TOUGH HOUSE beats, irresistible soul hooks and belting garage vocals —this month's exclusive Muzik mix perfectly encapsulates lbiza now. Selected by Erick Morillo and

Selected by Erick Morillo and blended by Subliminal's Richard F, this is a superb set.

"It's a classic example of up-down motion," says Richard. "When I spin, I like to hit the crowd with three banging records and then drop off a

little bit. Peaks and valleys are what makes a good DJ."

The latest addition to the Subliminal crew, Richard F hooked up with the New Jersey jocks through the good word of Harry 'Choo Choo' Romero. "I had a record out called 'Good Love'," recalls the not-quite-native New Yorker. "Harry played it at a gig in Toronto and Erick went mad for it. Soon after I was invited to join the camp."

Richard's been hooked up with Subliminal for just over a year now.
Thankfully, things are still pretty crazy. "I'm trying to stay out of trouble,"
he laughs, "but I'm not doing a very good job of it!"

1 MONGOBONIX

Mas Pito

Richard: "A classic Subliminal record. 'Mas Pito' is pure jazz with an element of funk, and the sax is the sound of two genres clashing together. I've yet to drop this tune and not hear someone scream."

2 RICHARD F

Feels So Strong

Richard: "This record is doing even better than we expected! It's got a great jazz sample and a vocal from Paulette. People really love this record in Ibiza—which is great, cos it's one of mine!"

expression I'm known for saying. So when

These beats are having it!"

Erick: "Everything is at your fingertips here – including one hour video delivery! New York has three airports, so it's easy to catch a flight pretty much anywhere."



MARK SPOON

ON 'TIME TO BURN', MARADONA AND SHAGGING PACHA DANCERS

THERE ARE TWO SIDES TO MARK SPOON. One is the humble, culture-loving aesthete with a penchant for fine wine and cigars. The other is a Pacha-crashing, Space-slaying spinner from the darkest depths of Frankfurt. Spoon's clubland antics are legendary. The larger half of Jam & Spoon (think 'Stella' – both the tune and the drink) is in Ibiza for the opening of Xtravaganza's monumental party at Privilege. As if that wasn't enough, his latest Storm solo effort, 'Time To Burn' is the biggest thing on the White Island this summer.

MUZIK: 'Time To Burn' is the hottest tune of Ibiza 2000...

MS: "Ze first Storm record vas big but zis von is even bigger. It's ein huge tune! It's ein enormous record everywhere. It's selling in 22 countries. Even Colombia!" MUZIK: Your reputation is one of unashamed hedonism.

MS: "Vot is hedonism? It's a question of lifestyle, ja? You can cross ze road and die or you can live your life and be free. I just do what I vant to do."

MUZIK: What do you think of the UK dance music scene?

MS: "Tall Paul ist ein good friend of mine – I mixed his last single on Duty Free. Also I am massive fan of Sasha. Vee played ze Space opening party together earlier zis summer. Who eez my favourite DJ? Me, myself and Ich!"

MUZIK: We understand you've been banged up twice...

"Zere are zo many stories! Five or six years ago I vas playing on ze terrace at Space and ze guy who runs the club saw me taking an E und called ze polizei. I vent to jail for five days. Zey needed to make ein example of somevun well-known for ze papers and it just happened to be me."

MUZIK: You're a dedicated follower of Pacha. What have you got up to there? MS: "Zee best club in ze vorld! Mein proudest moment voz fucking three dancers from Pacha at ze same time backstage. Und having Diego Maradona right next to me doing a line! Zat voz a very proud moment, ja. Diego vonted to join in. I sent him away."

MUZIK: No regrets, though?

MS: "I regret not letting him join me. But I said I didn't vont him joining in. I vould prefer Mike Manumission, because he could bring Claire, nein? Jade Jagger could join us as well. But ze most sexiest girl on ze island has got to be Amber from The Blue Rose strip club."

MUZIK: You really love Ibiza, don't you?

MS: "It's ein honour to play here und a very emotional thing to play in a club like Privilege. You can say vot you like about Manumission but ze energy is incredible. Es Vedra ist ein magical place. Ibiza ist full of special people leading special lives."


MARK SPOON

IN A SURPRISE mid-season shake up, Gatecrasher have moved operations from Pacha in Ibiza Town to Eden, a newer venue on the other side of the island, in San Antonio. Muzik understands that Gatecrasher's weekly line-up will remain relatively unchanged, with Roger Sanchez remaining the club's key resident, while the weekly parties at Space will continue.

Pacha's Musical Director Danny Whittle spoke to Muzik about the move.

"Even though we had disagreements, we just split amicably," Whittle told Muzik. "None of the disagreements were worth getting angry over, we just decided that it was best for both parties to go on and do other things. A lot of it is down to cultural differences. Am I disappointed? A little bit. The Roger Sanchez connection was fantastic. But you have to move on."

Pacha have now started their own mid-week Global parties featuring guests such as Darren Emerson, who flew over at three days' notice to spin at Whittle's new night late last month.

"We're after a couple of superstar DJs," Whittle revealed, "but I can't tell you their names yet in case it doesn't happen!"

Pacha London is due to open at the former Raw club in Great Russell Street in October 2000. The opening of Pacha London will coincide with the summer closing at Pacha Ibiza, when the two clubs & will be connected via ISDN.



They managed to get the new, repositioned booth finished in time for my gig with Danny Tenaglia and the room rocked. It's changed the whole mood of the room and it was a phenomenal night. Mind you, Danny still wasn't happy - because there wasn't enough room for all his equipment!

I ended up in Holland two days after they got knocked out of Euro 2000, but it didn't seem to affect the crowd. 40,000 people in the Ajax footie stadium for Sensation, on the pitch, going crazy with the roof closed over their heads and fireworks all over the stadium. Imagine an indoors Homelands - it was like that. An amazing night.

Berlin Love Parade was incredible as ever. There were about one and a half million people there. I ended up on Sven Vath's truck which is always the loudest and I think some of you may have heard me on Radio 1.

From Berlin, straight to muddy Scotland and Tin The Park. It was brilliant. But wet. The spirit of the people was there, though - that's the thing.

We had a Slam Versus Ultimate Base soundclash - me and Jim Masters versus the Slam boys. But then Darren Emerson got up too, so we had five DJs on four decks battling it out, and it worked so well. Tunes like the new Jeff Mills and Slam's own 2000 remix of 'Positive Education' mashed it up. Speaking of 'Positive Education', I'm still waiting for a cut of my own remix of it-c'mon boys!

IT WAS COMEDOWN this month when I headed back to the Octopus club in Tel Aviv, Israel. The last couple of times I'd been there, it was with Darren Emerson, so it had been absolutely ram-packed. This time the promoters decided to just put me on by myself.

Well, it was a nice idea, but it didn't work too well, to be honest. The music in Israel is quite hard, so when I played, people didn't have the energy they were accustomed to. I guess you could say I play tough while they like it hard. What's the difference? Well, to me, for hard you just grit your teeth and pump-while tough means you keep the funk, mixing and cutting across it!

It's nights like that you realise being a DJ is sometimes just a job-you've just got to get on with it and do your best.

But what really made up for it was the Leeds Love Parade. I've never seen anything like it. I played three floats-Subliminal's, Radio 1's and Cream's. Subliminal was bananas, especially when the crowd decided to trash the float. Ben Sherman were sponsoring it and all their signs and posters just went flying. Total anarchy!

Talking of unusual experiences, I'm used to having people on percussion banging alongside the DJ, but at Urban, they didn't just have a percussionist, but also a live bass player doing some

slapping over my set, giving it some funk. It worked a treat, which was great, because I've played my fair share of gigs where some idiot on a bongo or a drum kit ruins it for the DJ. One time in Manchester, some total New Age Dave The Rave had a set of bongos which he was slapping randomly, so I had to ask him to stop. Not nice, but sometimes you've got to do it. It's important for a percussionist to complement the DJ, and not to try to steal the show.



When and where were you born? "January 25th, 1966 in Turin, the home of great football."

What has this week involved for you? "Producing a new track as Megamind and promoting 'Nukleuz Presentz Mauro Picotto The Lizard Man'. I also made a video in Germany for my new tune 'Komodo'. It's based on the [Aliens with more cleavage] film Species." Would you call yourself a trance DJ? "No. I play music that could be described as techno, house, hard house and trance. The punters always dance which is

and joined Media Records. But really it was more a gradual evolution, rather than getting one single break. My next single, "Komodo", could go Top 10 in Europe – maybe that will be my really big break!"

What music did you like listening to as a child?

"As a child I listened to pop music on the radio, then got into disco and hip hop in my mid teens, but since then it's been techno in all its forms that presses my buttons." Is your life one long sexadelic party zone? "I'm not a wild and crazy guy. In fact when I'm with Mark Spoon I really fear for my life! I have a wife who I met working at

Media and we had a kid a year ago. That sobers you up a lot."

Do the Italians love Nukleuz as much as the British seem to? "Nukleuz takes the best of international and UK trance, techno, and hard house to suit the UK tastes. Much of it derives from our BXR label, which is Italy's leading dance label. Most Italians are not really aware of Nukleuz, though, as it is only an import label in Italy."

What ventures have you got coming up, in terms of DJing and a release schedule? "I'm extremely busy over the summer playing Ibiza, the UK and all over Europe. I've played May Day and Love Parade in Germany this year, so I've done the two biggest gigs of the year. In the UK and Ireland I'll be playing Slinky and Gatecrasher among others."

Have you ever had any experiences with lizards? "Of course, I've lived a few months with an iguana, check the picture out in my album."

Is your studio a dance music production line, like Motown and Phil Spector used to have? "Well, by using the Pro-tools system we can prepare and mix records very quickly. We have working practices that enable us to create tracks and mixes quickly. Having

said this, we try to start with a new groove every time." Who are your heroes? "Most people don't impress me that much. Everyone has talents."

What are your favourite labels? "Our own label BXR would be my favourite as we are making the music we play out. In a DJ set I'll play 75% BXR records. I like DAVE The Drummer too, and Nick Sentience is fast becoming the best UK techno producer."






affinity with all them than Gatecrasher!"

'BANG'! Robbie Rivera's new track starts with the kind of jack-hammer piano line that gets your hips shaking without you realising. The Rhythm Bangers bellow over the top, before Rivera's trademark filter loops turn the whole thing into a salsa-shagging anthem.

Swaggering around the dancefloor with the same libidinous Latin strut as Basement Jaxx and DJ Sneak's more carnival-esque moments, it's a track that, predictably, has snuck up on the lbizan dancefloors of Pacha and Space and taken them roughly from behind.

"I recorded the music for it about eight or nine months ago," explains the 23 year old post-grad from his Miami studio. "I was playing it everywhere I went, and it was just getting this great reaction." Little wonder.

Robbie was already something of DJ celeb in his native Puerto Rico before he decamped to Miami University at the age of 18. From starting off

DJing at "house parties, weddings, all that kind of shit," by the time he left school he'd become a budding Pete Tong, hosting a mix show from 8pm-2am every Friday and Saturday evening on the local radio.

"The party scene in Puerto is really cool," he enthuses. "I went to Ibiza two weeks ago, and when I landed there it felt totally like Puerto Rico. The old town there is exactly the same as Ibiza Town – except the clubs are 20 times better in Ibiza!"

As well as being a purveyor of fine quality house records, Robbie's no slouch behind the decks – something his forthcoming compilation 'The Real Miami' ably demonstrates. "It's gonna be a bit weird when that CD comes over here, because the real sound of Miami at the moment is trance," he confesses. "I feel that there's so much trance being played in the clubs that people are forgetting about house."

Of course, most Brits in the dance fraternity's main experience of Miami is from the infamous Winter Music Conference, an annual event which has led many to tentatively suggest that Miami might be the next lbiza. . .

"I think so too!" he exclaims excitedly. "The last conference was such a lot of fun!"

Clearly a hard-working young lad, Robbie's already finished the follow-up to 'Bang'. "The minute you hear it, you'll know it's me," he assures us. Get those cocktails ready! (JH)





STEVE LAWLER

THE FAST-RISING NU-BREEDER ON THE PERILS OF POPULARITY

LIFE IS HECTIC for Steve Lawler. Muzik caught up with the rising star of deep tech-house taking a well-deserved break from the mayhem of his Deep South Friday-nighter (at Home in Leicester Square) on Salinas nudist beach in Ibiza. Which was nice.

