Instrumentals', the likes of the very dishy Jan Jelinek, Kit Clayton and Thomas Fehlmann seem out of their depth at hip hop tempo, reduced to a load of boom-boom-chick beats and bass pulses that ride the beat as awkwardly as Dale Winton on a runaway bronco. They just don't have the necessary skills, guy. (DB)



ASTROBOTNIA Astrobotnia Pts 1-3 (Rephlex)

The work of Finnish braindancer Ovuca, this lengthy space opera (two separate CDs and a 12-inch EP) should ideally accompany a War Of The Worlds-style invasion of Planet Clanger by a horde of martial Moomins, culminating in an all-night orgy of frenzied dancing and sex magick rituals over the shattered remains of the Iron Chicken. Either that, or the patterns behind your eyelids as you start to fall asleep. Part One is our favourite, with its "Satan is good/Satan is our pal" refrain. (TM)

WHITEHOUSE

Wriggle Like A Fucking Eel (Susan Lawly)

Fingernails scrape down a digital blackboard till they're bloody stumps, while a man possessed shrieks "FACE THE FEAST OF POWDER!!". No-one does 'power electronics' like Whitehouse, and their explorations of the darkest recesses of the human psyche seem to get more extreme with every release. Invigorating stuff – buy it for someone you love. (TM)

BOOM BIP

Mannequin Hand Trapdoor I Reminder (Lex)

'Mannequin Hand...' is a rather wonderful hip-hop-not-hip-hop pop song featuring the ubiquitous idiot savant vocals of Clouddead's Doseone and some "great guitar work", as Tommy Vance might say. Imagine a 21st century Joy Division relocated to Cincinatti with a munchkin for a singer. The B-side's an electronica crossover affair, with crackling beats and choppy vocal snippets that even the obligatory Boards Of Canada-esque synth melody can't spoil. (TM)

* * *

FARBEN Textstar (Klang)

That man Jan Jelinek again, under the moniker he saves for all his best tunes. A compilation of his four excellent Klang EPs, we'd be doing him a disservice by tagging this 'click-house' or some such nonsense. The beats are lighter than air but heavier than lead,

while amniotic sounds radiate warmth but retain an understated funk that makes your pulse race. It's like drowning in marshmallows. (TM)



JANEK SCHAEFER Pulled Under (AudiOh!)

Former architect Janek fulfils Brian Eno's original criteria for ambient music, by providing 'a space to think'. Unlike Eno, however, he creates 'spaces' that you might actually want to go to. The organic sources range from radio signals culled from a solar eclipse to field recordings of Janek's travels and manipulations of his three-armed, multi-speed 'Tri-phonic Turntable'. But technique is beside the point – this is luminous, immersive music for late-night headphone introspection. (TM)

MARUMARI The Remixes (Car Park)

We're not mad keen on remix albums, but we have got a soft spot for Marumari's low-budget, high-concept sci-fi electronica. So have all his mates, it seems, as none of them have made too much of a sow's ear of remixing his spacy, melodic meanderings. A couple, like Casino Versus Japan and Stars As Eyes, graduate to 'silk purse' status by virtue of their delicate synth drones and unabashed poppiness. MP3s and videos give the disc extra VFM. (TM)

TRANS AM TA (Thrill Jockey)

Trans Am were making their own version of 'syntheore' back in the late 20th Century when they released the vocoder-heavy 'Futureworld'. Where that record managed to sound like Steve Albini's Shellac arriving to mend Neu and Kraftwerk's lift, only to find Vangelis having a wee in it, 'TA' sees them having a go at 'doing' early Eighties New Order, The Stranglers, Van Halen and mid-Eighties American AOR/MOR, and still ending up sounding like nobody except Trans Am. Like all their work, it charges down the odd blind alley, but that's the price you pay for music this imaginative. (DB)

ove him or hate him, there's no denying that the Oakenphant has been responsible for some of the UK dance scene's most pivotal moments. Originally a hip hop fan, Oakey's life was changed by a trip to the then little-known island of Ibiza. Oakey helped bring the Balearic vibe back to London via his club Spectrum, kick-starting the UK acid house boom.

In 1988, he began producing with Rob Davis and Steve Osbourne, releasing early Balearic classics such as 'Amnesia' and 'Jibaro'. Oakenfold and

Osbourne then worked with The Happy Mondays, transforming the indie-dance scene with anthems such as 'Wrote For Luck' and later producing the seminal 'Pills N Thrills & Bellyaches' LP.

The rest is history – the humungous Perfecto label; megabucks remixes for everyone from U2 to, er, Olive; a nascent career in movie soundtracking and the love (and occasionally hatred) of millions worldwide. But you know all that already. These are the Oakey records that you should scour second hand record shops for. . .

Unfinished Sympathy (Circa 12-inch, 1991) The Bristol gloom posse's anthem is touched with the respect it deserves by Oakenfold. A timeless classic that's regularly bootlegged. Minus the 'Attack' due to the Gulf War, in case you were wondering.