Relaxing in the late afternoon sun, the hazy DJ is definitely in need of some light R 'n' R. His summer touring schedule sounds punishing enough to crack a commando.

"There's a lot to do. Take this week, for example. I came over to play Perceptions Of Pacha. I'm flying back to London for Deep South tomorrow, there's Scotland on Saturday plus Space on Sunday. Then it's back to Manchester for a gig at Planet, Friday is Home in London and Saturday I'm off to Middlesborough. My girlfriend's not going to be happy!"

Renowned for his deep, extended sessions in Space, Steve is now as much a part of the terrace as Sasha or Morillo. And as the anti-trance wave sweeps Ibiza, his popularity looks set to escalate. Along with his playing time. "I can play for seven or eight hours quite easily," says Steve. "But I'm not quite ready for a mammoth Tenaglia-style 12-hour set just yet." But is he happy with that nu-breed title? "It's yet another tag, but it does make sense, because we're bringing something fresh to the table," he says. "But I've been DJing for 10 years, so I'm not exactly new!"

Like Lee Burridge and Craig Richards, Steve specialises in deeper than deep house and dark tech-electro. Again, Tenaglia looms large. "Be Yourself' by Celeda was massive on the terrace last summer," says Steve. "And that's a sound I'm still into now. Having said that, I don't think it matters what music's being played. When you come to Ibiza, any and all music sounds good."

Steve says he's had a bizarre experience everywhere at some point or other. A couple of years back, he spotted a guy doing front crawl on the top podium in Space. Oblivious to his surroundings, he was totally naked except for some swimming goggles. "I couldn't decide whether he'd done a load of gear or was so Balearic he didn't even realise!"

UR BUSTLE & OUT

FIDEL-FANCYING NU-JAZZERS

"I THINK IT'S THEIR amazing joy for life," says Up, Bustle & Out's Rupert Mould, trying to define a passion for Cuba that has mutated into a two part album, a book (part travelogue, part fascinating social history) and a CD-Rom of 16mm film footage. A long term interest in Che Guevara had led the band to record an EP about him which got heavy rotation on Havana radio, and in return they were invited over to play. They spent over two months on the island, writing and recording, and taking in the local musical culture, from Latin Beatles cover bands to hip hop groups knocking out beats on congas and timbales. The resulting album 'Rebel Radio', named after the pirate station used to broadcast the message of the

revolution, was partly recorded in the famous Sonocaribe studio with its dusty Fifties valve amps and a host of notable Cuban musicians.

Meanwhile arranger/producer Ein was working hard on the beats back in Bristol. The finished album blends modern breakbeats and samples with more traditional Cuban rhythms.

"I think the album shows a contrast between the two cities, a link between the old and new world," Ein explains. "We haven't got a Bristol sound particularly but we like to bring in musicians from the surrounding area and mix them with influences from other countries (previous Up, Bustle & Out releases have melded music from as far afield as Spain, India and

Bolivia). It can be a bit hit or miss but sometimes you come up with something really wild."

Having sat on the tapes for the best part of two years – in which they recorded 'Master Sessions 2', set up their own publishing house and witnessed the rise of the Buena Vista Social Club phenomenon – the band are itching to move on with their next project, 'Scenes From The Urban Wasteland', which will document the lost cultures of eastern Europe. Ein promises it will be "more disjointed and disturbing ... just really strange stuff." (NG)



THE RAIN IS POURING DOWN.

the skies are grey and the wind is cold. Welcome to the British summertime, as the Radio 1 Love Parade winds its weary way around the greenery of Leeds' Roundhay Park. Stationed on Danny Rampling's float, the glammed-up Ultra Nate belts her way through her shiny club anthem 'Desire' regardless, and for a brief moment, the sun seems to be shining once again.

First gaining recognition with her class of '89 anthem, 'It's Over Now', Ultra Nate's career really took off with the unfeasibly massive 'Free', followed by the equally successful 'Situation: Critical' longplayer in 1998. Now she's back with 'Stranger Than Fiction', a more upbeat collection than its predecessor, and probably her most accomplished work to date. Lead cut 'Desire' has taken up residency at the top of the club charts.

"It was great not having to run around the world supporting a single," she explains, still damp from the traditional Leeds piss-down. "I had time sit down and write what I wanted to write, and I got to work with loads of great people."

Ultra's sparkly, dare-we-say-it, sassy stage presence is in demand everywhere from house clubs to two-step clubs, from MTV to CD:UK, effortlessly working the cred plus cash thing.

"I think it's because, unlike a lot of dance music that's out there, people have an actual personality to connect with," she offers. "Once you make the song more alive to people, there's a person, an image and a sound that they're buying into, and that's a lot more memorable."

But it's not all recording sessions and promotional interviews – her schedule takes her far and wide, including her occasional cherished forays to lbiza.


"After seeing England and all this greyness, I can see why everyone's heading for Ibiza!" she chortles. "I love Ibiza. There's this mad nightlife going on, but if you want to get away from that, you can balance it out with the beautiful beaches. The whole island atmosphere gives you a sense of carefree, unbridled freedom. Although admittedly, that can be quite scary with some people!"


The veteran diva is no Ultra-lightweight, though. "I've been out and about in the club scene for so many years that I'm not really shocked by anything," she chuckles.



RIGHT. WHERE DO WE START? We're on an island off the coast of Africa in Sioux City, a private Wild West enclave run by an Austrian cowboy nicknamed, er, Buffalo Bill. We're surrounded by wigwams, live bulls, a fully-functioning saloon with dancers, a brothel and 3,500 muntered Spaniards and whoop-it-up holidaymakers. Dust is thick on the ground, coke smoke is hanging in the air and Brazilian transvestites are strip-teasing to loin-clothed percussionists behind the stagecoach repair shop. A-whicky-whicky-wa-ah-wild-wild-west, as Will Smith would so rightly say.

We're here for Muzik's first ever Canaries kneesup, and to check out the cow-poking talents of Jon Pleased Wimmin, Phil Perry and Tito LaRocka. Tito's the pin-up La Palma DJ/promoter who suggested the event in the first place. He's got the most rocking selection of ex-girlfriends this side of Warren Beatty and pupils the size of dinner plates, and right now, he's dropping a sexy warm-up set of deep house. The music bounces round the canyon, through the hot night air and comes to rest in between the breasts of a Spanish cowgirl. That's what said cowgirl tells us, anyway.

Over in the Saloon, the most hideous selection of bacalao (a sort of gabba-meets-Vengaboys racket) is rocking a sweaty, no-nonsense crowd. The music is accompanied by Wild West showgirls on stage so trollied they can hardly kick up their skirts. It's fun: but for them only, perhaps.

Safe back in British hands, so to speak, Jon of the Pleased builds from disco-groovy to banging, dirty house above the town bank. It's a pistol-packing set which succeeds in winning over Spaniards used to more predictable fodder, and paves the way perfectly for a Phil Perry shoot-out that must rate as one of the sets of the year. Even if the sound system is sabotaged by the odd power failure. Well, we are in a canyon miles from anywhere. . .

Down at Sioux City's Corral, a selection of

Spanish jocks are trouncing the invading hordes with bowel-moving techno. Bars are overflowing, a German coach party has arrived, and the security are tensing up at the growing numbers. Some, in leather coats, handlebar moustaches and black cowboy hats, look pretty mean, but to their credit, they keep the party flowing without any unnecessary intervention.

Frankly, by sunrise at seven, Muzik, Phil and Jon are gobsmacked. Between us, we've seen the odd knees-up over the years, but the Showdown at Sioux City 2000 is something truly spectacular. Surreal, stupendous, sweat-soaked and, er, very, very silly are just some of the adjectives tumbling from our lips as the sun rises over the Muzik banner straddling the stagecoach stop.

"We've gotta make this a regular event!" grins La Rocka as he escorts three stunning senoritas to a private party in his hotel room.

Yes we do. And when we do, readers, make sure you book the trip. . . (**DF**)

WHERE THERE'S MUCK, THERE'S HOUSE

NEW YORK DONS MASTERS AT WORK ARE TO VISIT TO WEST YORKSHIRE, THANKS TO AN EPOCH-MAKING UNION BETWEEN THREE OF THE NORTH'S BIGGEST CLUBS

"WE COULDN'T ORGANISE a piss-up in a brewery, us." Not the kind of statement you'd necessarily expect to come from Dave Beer, but then again the legendary promoter is almost as famed for his piss-taking as he is for his parties.

His flippancy is even more remarkable considering the reason Muzik has been summoned to Beer's home town in the first place. We're here, y'see, to talk about the impending visit of Masters At Work to Leeds.

There's little doubt that this is one of the clubbing coups of the year. The Masters rarely venture over the Atlantic individually, never mind as a duo. The party they'll play at marks the seventh birthday of one of Britain's most loved house clubs — Hard Times. More significantly though, the party symbolises the coming together of three of the

North's most recognised and revered promoters: Basics' Dave Beer, Stereo's Dave Elliot and Antony Geogallis and Hard Times' Steve Rain.

It's the first time Rain has been involved in organising anything in the city for a while now. Three years ago he decided to hand over the reins to others, preferring instead to concentrate on breeding sheep. But once the invitation from the two Daves and the lure of another party with Masters At Work (the headlining guests at Hard Times' first birthday) was on the table, the temptation was too great.

All three promoters could theoretically have booked the duo on their own. It's testimony, however, to Leeds' re-emergence as a major clubbing force that such an alliance could be formed. With rivalry between dance clubs evident in even the smallest and most secluded of British

cities, it says a lot about the trust and mutual respect that these Northern musketeers share.

"The significance of the event isn't just about MAW, it's about the union of our three clubs," Rain emphasises. The secret is that they all share a common love and a common goal. The love is house music, and the goal? To put on the best party possible.

"I reckon if all our clubs, individually, are as good as they are," spouts Beer in typically assertive fashion, "just think how great this is going to be now we've all come together." (SM)

A GIRL IN TIGHT HIPSTERS, chini bumps and a T-shirt three sizes too small is looking over her shoulder at a boy with spiky blonde hair as they fake sex. A few feet away another guy, pneumatically pumped in his pseudo-trash-punk gear, has a couple of ravishing über-babes draped around him. They take turns kissing him hard on the lips as they slither about to Joey Negro's mix of Akabu. As preparation for the evening, we fight our way to the bar and stock up on some Vodka Red Bulls.

We're in Cologne, sailing down the Rhine, and we're here to see Hardfloor play live. Right now though we're admiring the view from the top deck, listening to a local lad play some fat, chunky house. The dancefloor, the whole boat in fact, is rammed with a cool mix of full-on gays and impossibly beautiful girls. A light rain is falling from the sky as a huge rainbow appears on the other side of the water. "Crikey!" I think to myself as we move downstairs to the main dancefloor where Laurent Garnier is playing, "this is alright."

Laurent looks like he's having a good time too, busily cutting the vocal from

his own 'Wake Up' over Josh Wink's mix of 'French Kiss' while the crowd goes into orbit. We listen to him for an hour or so before having a few words with the Hardfloor boys.

"We don't really like talking about our music, we just do what we feel at the time," says Oliver (the tall one) as Ramon nods his head in solemn agreement. Erm, okay, that's the end of that, then.

At around 4am, Hardfloor finally take to the stage, warming up with a couple of tracks from their new album 'So What?!'. Huge breaks collide with their trademark acid riffs before they launch in to a thunderous version of the mighty 'Acperience'. They follow that with their mix of 'Yeke Yeke' and then go into stomping techno mode. Suddenly, or so it seems, the lights go up, the sound fades and the crowd cheer. It goes off one more time and then bang, it's over. Yep, good fucking party. (DM)







IN A QUAINT HOUSE

in Horsham, Sussex, at the bottom of a gravel drive, Carl Cox is slowly coming down. It's often the way on a Monday morning, with the big man sitting on his big sofa, viewing his big black V8 Jaguar through the window and waiting for the buzz to recede. The chemical that's been pumping through his veins? High-octane adrenaline. Enough of the stuff to see him through a weekend which took in DJing in front of one-and-a-half million frothing Germans at Berlin's Love Parade, followed by an 'intimate' show in front of more than 10,000 at T In The Park.

"It's been a weekend of people as far as the eye can see," he notes triumphantly from behind bookish spectacles. "It's kind of ironic: 12 years ago everyone was wondering how long this scene would last for. Well here we are in the year 2000, and the kick drum prevails."

Cox's rustically appointed living room - complete with brick fireplace and flowery trimmings - couldn't be further removed from the whistle-blowing, pillpopping, half-clothed mayhem of Berlin if it were situated on Alpha Centauri. As well as coming down, he heads back here to peruse the bigger picture. To cogitate on a career he believes has rolled out peculiarly, combining both glory and wealth, but also, as he sees it, misunderstanding and a paucity of acclaim. This comes from a man who's recognised the world over. How can it be?

"I still see myself as an unsung hero," Cox says. "You look at Paul Oakenfold and he is known as the pinnacle DJ who's in the Guinness Book Of Records, who's done all the big tours and gets attention for whatever he does. If anyone's going to be perceived as breaking America this year it'll be Paul. But I was there three or four years before he was and able to pull just as many people and cause easily as much hype and interest."

Carl Cox sweeps a hand across the room,

pointing out the numerous awards he's won, including his Muzik/Ericsson smileys for Best DJ and Best Essential Mix, which now take pride of place on his mantlepiece.

"Of course it hasn't all been bad, and I can't afford to be bitter, but I do feel there could be more emphasis on what I've achieved."

He's gone down a storm everywhere from The Big Breakfast, Never Mind The Buzzcocks and Human Traffic to Space, Cream and The End. Surely more than enough ammo to put him on an egual footing with Oakey?

"In a sense, yes. I could sit here all day going, 'Of course I'm bigger than Oakenfold'. And the truth is, if you look at the work I've done, how long I've been doing this for, and were to ask people who they're most into, it'd be me. But in the eyes of the media it's Paul."

Mid-train of thought, Cox changes tack. To better illustrate his point, he recounts a bizarre incident from a few weeks ago, which left him uncertain whether to grin or weep.

"This kid came up to me and said, 'You're still the best Number Two DJ in the world'. Hee, hee, boof!" Cox exclaims, as he mimics punching the kid through the nearest wall. "You have to laugh."

Too many of us, it seems, aren't getting with Cox's schtick. As he puts it, he's not the DJ who hangs around to "wallow in success". He's the one who lays down foundations - in rave, breakbeat, trance, hard house and techno - which others then build upon. In other words, he feels that he does the hard work, then leaves others to pick up the plaudits.

"The records I'm playing now are the records that other DJs will be playing in two years' time," he insists. "By then, I will have moved on to something new. It's what I'm about as a DJ: I push the elements forward."

And people don't understand this?

"It's easy to understand Oakenfold, Sasha and Judge Jules, because they make it easy for people to understand them. But still nobody understands me. I don't conform."

If passion for music counts for anything it's hard to believe Carl Cox is anything but the Number One DJ in the world. As much as he epitomises the modern day superstar spinner, the many years he spent plugging away before the acid house explosion demonstrate he's also a link with times when playing records didn't have you needing an offshore bank account.

"I used to earn 12 guid for playing in Kingston wine bars," he recalls. "But that made me hungry, because if I played well, I figured I could ask for 20 guid the next week."

Ask him to name a DJ who should have broken into the top ranks in these last few years and he opts for Adam Freeland. Once, the nu-skooler was firmly planted under Coxy's wing, but it appears they don't see eye to eye any more.

"Adam Freeland should have become a star. He had that chance but he choose to run before he could walk," Cox says. "He turned into a purist when his music should have been about having fun. The industry was like, 'Sorry mate, you've got further to go than you think'.

The hunger that Cox gained playing in wine bars lives on, both in the form of the famously addictive

enthusiasm he gives off when DJing and his still seemingly effortless prowess for bringing underground sounds to a wider audience. Great performances by Carl Cox become permanently wedged in the brain, that's as true now as ever. This summer, on the opening night of Home at Space, Cox took to the decks indoors for the first time and truly let rip. Incredibly, he pulled this off with only a small bag of records, as the rest of his vinyl had gone astray at the airport.

"I want people to feel lucky if they're on the island at the same time as I'm playing - like, I could be anywhere in the world but it just so happens I'm here at the same time as them," says Cox of his relatively limited sorties to Ibiza. "I want people to be able to say: 'I had a great holiday. I got pissed, I got a shag, I lost all me mates, I witnessed a great sunset and I saw Carl Cox DJing'. That's the contribution I want to make to people's holidays."

Intent on avoiding Ibiza burn-out, Carl Cox has bought himself a villa on nearby Mallorca rather than at the centre of the mayhem. Back in London, meanwhile, he has a home-from-home in Ultimate Base, his friendly, thumping techno institution, which is nearing its fifth birthday. Upon reaching that date, however, Carl reckons it will be time for a change, with Ultimate Base coming to an end and him looking for a choice resident slot elsewhere.


"The only place that seems right for me is Nottingham's Renaissance," he reveals. "Brilliant club, brilliant people. I've said to [Renaissance promoter] Geoff Oakes, I'd like to look at a resident situation with them next year."

There'll be another New Year's Eve for Cox to deal with before then. It's hard to imagine it will match his assault on the new millennium, which saw him playing in Australia, then flying for eight hours and crossing time zones to play in Hawaii.

"Hawaii really was new territory," he smiles. "Half of the crowd had heard of me - the other half looked at my name and thought I was some sort of strap-on dildo!"

It's been tough work for Carl Cox to keep his eye on the ball in the five years since he last graced Muzik's cover. In 1998, after three years of marriage and many more before that as





boyfriend/friend, he divorced his wife, Rachel. As well as the heartache, his financial security was thrown up in the air by the divorce settlement. Not surprisingly, this is a sensitive subject, but it's not one that Cox – who's now happy in a relationship with new girlfriend Helen – shies away from discussing.

"I was trying to deal with all this emotional stress as well as being the Number One DJ in Germany, Holland and Britain. That's hard work," he notes. "When I got married, it was supposed to be for life but then it broke down, and it wasn't because I was out late at night or shagging other women. It's just that my path and her path turned out to be two very different things. I remember sitting in this very room, attempting to plan our future. But it became clear that my future was already mapped out and this was hard for her to understand."

"There was conflict," he continues solemnly. "We reached a point where we couldn't handle it any more. I didn't want to come in after having had a really good night only to have an argument about the reasons why I'd had a good night."

In the midst of this trauma, Cox put his faith in the life force he trusts the most: the music.

"I've learnt how strongly I feel about my music. Without it, I would have turned to drink and drugs, or I would be in a mental institution. I would have become a nasty, angry person."

Compounding the pressure of splitting from his wife, Cox endured various health problems. In fact, two years ago, it seemed his huge frame was falling apart. He acquired a kidney stone, a stomach infection which had him hospitalised in New York for five days and, of all things, gout, an ailment normally perceived as the preserve of elderly aristocrats.

"It was like, ding-ding! Warning! No more brandy, champagne or red meat for you," he laughs. "And I had to learn that I couldn't do the impossible any more. I could no longer play one hour in Canada, fly straight to Yugoslavia to DJ for an hour and then fly home to paint my basement."


Right now, Carl Cox looks the picture of health. Younger than his 37 years, in fact, and showing few signs of two decades lost in clubs. He puts this down to having discovered water ("No one ever told me before that I was supposed to drink it!") and to returning to Horsham as often as possible, "instead of going down the Met Bar to meet a load of pretentious mates."

Cox views the celebrity scene with considerable ambivalence. He's mates with Sid Owen. He's met everyone from Kate Moss to Emma Bunton, but only really seems on home ground when talking about star spotting from the other side of his Technics. He beams that familiar beam when recounting the time he stopped off, mid-holiday, to DJ in Los Angeles and found



himself playing to a fully-fledged Hollywood giant.

"This guy in a fisherman's hat and glasses was dancing for two hours on the podium. He came up to me at the end and said, 'Carl, that was wicked music, man'. It was Wesley Snipes! And he's an r&b fan!"


The general public are prone to even more dramatic reactions when they catch sight of Cox.

"There was this bloke riding along on a scooter. He saw me walking along and kept looking at me. Then crashed into a privet hedge!"

It's little wonder that such a passionate man should hold such fascination. Want to know how much Carl Cox loves his DJing? Enough to have scuppered his production work these last few years. Following the mixed response to his last two albums, the deck work has inevitably seemed more inviting. Particularly when you're getting offers like playing to 45,000 in the Ajax Stadium. Later this year, however, he plans to get started on a new album with several as yet unconfirmed coproducers. The intention is to make "stomping, hardcore Carl Cox-style dance tracks". Does he think he'll ever make music which matches his stature as a DJ?

"I don't know if that can be achieved. There's not many people in the world who don't know who Carl Cox the DJ is. It would be difficult for people to accept me as a producer that easily."

Presently, Carl has a new mix CD, recorded live at Chicago's Crobar club, out on the American Moonshine label. Featuring cuts from Timo Maas, Aphrohead, Humate and Steve Rachmad it is, rest assured, up to Cox's usual, self-set standards. Furthermore, he's the director of a new danceoriented internet project called eJay.com. Oh yeah, and if you were under the impression that Cox's film career began and ended with Human Traffic, think again. He'll be back in your local



multiplex in Elixir, an American clubbing movie which goes into production this autumn with Cameron Diaz confirmed in one of the lead roles. Cox plays a DJ, but says there's more to the part than merely him grinning and spinning.

"When you see a window of opportunity, you go for it," he remarks. "It's the same as with TV. An old granny might have heard my name from her grandchildren and if I go on the box doing something really normal, like giving everyone my breakfast tips, she can put a face to the name and see that even though I'm from this situation of unacceptability, from DJ-drug-culture, blah-blah, I'm an okay bloke."

It's testament to the sheer power and distinction

of his DJing that, as many TV or celluloid appearances he may make, they will never eclipse his first love. So despite him nearing 40, this is more mid-term report than final despatch. And as far as he's come, he's got miles further to go.

"It's never been about the easy route. I'm the sort of person who gets from Horsham to London via Japan," he grins. "But I'm one of the pioneers, no one can argue with that. I'm the DJ who says 'Forget that, that was 10 months ago, check this if you want to experience what's coming next'."

Carl's mix album 'Carl Cox Non Stop' will be out at the end of September on London

Eminem – misunderstood genius or anti-social creep?

"Misunderstood genius. Totally. He's someone I empathise with. He says what he's feeling and you've gotta give him his dues for having the balls to stand up for what he believes in."

Phillip Neville – does he deserve stick all season?

"I think he's got off quite lightly so far. When Beckham makes an indiscretion he gets much more crap and he's one of the best players in the world. I don't think Neville should be killed or have his house burnt down [That's nice of you – Ed.], but I do think he deserves some shit."

Fox-hunting - should it be banned?



"That I can have a laugh, I suppose – a laugh about anything and with anyone. I think I understand a lot about life now. Even a really good portion of chips makes me happy."

"I USED TO BE IN A BAND

in the late Eighties and was about to do a deal with Ten Times Better," announces Trade kingpin Laurence Malice laconically from behind his ever-present shades. "They were looking after dodgy Belgian new beat people. At a time when everyone was trying to be acid like Paul Oakenfold, new beat was not deemed to be the thing to play. But when I started at Turnmills one of the things I wanted to do was introduce those sounds. When I first started Trade, famous DJs of the time - including one who now plays hard house regularly - used to turn up because it was the only place open. But then they'd say, 'I've got to leave, I can't bear this noise'. Admittedly I wasn't entirely happy with everything in those early years but. . . "

Malice twists on his sofa and continues, "When Tony De Vit approached me to DJ, he was coming from a gay, hi-energy background in Birmingham. I thought, 'I've had enough of egos,' but his sound was different, more varied. Tony gave almost industrial techno a warmth which became hard house. He didn't come to Trade with the intention of


crossing over to the straight market, he just heard a style of music he thought he could better and he did. To people like Tony, Steve Thomas, Alan Thompson and Malcolm Duffy, Trade wasn't a nightclub, it was their lives."

Hard house has now taken over in manors a lot further afield than Farringdon, London. It is undoubtedly the sound of Summer 2000 – much to the chagrin of those who consider themselves media arbiters of taste. From Trade's back room at Manumission, Ibiza, to Sundissential's cross-Britain rampage, from God's Kitchen at Amnesia to Bristol's free Sunday night madness at Aubergine, it's all go.

"When I went to Trade I'd been raving for four or five years," explains Rob Burns of Friction Burns Records. "I thought I'd had enough of drugs and dancing, I wanted to leave it all behind. But I went to Trade and never looked back. Before that I had long hair and wore flamboyant shirts, then – wallop – the hair got shaved and I bought a white vest and baseball cap. Everyone became like a clone."

So how do we explain the birth of this monster?