Even Better Than The Real Thing

(Island 12-inch, 1992)

Quite literally even better than the real thing, with the anthemic Perfecto mixes reaching a higher chart position than the previously released original.

£40 Not Over Yet (Perfecto Promo 12-inch, 1993) Much sought-after at the time, this promo is as rare as hen's teeth. A massive tune for Sasha at the time, this was re-released in 1995 as just Grace.

Lemon (US Island 12-inch, 1993 A more than worthy successor to Even Better, this US 12-inch was released on yellow vinyl and there was also a limited UK promo doublepack which included the extra 'Trance Mix'.



Wide Open Space (Parlophone Promo 12-inch, 1998)

This promo-only Perfecto mix is worth a king's ransom in some parts of the world. The boys also remixed 'I Can Only Disappoint You' in 2000.



Destiny (ffrr promo 12-inch, 1989) This Balearic classic was done by Oakey, Osbourne. and Davis. The promo includes 'Purple' and the Giorgio Moroder-sampling 'Destiny'.

ost on-line record stores are pretty formulaic, but Groovetech, which has operations both sides of the Atlantic. has a rather neat gimmick - regular live internet radio broadcasts featuring the likes of Rennie Pilgrem,


Craig Richards, James Zabiela and many others. While you're listening in you might as well browse the broad selection of vinyl at their on-line store, right? Well, we guess that's the idea.

The award-winning website, www.groovetech.com, is much more complicated - and as a result, much slower - than www.juno.co.uk, which we covered last month, but the shop offers an excellent search and filter facility, and satisfyingly long RealAudio samples of each mix. Once registered on the site you won't have to re-enter you details each time you buy. You can also store a personal 'wish list' (very handy) and receive

stock updates by e-mail.

We've ordered from Groovetech and received goods next day with no problems. Just one thing to watch here though is that the quoted prices do NOT include VAT. Add that, and then postage charges and things can get pretty expensive. But as long as you keep a calculator to hand, Groovetech is well worth a look.

TIPS, TOOLS AND GEAR TO MAKE YOU A SUPERSTAR DJ



I've been DJing for 13 years," says Andy Cole, a 28 year-old graphic designer who lives in East London. Andy's house sound draws from the best – the exotic influence of Basement Jaxx and the angry stomp of Justin Robertson shine through on his mix. His soulful trip ebbs and flows, building through a series of trippy house cuts. As that title suggests, Coles would sound great in a west London sweatbox – but he'd also sound superb spinning on Salinas Beach, mid-summer.

"I've started making tunes," he says, "and I included two new tracks on the mix. I wanted to sum up the style I play but it's quite tricky when you play electro, house and techno – I'm not afraid to play massive tunes either!"

As well as the day job and DJ gigs, Andy helps run the Madruagada night at Jax in London Bridge. And now?

"I'm looking to get more gigs and produce music. Ideally, I'd like to play at Sankey's – that would be amazing."

Can anyone offer him a suitable slot Manchester-way?


e all take it for granted now (and some even predict its demise with the rise of MP3) but way back in 1983, CD was cutting edge technology. This little fella is one of the very first CD players ever produced and it came from jointinventors (with Sony) of the CD format. The very first generation of players was their CD 101, similar to their original CD 100 but with a faster track access chip. Well built and surprisingly stylish, the CD 101 and its derivatives sold well, especially considering their high price and the very limited choice

of discs available (mainly Dire 'fucking' Straits). Early Philips players have proved to be very reliable and many still work today, almost 20 years later, including this one.

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The small but important things in dance music

hen man first came up with the idea of getting some people together to dance to music indoors, it seemed like a tremendously glamorous thing to do. Everyone could dress up, be exotic, shake off the cares of the world and create a little bit of magic. They did, and still do, your new white trainers and

but behind the shiny exterior lurks a dirty secret - even at legendary New York nightclub Studio 54 there was disco dirt.

Disco dirt (or dancefloor gunge or 'that stuff') is the sticky, slimy substance that coats the floor of every nightclub the world over, turning carpets black, making dancefloors treacherous and steadfastly attaching itself to

rendering them unwearable after a single club outing.

Scientific testing, conducted by one member of the Muzik team during a particularly arduous lunch break, has shown the evil stuff to be made up of concentrated sugary drinks, sweat, piss, cigarette ash, dancefloor varnish, 'miscellaneous powders', and brick dust. The powdery matter gives the gunge a strong and

durable base, the cigarette ash and bodily fluids give it its distinctive smell and durable blackness, the sugary drinks provide its legendary stickiness and the fine varnish crystals bind the whole thing together.

The result is an horrific compound worthy of the darkest experiments carried out in clandestine American chemical weapons research labs. But like many less


agreeable aspects of the clubbing experience (queues, lairy bouncers, death by overdose, Judge Jules), we have come to love it.