"Some would say hard house evolved from hardcore," says Trade's Pete Wardman. "Others

would argue it was a German thing. Maybe Trade were doing it first. The more likely scenario is that a number of producers the world over were making tracks that were later pigeonholed as 'hard house' – once somebody had made up the name, that is."

It's impossible, however, to overestimate the importance of Trade and their late, long-term resident Tony De Vit when assessing the current hard house boom. Gay culture is undoubtedly where the sound came into its own but now, for better or worse, other influences are creeping in.

"I was being called a trancecore DJ as I broke away from happy hardcore," says Billy 'Daniel' Bunter. "The music then was around the 160/165 bpm mark, but was being played at Trade and Sunnyside Up, as well as me playing it at Helter Skelter and Dreamscape. By 1998, all my sets at hardcore raves and clubs were hard house."

"The crowds are getting a lot younger and a lot madder," says Fergie, one of the brightest new lights on the scene. "Actually it's getting to the point where it physically can't go any faster. I'm not saying this is bad, it just needs to calm down a bit if it's going to be taken seriously."

"My perception is different from other people," muses Steve Thomas, Trade resident and most certainly one of the founders of hard house as it stands today. "Kids who came into it three years ago don't know about all the stuff from eight years ago. To be honest, half of them don't realise there

are all these recycled breaks from old Belgian new beat tracks. The last few weeks I've been playing Mr Spring's 'Voyager 1.56' on Manifesto which is only two and a half years old but these kids don't know it. It's a problem for me when 'Blow Ya Mind' [Lock 'N' Load] is all they want to hear, because I've been playing this music for 10 years. A lot of this offbeat bassline stuff is too hard and too cheesy."

Thomas emphasises that he doesn't want to sound like an old moaner, and he doesn't – he has a point. The music he helped pioneer has bloomed into something rather simplistic, in the process becoming very popular. God's Kitchen is packing them in on the White Island on the basis of 4/4 beats which would have come to prominence a lot

earlier had Tony De Vit not died of bronchial problems related to his HIV medication on July 2nd, 1998. Putting it simply, De Vit was THE hard house figurehead, the godfather, the doyen, the man who all but invented the sound.

"Tony brought some vital element in," Laurence Malice confirms, "maybe a touch of indefinable campness which softened the techno sound."

Hard house has also proved irresistible to women DJs. From early pioneers like Rachel Auburn, Smokin' Jo, Mrs Wood and Queen Maxine through Madam Friction to today's mainstream crowd-pullers such as Anne Savage and Lisas Pin-Up and Lashes, the pumpin' sound has a female presence unrivalled in dance music.


"I am what I am, I looked like this before I

DJed – it's just me," says the undeniably glamourous Lisa Pin-Up. "When people look at me they think I'll play all fluffy, but I'm completely the opposite – I like it hard and fast. Coming from a background as a model it's been a total struggle from the beginning, but the reason I bought decks was the same as anyone else – I went clubbing every weekend."

This sentiment is hard to argue with, though there are those who feel DJs like Pin-Up are watering the scene down by taking it into mainstream Ritzy-style nite-klubs. The truth, however, is that hard house is finally having its day in the limelight, breaking down into multiple forms, and letting its hair down. It's just a shame that its greatest progenitor isn't around to see it.

SWAYZAK DEEP HOUSE DUO'S ADVENTURES IN ELECTRONICA CONTINUE ON A SECOND LP

Himawari (Columbia)

3.00 AM THURSDAY, Muzik offices, central London. An alcohol-fuelled conference is going on. "Swayzak? Boring middle class white boy music," rants one journo brandishing a can of Stella, advocating Lil' Kim as Album of the Month. His argument—a valid one in the face of anal, inward-looking electronica—is that there are hundreds of these "electro-noodle" groups out there who don't represent anything and distinctly lack image and glamour. Unlike Lil' Kim.

Now admittedly we'd all prefer to be stuck between floors in an elevator with Lil' Kim than with Swayzak. But music has a wide spectrum of emotions to offer and every now and then it's time for the quiet guys at the back of the class to triumph over the foul-mouthed sex dwarves. Now is such a time, for 'Himari' (Japanese


for 'Sunflower') is a bona fide corker. London boys James Taylor and David Brown may not be Liam Howlett and Mr Zoe Ball, but musically, they're floorlevelling in both the club and the living room, as this lush gem of an album demonstrates.

The album opens with Benjamin Zephaniah's skank-poem 'Illegal' and swiftly runs through some beatsy moves into the Kraftwerkian, Kirsty Hawkshaw-vocalled pop of 'State Of Grace'. After this, our friend with the Stella starts to become bored, as the duo's gradually building house grooves pass into electro and blatant minimalism. Folk on more exotic substances, however, will undoubtedly feel differently. By the time the dirty techno-swathed 'Pineapple Sponge Cake' comes around he's given up and gone home. It's that kind of a deal: you either hug Swayzak's plucky, latenight journey to your bosom, or puke with tedium.

Isn't all curiously appetising music like that, though? Swayzak throw down the gauntlet to Detroit's techno originals and quiz everyone from Danny Howells to Ashley Beedle as to what comes next. Those that embrace 'Himawari' will be thoroughly hypnotised by the time Dr Who robots arrive on 'The Frozen Loch' and a small, child-like voice begins a sedate story. There's one final treat in store, with the closing, Orb-shaped dub-house of 'Betek' — a real throbber that deserves mighty remix treatments. And then it's all over.

But the night is young, so it might as well go on again. Actually the night's not that young, really, but with music this cuddly yet this dynamic, who wants to go home? In short, it's a classic. Which is all very well, but can anyone get us a 'special' appointment with Lil' Kim? Thomas H Green

IAN POOLEY

Since Then (V2)

Mellow moods and low-slung house grooves from a maturing lan Pooley

IAN POOLEY has mellowed considerably since his days of firing out tech-house missives on steely-eyed labels like Germany's Force Inc, half a decade ago. His excellent debut album 'Meridian' came out two years back, and signalled a significant change of pace. Laid back cuts like 'What's My Number?' (remixed to great effect by Jazzanova - in fact, Pooley recently admitted he'd played the mix every time he DJed for the last two years!) replaced the fiery drum pyrotechnics of his earlier, harder releases.

'Since Then' continues the theme with a move even further into chilled, lush, Latino-flavoured, late night house pastures. No longer feeling the need to bash out synthetic floorfillers, Pooley's assured handling of a good groove has matured to somewhere nearing perfection, as he invites singers (including Kirsty Hawkshaw) and players on board for the first time to complement his discofied basslines and butt-shaking loops and samples.

A track like 'Bay Of Plenty' is typical, new school Pooley: understated, elegant and swimming in oceans of deep-fried funk, as a lonesome horn swoons its way to dancefloor nirvana. 'Visions', meanwhile, sees Hawkshaw do her ethereal thang over a guitarbased groove that's begging for serious sunset rotation over in Ibiza. 'Spicy Snapper' drops into an easy-going samba, before the album closes in reflective mood with the wandering, ambient textures of 'Cloud Patterns' giving the distinct impression that Pooley likes nothing better than lying in the grass on a summer's day, watching the weather go by.

Unfortunately for Mr Pooley, 'Since Then' is going to drop like a bomb this summer, leaving precious little time for such languid frivolities. Still, I don't think he'll be complaining about the extra workload: 'Since Then' looks set to propel him into the premier league, and he'll be able to afford to get someone in to look at the clouds for him.

Diamonds Are Foreve The Remix Album (EMI/Liberty)

Essence (K7)

Manchester's eternal 'Voodoo Ray' fella plays it cool

GERALD Simpson has remained largely silent since his lauded 'Black Secret Technology' album five years ago. But Lady Miss Kier's scat singing on 'Hurry To Go Easy' and the sheer loveliness of the litting guitar-based 'Beaches And Deserts' make you forgive Gerald's occasional descent into the realm of the coffee table.

1991, right down to samples last dropped by A Homeboy, A Hippy And A Funki Dred (ask your knackered rave Dad) and a guest appearance by veteran white female toaster, MC Kinky. Buckfunk 3000's Si Begg also lends assistance, but more noticeable are the bullish raps provided by Divine Styler and MC Danoyd on pugnacious tracks such as 'Real Wild Child' and 'Serum (The Remedy)'. It's a hectic rush of tub-thumping energy, spritely electro and, it must be said, large portions of pungent cheese. Peculiarly entertaining stuff from one of dance's oddest cats, nonetheless, and very nearly "Absolutely T for tremendous".



"VEGA BEACH PARTY?" There's a cry for help mewling forth from tanned bodies down by the Coconut Bar at the ocean's edge. "What kind of beach party is this?" the fluoro-clad, 4/4 friendly surf bums wail to each other as beats the size of tsunamis (and as big or bigger than Tsunami's) send them scattering, while bikini-clad babes melt in a haze of high level radiation.

If this is a beach party at all, then it's

being held on the beach at the end of 'Point Break' just before Patrick Swayze gets his.

Stylistically unfriendly but totally addictive, Neil Pollard, a sometime television and radio producer, sums up his TCR career so far on a minialbum that will shake the complacency from anyone who doesn't turn the stereo off straight away.

Which isn't to say this is one of those blokey, 'too-tough-for-chicks', noise albums. Not remotely – it has enough pulsing sex energy throbbing through its veins to get dancing posses of all sexes frenetically getting down to it before

If you're into all that nu skool breaks malarkey, titles such as 'Rogue Electric', 'Friendly Fire', 'Step Dragon' and 'Buzzed' will be more than familiar. But for the rest of us, it's a tour de force of teeth-gritting, bass-addled nastiness where the breaks are cut up enough to satisfy everyone from Adam Freeland to DJ Hype, Freq Nasty to Norman Cook.

And if those names don't set your juices going even slightly, perhaps you should stick to the 4/4, lovey. And for fuck's sake turn that bass down.

He's an excellent singer (albeit with a slightly limited range at present) but this weedy selection does him no favours.





BROTHERS IN SOUND

actually bear little sonic resemblance to high profile stable-mates and regular point of comparison, The Beta Band. What they do share, however, is a love of music in all of its myriad forms, from classic Sixties rock through to funk, soul, punk and acid house.

Their results, though are distinct from the occasionally wilfully opaque experimentation of the Betas. On 'Family Is For Sharing', the fresh-faced brothers (they're all in their early twenties) give an object lesson in rocking a dancefloor while singing heart-meltingly catchy songs. There's a firm understanding that the booty and the heart strings are not mutually exclusive, and it's this that makes this album so essential.

While many of their older peers pointlessly busy

themselves with the anachronistic 'dance-music versus guitars' argument, the Brothers are blithely making out like Blur at their most experimental being remixed by Weatherall on 'Sleep Again', then giving you acoustic head-massages on the likes of 'Levitation'.

The synergy continues on 'Hey You', which planks Sixties kookiness over the top of hip hop beats, while on 'Leave Glide Out', stomping kicks and acid lines are scorched with a soaring guitar coda.

From the opening fuzz of 'Journey Song' through to the good time Chemical Brothers and Dylan crossbreed of the closing 'Easy Life', 'Family Is For Sharing' is a giddy, irresistible spin through the last 30 years of musical history.


What's it all about? Home counties label drops breakbeats on your ears. And there's some breasts on the cover!

Together with Stonebridge and excellent mixes from Mr Pink (dub-funkin') and Danny Howells' Science Dept (prog-with-style), Coco proves yet again that he's no clown

Danny Rampling: "This is brilliant! The original's very Ibiza, while Danny Howells takes it in a more percussive direction. Perfect for the end of the night, though at the moment the weather in Britain isn't warm enough for open air moments. Good luck to Chris Coco!"

THESHRINK Are You Ready To Party (Split) LOATHSOMELY obvious but horribly potent in the right circumstances. "New York, Tibet, South Africa, Australia, London, Scandinavia, Belgium, Paris, Germany, Amsterdam - are you ready?" yells a Scooter-style MC in a Lock 'N' Load-ish slow-beat breakdown before exhorting all and sundry to party. Hard house inanity.

Danny Rampling: "I heard this shit the other day and it made me laugh - the beat sounds like an old glam rock tune! It's just a noise [contemptuously hurls record into the corner]. Tasteless music for tasteless DJs and a shining example of the horrors of fickle consumerism. Even if I was tanked up on E this would just send me home. Total nonsense."

CIRCULATION Amber (Circulation)

IT'S easy to ridicule The Shrink's clumsy bluntness from the twin parapets of age and experience, but what about Circulation who are always warm, hip and cuddly but will never attempt to woo 'the kids'? Oh,

the contradictions. 'Amber', naturally, is wonderfully deep and sensual house of the classiest variety.

Danny Rampling: "There's a Stephen Hawking sample from 'A Brief History Of Time' - he's quite popular on the sample front at the moment. Hike this – funky house, good for tech-house DJs too. My head's definitely nodding. Are you going to leave me your copy?"

DOPE SMUGGLAZ ALLSTARS

Barabajagal (Perfecto)

TWO of our nation's leading narcotics experts take on the ancient Donovan ditty. Over a bizarre hybrid of two-step and breakbeat rhythms Shaun Ryder does his rent-a-Monday stream-of-consciousness bit and Howard Marks intones baritone Welsh trippyness. Remixes of various musical hues from Utah Saints, Moonchild and Digital Thunder fail to save the day.

Danny Rampling: "Howard Marks isn't Ice Cube is hel It's going to have its appeal but it's not to my taste, it's a radio record not a club record. Dope Smugglaz are good characters and good DJs but this. there's not a lot going on in the rhythm section, I'm just not sure.

LUKE SLATER All Exhale (Novamute)

MUTE, waving those Moby dollars around like they just don't care, have decided to give this nugget from Slater's rather overlooked and gnarly 'Wireless' album another outing with new remixes from Justin Robertson, Futureshock and FC Kahuna. Slater's own 'Club Mix' is still best.

Danny Rampling: "The original mix is pumpin'. I'd play it out pitched down-I rarely go above 134 bpm these days. I'm not sure about the horror movie noises on Justin Robertson's mix - cheer up a bit! The Kahuna FC one is very Fabric."

CRAIG DAVID 7 Days (Wildstar)

HERE at Muzik Towers the area where two-step meets r&b is an issue of some concern. This record by British black music's boy wonder is a good example. Is this nu Brit soul we should be proud of, or just an update of swingbeat's most tired loverman moves? Either way it will sell. Sunship on the remix.

Danny Rampling: "This is going to be a hit. The rhythms sound quite like they were influenced by Jamaican dancehall. I don't find this offensive at all. It's Capital Radio in the morning when you're coming home slashed."

MOREL

True (The Faggot Is You) (Hooj Choons)

MOREL is Deep Dish's buddy who sang on the peerless 'Mohammed Is Jesus'. Here, he holds forth on a tunefully addictive anti-



homophobia diatribe. For those who don't need all the groovy chatter there's a funky house version from Omid Nourizadeh, and a couple of dark and dirty dubbings by FC Ka'huna and The Dish themselves.

Danny Rampling: "Dark and Deep Dish, very tasty. Good to see it's signed to Hooj Choons in the UK. The '16 Bit Remix' is very good, and I played the 'FC Kahuna Mix' out the other day. Very gritty and effective, a lot of life in it, and the lyrics are all very tongue-in-cheek."

TITAN

Corazon (Tombola/Virgin)

THIS will eventually be released with 'La Frecuancia Del Amor', better known as 'that tune out of the Rolling Rock advert', but for now we have to make do with way too many mixes of Percy Faith/Carole King's 'Corazon'. The best efforts are by Wiseguys' DJ Touche, Scanty Sandwich (unbelievably) and Mexican band Titan's own kitsch, Latino-oop version.

Danny Rampling: "What would you file this under? Big beat? It's a bit too pop. I'm not sure where this is going to be played. Strange. It sounds like a poor attempt at Latin music—not authentic, just some studio engineers masquerading as artists."

JOHN '00' FLEMING Free (React)

UNREMARKABLE but thoroughly functional piece of Euro-trance with state-of-the-art (in 1999) euphoric keys in the middle and an epic breakdown featuring cod-ethereal vocals. Mixes by Mark Shimmon & Third Degree, Plastic Angel and '00' himself do little to perk things up.

Danny Rampling: "Very Gatecrasher, where John is resident. That's a residency he earned through pure merit. He's got a lot of energy, travelling up and down the country doing four gigs a night—I admire that. I like his "Twisted Dub". It's alright: decent trance."

THE KLUB FAMILY FEATURING SYBIL When I Fall In Love (Manifesto)

MIAMI wunderkind Robbie Rivera knocks out yet another straight, disco-house bopper which will appeal to the less imaginative clubs of middle England. No bite or bottle to speak of but it has a certain diva-tastic charm which may pull the laydeez onto the dancefloor. Knee Deep provide a crisper, sparser version.

...

Danny Rampling: "This came in on import about a year and a half ago, and it's good to see a UK label's signed it. All the mixes are good – Robbie Rivera's are tough and Knee Deep stay true to the original with a funky-room-at-Pacha sound. Probably won't do anything major, though I could be wrong."

....

PRAGA KHAN Injected With A Poison (Nukleuz)

THE Belgian new beat king who later went on to storm early Nineties hardcore ravebams returns courtesy of the ever-prolific Nukleuz. The BPMs have naturally been upped but otherwise BK, Nick Sentience and Baby Doc hold onto the deranged rave nature of the original. Feisty as fuck.

Danny Rampling: "Koh Phangan at 7.00 in the morning or me five years ago. You won't get Judge Jules going near that, it's too heavy. Got a good edge to it, though.

Baby Doc's side is storming. I wouldn't play it, but for what it is, it's very good."

SPILLER Groovejet (If This Ain't Love) (Positiva)

ITALIAN 'Batucada' boy Cristiano Spiller plucks the chunkiest hunk of funk from his astoundingly well-received 'Mighty Miami' EP and Positiva's remix team (including Boris Diugosch and Solar) go to town. All very well except for the utterly unnecessary and, more to the point, rather dodgy vocal mix. Summer's here!

Danny Rampling: "Pure head-nodding goodness. All the mixes are good. It's an old Salsoul loop and I wish they'd gone with the original song, gone the whole hog, but it's got potential to do something on a national level. It was signed over here for a phenomenal amount of money, so good luck to him!"

AGNELLI & NELSON Hudson Steel (Xtravaganza)

ALEX Gold's Xtravaganza live up their name with an opulent, AAAA-side, picture-sleve, gatefold double pack. Trouble is the contents are a rampant cross-breed of trance and hard house with very unpleasant, trebly synths kicking off in a nursery-rhyme stylee. There's a curiously amiable ambient mix. though...

Danny Rampling: "I thought it was going to be a lot more banging, actually. [synths come in]. Cooh no, this sounds like The Osmonds' 'Crazy Horses'. There's a lot of breakdowns in it – maybe too many – possibly a candidate for a re-edit. The chill out track's good, though, I must admit."





Bad Habit (Defected)

AN enormous, full vocal, disco house record with a classic 'my-man-done-mewrong' theme at its core. Produced-up and pumpin', it'll rock crowds from the gayest club to the most chino-ed-up lads' gaff in the Midlands. Yup, girls of both sexes will love it. A pop hit too, we think, and deservedly so. Mixes from Armin Van Buuren and Spen & Karizma.

Danny Rampling: "Pure upbeat, soulful house made here in London by Aden from ATFC. The mix that does it for me is the original. However, there is a mix by José Nunez which is the best remix. I first heard it when Hector Romero from DefMix played it on my show. . . Defected deliver quality, as ever."

STORM

Time To Burn (Data)

MARK Spoon and his old sparring partner Jam El Mar team up once again to thrash yer heads with a bit of a hard trance monster. The twisted riff at its core is deadly enough to begin with but Mauro Picotto manages to make it even more distorted. For those who like matters smoother Pascal F.E.O.S. is on hand. Currently ripping muthafuckas' heads off down Ibiza way.

Danny Rampling: "Where's this noise from? A record from years ago. I must get into this record collection of mine and start doing some production in the harder department. This represents what goes on at Space in Ibiza. It really reflects what goes on in that, er. . . asylum."

WOOKIE

Battle (PIAS/S2S)

BIZARRE slice of UK garage which sounds utterly different from most of the tunes you'll hear this month. A monotone vocal which can only be likened to King Crimson suddenly bursts into gorgeous, soulful life over a plucked, jerky, two-stepping riddim that's familiar and yet utterly alien. Highly original and featuring mixes by MJ Cole and Dobie, this is something not a million miles away from genius. This is getting props from the garage massive and the leftfield massive, and you should check it.

Danny Rampling: "He was Soul II Soul's engineer wasn't he? It's a London thing. Not something I'd play, but it's got soul and it'll work with the underground garage posse, that's for sure."

HI-GATE

I Can Hear Voices/Caned And Unable (Incentive)

JULES and Masterson's cash-cow is wheeled back out to terrify the over 12s (oooh, the snobbery!). 'I Can Hear Voices is so tacky it's hard to believe it exists - an out-of-key female vocal battles it out with some tinpot drums and and a dentist's drill. The other side isn't quite so bad, but sadly that's not saying very much.

Danny Rampling: "Fuck! This sounds like Sooty and Sweep! It's another one of those barmy tunes - all this screeching. Terrible - all the way through.
'Caned And Unable'? That says it all. I
thought drugs were supposed to enhance creativity-what's going on? Someone send them some assistance, they need it."

MOD IO

Lady (Hear Me Tonight) (Sound Of Barclay)

A young French duo, going by the names of Yann Destagnol and Roman Tranchart have created an unexpected classic here. Now, we know French house usually consists of goofy samples and Air-brushed loops, but this combines soulful vocals and a funky guitar over a housey rhythm to create a simple, uplifting song which is already all over Ibiza like dandruff.

Danny Rampling: "I thought this was George Michael at first when Roger Sanchez was playing it. I said so to him and he thought I was being ridiculous. It's massive - gets a great reaction from people. It'll probably go Top 10. I'd love to see some Subliminal mixes of this.

The Motion (DJ Kalm Remix) (Federation)

On the surface a fairly workaday fusion of nimbly stepping beats and grim analogue flourishes, Kalm's remix deepens things out with distant swathes of melody that evoke light waves moving through the vastness of space. The result is a truly seductive mood piece, reminiscent of Krust at his best. The jittery drums and tremulous bass tones of 'Carousel' sustain the high quality.

Total Science don't so much remix it as give it a bit of spit and polish and shove it back into the spotlight. Superb.

J MAJIK

Jigsaw EP (Infrared)

This eagerly-anticipated four-tracker is something of a disappointment. The title track gets mean and moody with off-key pads and droning subs, but has no salient features and never really departs from the Virus party line. Smokin' Bluntz, Friction and Camcuflage all follow E-Z Rollers' hyperfunk blueprint, namely livesounding drums looped over basslines that plumb the depths without exuding any real menace. Solid but uninspired.

LANDSLIDE

Down Down (Hospital)

Landslide's second release for Hospital layers New York chanteuse Karime Kendras' anodyne vocals over a pleasantly weird technoid groove. For something completely different, turn to 'Fortuna', whose bossa stylings ride on top of cartoonish analogue splurges like a cocktail umbrella sticking out of a glass of industrial effluent. Mmmmm.

CALYX

Catapult EP (Moving Shadow)

Straight outta Tooting, four tracks of wry tech-step programming that take the Virus blueprint and mess around a little with its sombre doom-mongering. The title track takes the cyberbass sound to its comic extreme but it's 'Reshuffle' that stands out, its analogue bursts sounding not so much like the hounds of hell as wildebeest disputing waterhole rights. Refreshing.

FELLOWSHIP Coming On Strong (Defunked)

Defunked's second release finds Fellowship blending the simplest of elements - a skittish little break, judiciously-used vocal snippets and an insinuating three-note bassline - into an absolute bomb that recalls Alex Reece at his pre-Island peak. "Coming on strong, I wanna come home to you baby," the lyric goes. Yeah, we know that feeling. Fabio

Smoke (Emotif)

More potent beats and fiendish moods from Emotif. Opening with a tight break and creepy, porno flick samples, 'Smoke' evolves into a cavernous groover with strange, metallic stabs that resound like the slamming of dungeon doors. It's an oddly compelling track that repays further

What are the aims of the label?

"Spontaneity. The tracks are going to be made fast and turn up in the shops without too much fuss."

Which artists have vou released? "Our first release was 'Yo Bitch' (a Baker solo production under the name Source Direct) and the next is another Source Direct thing I've done called 'Sub One' with 'Escape To Cairo', which has been getting good reactions on plate, on the B-side."

What are your plans for the rest of the year? "I'm keeping the details pretty locked down, because, like I say, I want the tracks to arrive without warning. There's a lot of good things in the pipeline, though. . .

The resultant track exudes a ferocious melancholy and represents 'Amen' trickery at its finest. 'Trackside', meanwhile, is all edgy drums and malfeasant subs; a beautifully sparse stepper that will send shivers down your spine.

APATHY

Ain't Nothing Nice (Bronx Science, USA)

Always Bigger And Better Vol. 1 (ABB/GrooveAttack)

The label who first brought you Dilated and Defari drop the compilation to cement their reputation. There's a lot from those personnel, plus new boy Joey Chavez, but it's actually some of the other names that really excite, with Mhz offering the tune of the collection. Onward and ABBward.

THEM

Them (Anticon, USA)

What are we to make of man like Dose One? He has the most ridiculous, put-on voice in hip hop and some of the most pretentious concepts, but there's scmething compelling about his poet-in-a-pile-up approach. The Woody Allen of hip hop, he also manages to somehow inject enough soul into his music to cause you to love him despite your reservations.

AESOP ROCK

Float (Mush, USA)

An East Coast ally of the Anticon sound, Aesop Rock is highly rated in underground circles, but this album can't quite carry the weight of expectations placed upon it. Musically sparse with occasional lines leaping free of the mood Aesop tries to build, his flow and tone is too onedimensional to carry a whole album.

SHAPESHIFTERS

Adopted By Aliens (Celestial, USA)

If Shapeshifters' last one hadn't been Vital Release, this would have been - quite simply, Shapeshifters are probably the funniest, most sick-headed, essential and exciting crew in the US right now. And check 'Mos Eisley' for the very last word on old-to-the-new-to-the-true revivalism.

QUASIMOTO

The Unseen (Stone's Throw/GrooveAttack)

A series of skits and half-worked, jazzy beats with Quasi streaming his consciousness over the top, this has a laid back feeling of shambolic humour. Not all of it works, but its feeling of incompleteness gives it an edge, when most of the underground is - in its own way - as polished and safe as the mainstream.

ADLIB

Experience Experiments (Celestial, USA)

The Global Phlowtations producer entertains us with a series of instrumentals that quickly establish a mood of offbeat strangeness. Stretches of scratch, sudden reverses, this is future-noir hip hop. If some of the added vocal narratives are a little obviously 'strange', the overall quality of the music makes up for it.



STRATUS

Uplink (Fragments)

Magnificent and sky-high. Stratus take the Tortoise template and gradually lather it into an electrifying storm of crackling tension and epic post-rock moodiness. 'Uplink' is so beautifully broody, it will put grey clouds over your stereo for months. Stratus-pheric mate. (CB)







Already gaining maximum points on the jazz dance circuit, this blends modern rhythms with excellent reed word from Mr Haines and a complete rewash. rom those producers in the know, Lacarno & Burns. This will be massive!

DUBTRIBE SOUND SYSTEM

Do It Now (Imperial Dub)

Already gaining a positive reaction on both the main and back room floors of the bigger dance venues across the clobe, the System proves that inspirational and uplifting music can be played to the masses and will ignite the dancefloor with the purest of black beats and rhythms. 'Revival' is now revered as a classic. Do you think Opaz will ever put out anything to equal its impact? "I hope so, but so much of the success of 'Revival' was in its timing. I made a great record at the beginning of a scene that spawned 'Apparently Nothing' and 'There's Nothing Like This'. DJs got behind it at a time when it was cool to sound UK, and many of these records worked overseas."

What projects are you working on currently?

"I'm working with a south London girl called Natasha Campbell, whose album is due for release here in the Autumn. My own album 'Things Will Get Better' is ready for release, and I'm also finishing an LP in Japan featuring Martine Girault and Carroll Thompson. I've also almost finished the score for a British film called 'Waiting For The Morning'." (MD)

Roasted Or Fried (Harmless)

This marks Harmless' 25th recording and you have to take your hats off to 'em for reaching into the crates for the almost unobtainable. Yes, it is another retro comp. but one which leaves the listener with a massive sense of satisfaction. Essential music? Most definitely!

REGGIE CALLOWAY

Walking Through The Raindrops (Expansion)

Back in the Eighties the overall sound was very 'electric', and some would argue whether it was black enough. Reggie Calloway was the frontman for Eighties icons Midnight Star and now, as then, the man can raise the roof in the vocal department. This is pleasant enough, but never gets above mid-tempo and you could find yourself dropping off midway.

MOZ ART Brazilart (Irma)

You can always depend on the Italians to present something a little out of the ordinary. When it comes down to black dance music these guys certainly know their stuff. This time it's not a direct duplication of our friends from the US of A. but a pull from all things Brazilian, and the end result is extremely satisfying.

Thunder Chicken (Desco)

On first listen to this addictive set of retro grooves, one would think that these guys have been chuming out raw beats since back in the day when the JBs ruled the roost. Well you'd be very wrong, because this quartet are from the youth of New York City. Aged around 17-18 they play with the vibes of seasoned professionals. And if you like tuff beats that move you then this is for you!

Bitter Suite (Connoisseur Collection)

Originally issued as the first of three albums featuring the best jazz-fusion artists of the mid-Seventies/early Eighties from the Columbia catalogue. At the time most of these cuts were dancefloor fillers on the underground of the day, and it's hard to believe that a mid-paced floater such as Benny Golsons' 'The New Killer Joe' filled a dancefloor, but it did. You got high on the music back then. Timeless music.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Soul Essentials (Charly)

Here is a perfect start for anyone wishing to own a quality collection full of all things soulful and more. There's the obvious choices of Mayfield, Brown and Womack, but there's also rarer tunes from the likes of Arnold Blair, Ann Sexton and Otis Clay.

A great introduction to quality black music.

Love Rain (Hidden Beach/Epic)

Very much in position to steal Erykah Badu's thunder is Philadelphia singer Jill Scott. 
Is the music an unlistenable, bonkers mess then? Au

Doesn't Really Matter (Def Jam/Mercury)

Word was that Janet was going to start working with different producers, but this lead single from the Nutty Professor II soundtrack is once again produced by her old stalwarts Jam & Lewis. Using a stop-start structure the track has a Shekspere/Darkchild feel and benefits from a nice lead hook. Not the best thing JJ's ever done, but it's a grower.

IDEAL

Whatever (Virgin, US)

That man of the moment K Gee is at it again, this time with Ideal. Once again this is in that Ruff Endz 'No More'/ Next 'Wifey' style with an uptempo party groove. A very safe purchase for any working DJs out there. There's also a slightly different mix doing the rounds featuring a guest rap from Li'l Mo.

DJ QUIK

Pitchin' Ona Party (Arista, US)
DJ QUIK

Album Sampler (Arista promo)

DJ Quik has been producing straight down the line, smoove-grooved, gangstatinged hip hop since the early Nineties when he was on Profile Records. Like 'Too Short' and more recently the Cash Money lot, Quik has continued selling a lot of records outside of the mainstream and now has a new deal with Arista. 'Pitchin' Ona Party' is no great departure but it's catchy and is, as the title suggests, an uptempo party groove featuring Quik's bread and butter rap style. The B-side 'Do I Love Her' is a good, bass-heavy track. The standout on the UK-only album sampler, meanwhile, is a full on, orchestrally backed cut called 'Change Da Game'.

NICKEL SLICK

Bruthas Gonna Work It Out (white label)

Sounds American, but with a mention of poll taxes in the lyrics, maybe it's British after all. Whatever, this is an excellent, vibey, independent hip hop track taking its chorus from Willie Hutch's Seventies classic 'Brothers Gonna Work It Out'. There are a couple of nice mixes plus a dubbed-out bonus cut, 'In Ya Ear'. A smart little package.

BIG PUN

100% (Loud, US)

Well, he might be gone but his music is definitely living on. This is an out and out Latin rap track with Spanish singing and a completely Latin backing track. A good club record and a nice addition to all those other Hispanic-influenced r&b/hip hop tracks of late.

MARY J BLIGE

8 Unreleased Bullets (white label)

We reviewed the first installment of this unofficial EP a couple of months ago. This latest volume picks up where that one left off, offering Mary J rarities from across the singer's career. My favourite

is the 1993 Bad Boy remix of Super Cat's 'Dolly My Love' featuring Mary and Biggie. Not really a Mary J Bige track but great nonetheless. Also, a couple of early Darkchild remixes serve as a reminder that Mary was one of the first big names to give Rodney Jerkins a break as a producer.

CARL THOMAS

I Wish (Remix)/Woke Up In The Morning (Bad Boy)

A slight remix featuring a guest rap from LL gives this killer track some extra legs. Check the nice, vibey B-side which incorporates elements of Biggie's 'My Downfall'.

WYCLEF JEAN

It Doesn't Really Matter (Columbia)

The first release from Clef's forthcoming album features none other than the World Federation Wrestling champion The Rock, whose catchphrase is used for a chorus. The backing track, meanwhile, is a sort of ska hip hop track. A tad too poppy for these ears, let's hope that the new album includes at least one track as good as 'Gone Till November

STRINGS

Tanque Sona (Epic)

You'll probably be well aware of this 'Thong Song' answer record by the time you read this. Proving that the lowest common denominator is never a fixed affair, 23 year-old Chicago rapper Strings makes Sisgo appear subtle as she exhorts us to stick our tongues in her ta-ta. Sisqo himself won't be worried, having covered the topic of female oral sex thoroughly on 'Got To Get It'.

ALBUMS

RASHAAN PATTERSON

Love In Stereo (Universal)

Rashaan Patterson has gained a big UK following for his slightly retro soul sound. This new album sees the singer bring things a bit more up to date with some contemporary drum programming. Beneath the twittering hi-hats, however, it's largely business as usual and if you're a fan you won't be disappointed.

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Shaft - The Soundtrack (LaFace)

A very good soundtrack for the new Shaft movie that's doing so well at the pox office in America at present. There's a handful of really great cuts, including an absolutely essential new Carl Thomas track called 'Summer Rain' and a great party track from Parle Featuring Jadakiss and Eve Fix Me. Also featured are a new Donnell Jones cut and a choice song from newcomer Alicia Keys. The best soundtrack since 'Romeo Must Die'.



MA CHERIE FOR PAINTING

Autres Directions (Orphon, Germany)

Yes, it's a bit obscure. Yes, it's a triple album with the track titles printed backwards. And no, we have no idea who the questionably named Ma Cherie. . . actually are But 'Autres Directions' is a sprawling, psychedelic mess that makes The Beta Band look like Paul Van Dyk. It's so left of field it's squatting the neighbouring farmhouse with a motley crew of elderly Krautrockers, performance artists and political dissidents in tow. Wayward but inspired - hunt one down. "A sincerity of intent. Unprofessional and untalented, distasteful brainbusting music. Fuck people with no vision and no fortitude calling themselves 'art'. Art is a disease - not a lifestyle." How did the label

get started?

"In July 1998 I started releasing CDRs rapid fire to build up the catalogue. The CDR thing is an embodiment of the fact that I'm doing this label regardless of whether or not anyone cares...

You've released CDs by V/Vm, Vladislav Delay and OST as well as your own as Phthalocvanine -

what's the connection? "These artists are all inventors of their own world. I've been getting a lot of demos of clicks and pops and stuff, but if you don't invent something identifiably yours, I'm not convinced you've lived out the required desperation in your studio yet. . ."

Tell us about your album for Mike Paradinas' Planet u label.

"A couple of other labels made offers but they seemed pretty fishy, so I wanted to wait. Planet u is a 100% techno label, not experimental/ intellectual/pseudoacademic/whatever nonsense. It's techno. and that's what this is all about anyway, right?"

PAUL WELLER

Helioscentric (Swordsman 4UR Mix) (white label)

Weller, with his girl's haircut and pedestrian plod-rock, is an unlikely candidate indeed for this page. But 'Helioscentric' is a wigged-out cosmic jam (man), bereft of The Modfather's customary barked vocals and transformed at the hands of Weatherall into an unsyncopated motorik boogle that's straight outta Dusseldorf, 1972. (TM)

FULL SWING

Summe (Orthlorng Musork, US)

Neatly encapsulating the problem with the entire Mille Plateaux/'clicks and cuts' oeuvre, one side ('Summer') of this newie from Kit Clayton's label is beautifully warm, immersive and involving, like the best of Chain Reaction. The other ('11.55.330') is a load of pointless blips and bleeps, perhaps of passing interest to a bored Morse code expert. It's a fine line. . . (TIM)

MARKANT

Markant 27 (Markant, Germany)

In an unprecedented concession to (pash) populism, Carsten Envrass, aka Markant, has finally decided to release his music in editions of more than a handful, and will even be releasing this EP (alongside its predecessor) on CD. Which will no doubt please devotees of his grandiose, crunchy and melodic Skam-style electronica. Or on second thoughts, perhaps not. Also watch out for his new label Muta, where he'll be releasing other people's music for the first time. What a gent. (TM)

ALBUMS

OVUCA

Onclements (Rephlex)

They've been taking the phrase 'big up' a little too literally at Braindance Central Ovuca's second album weighs in at a massive 71 tracks over four LPs. Taken in fun-size doses the Finn's catalogue of post-Aphex beats and choc-ice tunes, coupled with his still-pissing- about-on-the computer-at-7am demeanour, will certainly keep you amused. Just don't attempt the full quadruple drop. (TM)

PHTHALOCYANINE

25 Tracks Fer 1 Track (Planet µ)

Phthalocyanine's Dimitri reckons Mike Paradinas has "a lot of guts" to release this album of unremittingly dark digital detritus on his Planet µ label. Fair point. You also need a strong stomach to listen to it, as arhythmic breaks collide with metallic, otherworldly sounds to take you into decidedly unfamiliar terrain. Persevere though, and you'll find it has a peculiar logic all of its own. (TTM)

LUOMO

Vocalcity (Force Tracks, Germany)

Ostensibly a vocal house album, when you discover this is actually the work of Vladislav Delay (Finland's answer to Pole), the absence of wailing divas and massive hooks is less of a surprise. Instead it's dub-house-disco all the way - deep without being dull, understatedly funk-filled and sufficiently bleepy to please aficionados of the Klang and Playhouse labels. And the vocals? Distinctly fromage-free. Nice. (TIM)

TONE LANGUAGE

Patience is The Key (Korm Plastics, Holland)

Korm Plastics are making much of the "pop" potential of this album, which only goes to show how far removed from reality it's possible to get when you live in Amsterdam and listen to Staalplaat records all day long. A collaboration between Lee Anthony Norris (of Metamatics, Norken and Nacht Plank, er, fame), and Japanese drum & bass duo Reflection, it's serene, beatless backgound music for grainy documentaries on lunar geology. Excellent. (TM)

DRY AND HEAVY

Full Contact (Green Tea)

This release by Japan's premier dubreggae band is a near-perfect facsimile of that Seventies Jamaican sound. But although Dry And Heavy are superficially redolent of King Tubby, Horace Andy, Black Uhuru and any other premier league reggae act you wanna name, the actual songs are just. . . okay. (DB)

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Heat Electric (Off World Sounds)

A 'bonzer' compilation from the label of ex-Cabaret Voltaire man and Australian emigré Stephen Mallinder. His own Ku-Ling. Brothers provide the best moments, and like 23 Skidoo (who he once produced), the old industrialist has evidently 'gone hip hop'. Sterling back-up comes from various Aussies you've never heard of. (DB)

ICEBREAKER INTERNATIONAL

Train Maersk (It/NATO Arts)

As musical concepts go, an album by two former Plano Magic members on the theme of international ports of trade doesn't sound promising. Still, by combining harmonious, Steve Reich-alike loops, chiming guitars and corporate video library music, this will have pale young men hankering after careers in the merchant navy in no time. Freight transport can be fun! Sort of. (TWI)

POSTSCRIPT

Bacchanalia (Angelika Koehlermann, Austria)

Never thought we'd be welcoming the return of the singer-songwriter, but the enigmatic Postscript is hardly Joni Mitchell. Proper songs with tunes do battle with fiercely distorted guitars, lugubrious vocals and murky digital fizz, and while there's no clear winner, something unique emerges from the gloom. (TIM)

Who Stole The I Walkman? Synesthesia (both Thrill Jockey)



TODD EDWARDS is the godfather of the UK garage scene, cited by luminaries such as MJ Cole and Tuff Jam as the biggest single influence on their musical direction. No mean achievement for a chap who is still only 27 years old.

Todd's recording career began at New York's now defunct 111 East Records in 1992, where he was employed as their in-house producer. He honed his technique, and over 1992/93 released two EPs, Todd Edwards' 'Part One' and 'Part Two' (both now £15). But it was at Nervous Records where he made his mark. Under the guise of The Messenger he released the shuffling garage classic 'Guide My Soul' (£20+) and a cult was born. A follow up EP on Nervous in 1994 as the appropriately named Sample Choir produced another gem in 'Feelin' Lonely' (£20). Though the original EPs are hard to find, Nervous fortunately re-released all the tracks on their 'Nervous

Innovators' series (CD and vinyl) last year.

In 1994, along with George Calle and Joseph Ventola Todd set up I Records as a springboard for local house and garage artists in New Jersey. Its initial release was the first Avenue Project EP containing 'Winter Behaviour'. 1995 was Todd's breakthrough year on I Records, releasing 'New Trends Sounds' (£20) and following it with the superb 'Steal Your Heart' on the third Avenue Project EP (£15). Then came the classic remix of Sharon Brown's 'You Don't Want To Lose It' (£15) and last but not least, probably his definitive track 'Saved My Life' (£15) with a limited edition remix following it up (£20). ffrr re-released the track in 1996 with mixes from DJ Sneak and Grant Nelson (£15-20) which also appeared on another lissue of the track in 1997 (£10). He also released two classic twelves on Bean Records ('Dancing For Heaven' and 'Stronger') (£20 each).

Another classic I release from Todd from the same era is the soaring 'Fly Away' from 1996 (£15). During 1997 and 1998 Todd released 'Push The Love' (£10) 'Never Far From You' and the 'Isiah' EP as well as top remixes for Mount Rushmore ('The Vibe That's Flowing') and Somore ('I Refuse to Believe Part 4'). Then in 1999 came the 'Prima' EP (£8). All four tracks from this also appeared on the 'Prima Edizione' CD which also contains many hard to find classics. This year has seen the 'New Trends 2000' EP. Currently available on I or forthcoming are 'Look Out', 'Show Me A Sign' and an EP with Tuff Jam.

Most of Todd's 30 or so remixes are also in demand. The Beloved's '100 Years From Today' fetches up to £30, while St Germain's 'Alabama Blues' can hit £20. There's also an unreleased remix of TLC's 'No Scrubs' which is probably around on bootleg. For more info, log on to the I Records web site, www.irecordings.com.

BRIAN ENO & DAVID BYRNE 'MY LIFE IN THE BUSH OF GHOSTS' (POLYDOR)



CONTRARY TO POPULAR opinion, the beginning of the Eighties was a fertile and experimental time for electronic music.

'My Life In The Bush Of Ghosts' was a collaboration between two of the leading lights of the avant garde chin-strokeratti. David Byrne was the geek-chic leader of New York art-funkers Talking Heads, while

Eno had moved smoothly from Roxy Music glam to being The Inventor Of Ambient TM .

Their album is a darkly psychedelic, sample-laden head-fuck that still sounds vibrant, futuristic and cutting-edge today. Opening with the intoxicating, midnight psychosis of 'America Is Waiting', where tribal drums and stuttering guitars interlock

with the urgent voice of a panicked radio host, it moves through brain-scrambling soundscapes made up of such disparate sources as Islamic chants, exorcists and Lebanese mountain singers, all wrapped up into a wave of jittery, angular noise.

The stuff of which bad trips are made – and yes, that is a good thing. (JH)

CUTTING MIXERS WITH THE SCRATCH HEADS

TURNTABLISM demands every bit as much practice and skill as any traditional instrument. The whole discipline is bound up with individual skill, flair, invention and a deep, instinctive understanding of rhythm. And more than any other school of DJ skills, cut mixing relies heavily on the performance of the mixer you use. So what is it precisely that makes a cut mixer cut and how good are the flood of new machines that have hit the market over the last year or so?

To answer this question we visited the studio/offices of London's premier promoters of the turntablist arts, Rob Mac and Matt Smooth, the men behind the legendary monthly London club Scratch. To put our machines through their paces they enlisted the assistance of two fellas who are fast becoming legends themselves; Joe 2 Grand from The Runaways and Mr Thing from The Scratch Perverts.

We started with a question. A lot of aspiring scratchers buy a budget mixer like the little Gemini PMX, or the KAM Made II Fade, destroy it in a few months and then buy another one. Is it really worth going out and buying something that costs five or six times as much?

Joe: "It depends who you are and how important cutting is to you. If you're like a trendy thirty-something guy who's got a set of decks in the house and only want

to do the occasional bit of scratching, then go out and buy a Made II Fade. But if you're gonna be in your bedroom all day caning it, trying to get your shit together then you need something that works and it's worth spending three, tour or five hundred quid on getting a good mixer."

Mr Thing: "For me, it's like headphones. I've only just bought a pair of decent Sennheisers and I should have bought a pair of decent headphones from the off. By the time I'd bought and snapped and broken and pulled the leads out of 10 pairs of crap £10 headphones I might as well have spent £100 on a decent pair."


Before we proceed, we should mention a couple of also rans:

The Ecler HAC320 (£399) is allegedly a damned good scratch mixer, but despite a staggering number of taxes and phone calls over a four week period, their UK distributor couldn't get it together to get a mixer to us in time.

The forthcoming Citronic CS3 (£249) is also almost guaranteed to be a creditable machine.

The next Scratch gathering will be at The Scala in London on October 5th with Z-Trip (from Galifornia) and The Bad Magic Tour featuring The Creators.

The Runaways' album 'Progress' is out now.

STANTON have been making better ground than most newcomers to the mixer market with what you have to admit are a rather keenly priced range. The SK2 is their first scratch machine, the first mixer we racked up for the boys to batter, and a perfect opportunity for us to start this months rodeo with a bit of controversy. . .

JOE: "That was the first one we did and I think that it's come out the winner with the lower price bracket."

MR THING: "When we were in New York doing the team battle we had the rep from Stanton come up to us and go 'hey you guys, I've got something to show you' and we were like 'whaaaat, that's a 05!' It is shocking how much it looks like a 05 – the whole layout of it. The only thing that's slightly different with it is the three EQ bands rather than two, which in a way could be even better. I think the Stanton is very good for the money. I was very sceptical of it, I don't mind admitting that, but I really enjoyed it.

"The curves on the up fader are as sharp as the crossfader so I found I could do all my cuts from the crossfader with the up fader. You have got to remember to switch this button back down if you want to do stab patterns with it, but the nice thing is it's all tucked up out of the way. You could probably even pull off some body tricks with it if you were that way inclined. I'm also a big fan of practising using the headphone facility, where you can just turn the master volume off. That's the only thing that could make me part with my 06 because at the moment I have to take an output from it and then hook up my headphones to my amp. I don't like those line switches though. They're horrible, they're too flash."



THE VESTAX contribution to scratch mixer development cannot be overstated. The PMC05 Pro is the industry standard, the PMC07 Pro sits at the top of the range, the PMC06 Pro is the long, thin one and together they form a trio of excellent, subtly different mixers. Each one suits different styles and a particular range of moves. Vestax scratch mixers are instruments in the traditional mould with a feel and sound all their own. They are a legend, in short.

JOE: "With Vestax, the cut in is very good on the crossfader, most people are used to them and the whole of the turntablist community is quite hardcore into Vestax. The 07 EQ has -24dB so it's not so severe, but you have got EQ faders which is nice. Also with the 07, thanks to the layout and hamsters on the up faders, you can do this crazy thing called the Euro where you do two faders at once. There are moves you can do a lot better with the 07. A lot of people don't like the up faders on the 07 – they're so severe that trying to do any kind of fade is almost impossible. It's really hard to do mix tapes and club mixing and the curve control just moves the location of the curve on the fader."

MR THING: "Personally I have an 06 and I love it. Lots of people think I'm bonkers because I don't like the 07, but I can't deal with them at all because of the up faders. Anything with a curve that cuts in half way up the fader and doesn't allow you to fade out. . . I mean. I've been in a club situation and had to use the gain controls to do fade outs and I don't like that at all. You can't do any fade down scratches with it at all and when I'm playing out I like to do that a lot."




UMX looks like the beginning of a new breed from Gemini. The entire range offers a keen balance of facilities, build quality and value for money. The UMX9 is an impressively endowed mixer. It boasts plenty of tools, it's solidly built, has a reassuring feel to its controls, a warm full sound, very nice EQ and, quite honestly, we expected our guest testers to have a little more to say about it.

Their reticence is probably down to the unfortunate fact that the review unit made an unhelpful, electrical thumping noise at the cut in point of the crossfader, which is a great shame because the unit we had for our June issue turntable test had no such noise.

MR THING: "The Gemini has got everything on that you could want but they need to sort out the crossfader, because that thumping noise is horrible. Also, the crossfader came off after a couple of cuts. I know you can fix the button coming off but when you take something out of the box you don't expect the crossfader to go whooo across the room."

JOE: "The feel is quite nice and smooth without too much clunking and it even cuts okay, but it had that bumping on the crossfader. The up faders feel quite nice, they're relatively cool. The phono/line switches aren't too bad and the EQ is okay. I'm half and half about this one."

THE SM range has by all accounts met with universal acclaim. Today the UK cut fraternity gets its first stab at the revolutionary 'infinity' optical crossfader. It's a step on from VCA in that it uses a light beam to measure the distance of the fader from either end of a track to control a separate amplifier. Plus, the fader itself does not sit on a traditional track at all, it's mounted on ballbearings and is staggeringly smooth running. But can it cut it?

MR THING: "It's a very nice mixer, the up faders are fantastic. This crossfader is very sharp, but to be honest I was having trouble hearing what I was doing over the clunking sound (caused by the shaft of the crossfader hitting the metalwork of the face plate at either end). I practice at night and if I did a couple of flares, I'd wake the whole house up with that. It needs a bit more stiffness to it so that I can control it."

JOE: "The Numark is nice but the crossfader is fucked. They're obviously doing something slightly different with the new technology which is good, but this clunking thing, that is just not on. It would probably work if they had rubber pads at either end to stop it hitting the metalwork, but it feels too heavy and just awful really. It's too loose — it's almost like a little breeze from your wrist and it's off, it needs a little resistance to be able to control it. I've used the old model, before they got this new 'infinity' fader and it was much better: it was smooth if you were club mixing or cut well for turntablism."



RANE'S top of the range model is popular with pro's for its build and sound quality. Matt and Rob use one already, and it also found favour with the rest of our decknological panel.

MATT & ROB: "We have a very punishing schedule and we're not very good about looking after our stuff. We don't have a flight case for it, it gets thrown in the boot of the car after gigs, it's been right round the world and we all know how luggage fares in the hold of an aircraft. It's starting to look a bit worse for wear but we've been using ours for over a year and it's still alive and kicking. Every other mixer we've owned died within six months."

JOE: "The build quality of the Rane is amazing. It's got really good features, like really nice up faders, so you can do really good fades. The –40dB cut on the EQ is really good, it'll take out ALL the bass. The crossfader on the Vestax is probably a little more on it than the Rane but I've had a lot of fun with it and I'm sure Mark can do his thing with it. It's a slightly different feel to the Vestax, which can sound a bit bright sometimes, whereas the Rane seems to have quite a broad, heavy sound to it. Of the £700 bracket the TTM54 and the 07 are kings."

MR THING: "I like this Rane a lot but I think the master section is a bit confusing – it needs a better layout – but it is a very nice mixer. To be honest, I really wouldn't want to choose between this and the Vestax, it's too difficult."



inverts the crossfader so that you get no sound when it's in its central position. It only makes any sense with the Trifader because it means that you can fade out a frequency band from one track without necessarily mixing in the corresponding frequencies from the other track.

Also nestling either side of the bottom fader are a pair of red buttons marked 'reverse'. These are essentially hamster punch buttons so they flip the channels on the crossfaders. This is nothing short of genius in action: there's no way you're gonna leave a mix of the vocal and mid range of two tracks running, then instantly swap the kick drums, basslines, and hi-hats of your two tracks with a set of rotary kills and a normal crossfader – you just don't have enough hands.

Steve Lawler: "There are so many things you can do with that mixer that no other mixer can do. Like taking just the high end of a track, filtering it to hell and then just mixing that in, or taking the entire bassline from one track and running it all the way through another track and making it sound completely different. It's like remixing music as you play it."

Steve Lawler: "Having the effects send switch right there on the mixer is excellent."

Monitoring

Monitoring facilities are cool too. Down on the front there's a channel selection button, level and split cue controls and a supremely useful EQ control that will perform a high or low cut for focusing on either the hats or kicks for mixing.

Sonic Matters

The Infader sounds excellent. It's not over-clinical, bass response is excellent and it's almost certainly got an edge over any other mixer at the price. The EQ is also superb. The frequencies are split very nicely, it performs a total kill and a nicely judged degree of boost and is very musical all round.

Steve Lawler: "It sounds better than any mixer I've used."

Your Wish Is Our Command

Being digital, the Infader can also be reprogrammed. We took it along and let Mr Thing and Joe 2 Grand loose on it to check its scratch potential. They both had one go on it and declared that the crossfader curve was too



FX Feeder

The Infader also has the most comprehensive and versatile effects send/return system on any DJ mixer. It's no surprise that RED have paid so much attention to such things when you consider that they make the superior Federation effects units for DJs. Up in the top right corner there's a group of four knobs. These are used to control how sound is sent out through the connections on the back panel to an external effects unit and then where it goes when it comes back.

One knob is used to select which channel (or the master signal) is sent to the output and whether that signal is taken 'pre' or 'post' the channel fader. This gives you control of whether you're working with a combination of the original dry sound and the effected sound or just the effected sound.

Accompanying this knob is a 'send level' control, essential for keeping control of the level of the signal as it arrives at the input of your effects unit. Next to these is a knob for selecting whether your effected sound ends up at one of the channel faders or the master output. This also has a level control. Down next to the channel faders there's a three position effect send switch; it's central, vertical position is 'off', but pull it towards you and you have a sprung punch in action, and if you push it away from you, it latches into an 'on' position.

gentle, 'spongy' and useless for scratching. One phone call later and a new EPROM was on its way. A five-minute fitting operation for the new chip (carrying the final operating system rather than the prototype one accidentally supplied) and we had a totally different, sharper fade curve in operation. As it happened we also arrived at a few other suggestions, like the ability to have the signal from one channel present at both sides of the crossfaders while in the 'centre off' mode. This would make the Infader wicked for cut mix duties because it'd give you twice as many cuts to a single fader movement. We also pointed out the need to latch the reverse buttons for cutting. One e-mail later and RED set to work on a custom scratch version of the operating system.

Evolution in action

RED most certainly do know how to build a DJ mixer. The Infader is quite simply way ahead of the field. It already has unique and genuinely progressive features that open up new possibilities for the evolution of DJ technique. Combine that with its ability to respond to and grow with that evolution and you have something very special indeed.

Steve Lawler: "I want to take my mixing ability as far as I can possibly go and the Infader is the mixer to do it with."

TRUE ANALOGUE FILTERING IN A CUTE LITTLE BOX? ELECTRIX HAVE IT CRACKED WITH THEIR

THE FILTERQUEEN is a digitally controlled analogue filter complete with an envelope follower and an LFO. It's also a superb DJ tool for all your muffling, squelching, breaking down and re-building sonic needs.

What is a filter, then?

KILLER QUEEN

A filter removes frequencies from a sound in much the same way kills do, but you can adjust which frequencies get removed. This filter has three main controls: a button for choosing between four different filter types, and knobs marked 'frequency' and 'resonance'. The frequency knob is marked with 20Hz (bass) at its fully anti-clockwise position and 20kHz (treble) at its fully clockwise position and it controls the 'cutoff frequency'.

The most commonly used filter type is called a 'Low Pass Filter'. Its effect is to remove all of the frequencies above the cutoff frequency. So when you set it at about nine o'clock you just hear kick drums & bass.

Of the other filter types on offer, 'High Pass' works the opposite to Low Pass (all frequencies below the 'cutoff frequency' are removed); 'Notch' removes a narrow slice of frequencies either side of the cutoff frequency and 'Band Pass' leaves a slice of frequencies either side of the cutoff in place and removes the rest (so with it set at around 12 o'clock you hear the mid but no bass or treble).

The 'resonance' control simply boosts the frequency at which you set the cutoff. With a small amount of resonance applied you add a little emphasis to the cutoff frequency. The more resonance you apply, the more the cutoff frequency begins to wail and squeal, a little like guitar feedback.

Listen to any Armand Van Helden track or 'filter disco' tune, where all the sound disappears and then gradually creeps back in from the bass up. What you are hearing is an example of Low Pass Filtering in action.

LFO

If you grab the cutoff control and start turning it back and forth it sounds really cool. Slightly mad and rhythmically twisted when done frantically but still impressive. An LFO, however, is a bit like an automatic cutoff knob turner. This one allows you to set the speed, extent and 'shape' of virtual knob-waggle.

Envelope following

This is a means of setting things up so that the cutoff frequency is altered automatically with changes in the volume of your music. You can set it up so that the filter is closed down during breakdowns and then opened up again when the kick drum comes back in.

Input/output control

The only other controls are the superb Electrix dual action punch in or punch out buttons and a wet/dry 'effect mix' control.

Sonic surgery

This is a brilliant piece of machinery that's capable of performing like a straightforward, adjustable kill unit or completely distressing sounds beyond recognition and it sounds absolutely impeccable. Some of the concepts involved in filtering may seem complex on paper, but trust us. If you get your hands on one, you'll love it!

KORG'S SAMPLING WORKSTATION FOR PRODUCERS ON A BUDGET HAS SOME NIFTY MOVES UP ITS VIRTUAL SLEEVES

IF YOU'RE into breakbeat-driven music and you want to craft your own, you're probably best off starting out with a sampler. By definition, the genre is made up of stolen, twisted fragments of beats and it just doesn't have the same feel when you try to put it together with preset sounds. Enter the Electribe ES-1, and the return of the sampling drum machine.

How does It work?

A sampler is like a sonic camera – record in a sound, stab a button and the sampler plays the sound back at you. If that sound happens to be a drum beat, you can chop out and repeat (loop) a couple of bars of it and you have a breakbeat. Chop that break into individual drum sounds and (with the aid of the on-board sequencer) you're able to rearrange its rhythm while preserving the sound and feel of the original break. The sequencer also offers the ability to add more layers of sounds, gradually building your own rhythms on top of the original, until the beat becomes your own. When you add to this the fact that you're not limited to sampling drums, you have a very versatile little instrument.

Finding your feet

Getting to know the ES-1 is a beginner's dream. It's laid out and organised with logic and flair and the manual is very good. It guides you steadily through the process of taking your own





samples, through editing/reprocessing and arranging them into patterns and then songs. Although the main theme of the ES-1 is creating your own samples, it's not just a blank canvas it comes with a truly excellent, versatile, bank of samples. It won't teach you how to make music but it will definitely set you well on your way. Oh and it looks absolutely superb.

Rhythmic destruction

When it comes to rearranging the rhythmic order of a break, there's a 'slice' facility which chops breaks into individual sounds automatically and places them in their original rhythmic locations on the sequencing grid. However, although this enables you to alter the tempo of the pattern without affecting the pitch of the sounds and shows you where the sounds occur in the original beat, you'll have to manually make separate copies of the samples if you want to rearrange their rhythmic order. Luckily, programming with the ES-1 is very intuitive and easy.

Sonic destruction

The next thing on the agenda is messing with the sound of your samples. To this end The ES-1 provides 12 superb sounding effects, each of which has two parameters assigned to knobs for live tweaking. The selection of effects covers most basic production needs and the parameters which have been assigned to the knobs are well chosen for maximum playability. You can also record a sequence of effecttweaking knob movements as part of each pattern. Even better, not only does the ES-1 resample (make new copies of samples with effects applied, freeing up the effects section for you to use again), it'll resample in real time. So you can make new copies of patterns with as much knob twiddling as you can physically manage. All resampling is done in the digital domain so you can do it as many times as you like without losing quality, allowing you to layer effects to sculpt a mix or reprocess beyond recognition. Which is exactly what you need when you only have one instrument in your studio.

Boogie box

The ES-1 is a truly marvellous sonic toolbox and possibly one of the most impressive beginner's machines ever produced.





What can you remember about past trips to Ibiza? "When I was 17 I gatecrashed some friends' Club 18-30 holiday. I had to sneak past the security men every night to stay in my mate's hotel. 
How did you become a DJ? "I got a call asking if I wanted to give it a try and I thought why not? Apparently, I'm quite good at it."

I do drink pints and I have ordered Boddingtons, but it's a bit too heavy for me. Even if I go into the studio feeling really groggy on Saturday morning, as soon as I arrive, it's like — whoosh! — a rocket up my arse and I'm buzzing for the rest of the day."
